Saturday, Feb. 11, 9:30 a.m. at West Metro Aviation, Buffalo Airport

Agenda for February Meeting:

- General business and planning ahead for our April pancake breakfast.

- Brian Holte, mechanic for West Metro Aviation, will discuss the various services
 available at West Metro and talk about some of the unique aircraft he has worked
 on. Brian also flies the Pitts S-2C aircraft to some of the air shows so Mike Wiskus
 can provide media and publicity rides as part of his Lucas Oil air show
 performances. Brian will also discuss what it takes to maintain an air show aircraft
 and keep it "show ready." Note: coffee and water provided.

The hangar for West Metro is easily spotted by their sign on the airport entrance side of the building, to the right as you drive into the parking lot. Depending upon other activities that day, you can park in the lot and enter through the personnel door on the northwest corner, or drive around to the front side of the hangar.

January proved to be one of the warmest here in Florida for several years. Minnesota wasn't too bad either from what I have read.

I have my plane tied down in a "shade" hangar at a grass strip in the town of Mimauma, about twenty minutes from where I live. One would assume that the town was named after an Indian but, as the story goes, it was named after an early settler's three daughters, Mimi, Maude and Marie. The airport is privately owned by the family of a crop duster who was something of a local legend. McCraw was a 12,000-hour pilot, A&P, and experimental aircraft builder. He was killed in a freak accident while crop dusting in Wisconsin when he lost power in his helicopter. He auto-gyrated the copter and landed safely. When he exited the copter, a strut gave way allowing the rotor to swing around and hit him in the head, killing him instantly.

Usually, one thinks that an airport would deteriorate and disappear when the owner is no longer around, but the family has kept it vibrant. There is a Bob Leader type mechanic (named Bob) on the field, as well as a ferry tank building company. So there is no shortage of people hanging around telling airplane stories.

The February meeting should prove to be a good one. Wayne has lined up Brian Holte to give a presentation at West Metro Aviation in Buffalo.

I have tentatively lined up two speakers of the FAASTeam, from the Minneapolis Flight Standards Office for our March meeting. They will talk about Light Sport Safety and airworthiness recommendations. While the central focus will be on light sport, all the information can be directly correlated to all aviation. I recommended that we open the meeting to the public through some posters and/or local advertising as a means of attracting new members to the chapter. The FAASTeam will gladly send out postcards and e-mails to attract more participation.

TREE OF HOPE STORY

The following is a letter dated January 10, 2012, received by Elaine Morrow from a staff person at Hennepin County Medical Center. This truly gives meaning to the work of the Tree of Hope.

"Dear Elaine and Everyone with Tree of Hope,"

"Another Christmas has come and gone and once again the Tree of Hope has come through with toys and gifts for our patients here at HCMC. We received a very nice variety of toys that spanned the age groups and allowed us to find just the right gift for every child. We got the toys early enough that we were able to start giving them away a few weeks before Christmas. That was ideal as our census dropped right on Christmas and not many children had to be here over the holiday."

"Elaine, you asked me to report on how the books with the CDs were received. I can tell you that the response was very positive. One little boy in the burn unit did not have family with him all the time and the story on CD was a nice way to span those lonely moments. The books were so beautiful and I loved giving them away."

"I always like to give you one story of how the Tree of Hope made a difference. This year was especially touching. We got a call from one of our adult ICUs about a family that was here. The father had been critically injured in an accident. His wife and their 7 year old son were spending Christmas at his bedside. The ICU nurses wanted t know if there was anything we could do to make this Christmas a little brighter for the child. Our pediatric nurses put together a bag of toys from the Tree of Hope collection and brought it to the family. The mother was so overwhelmed with this sow of compassion that she burst into tears as she accepted the gifts. The ICU nurse called our unit later to say that the child had been playing with the toys all day and having a great time. Although no gifts can take away the pain of a seriously ill or injured parent, the ripple effect of those gifts can be truly amazing. Having something else to focus on and paly with can make the pain of the injured father and separation from home more bearable for a child. When a mom sees her child occupied she feels she is meeting her child's needs and it gives her a break so she can focus on her husband. The nurses can feel good about being able to provide some tangible support and comfort to a family when sometimes they feel helpless in the face of life's tragedies. It reminds me of the movie 'It's a Wonderful Life.' One life or act of kindness can touch so many other lives without you even being aware of the impact you are making."

"This is what the Tree of Hope provides for our patients and their families every year. Thank you so much for remembering us and allowing us to participate in this simple act of kindness. Without you it would be very difficult to brighten the holidays of our children here at HCMC."

"On behalf of all our staff, patients and families, thank you and may you all have a Happy New Year."
