DO YOU WANT TO HAVE A MAPLE LAKE FLY-IN IN 2020? A volunteer fly-in leader is needed soon to prevent another cancellation

By consensus vote of the chapter we did not have a 2019 fly-in at Maple Lake, breaking a string of 32 consecutive years of Maple Lake fly-ins. But the hope was to reorganize, plan, and hold an event in 2020.

If we want to have a 2020 fly-In, we need someone to step forward very soon as our volunteer leader. An event such as this will need the input of planning and organizational skills from the entire chapter as we reset our priorities, but we need someone to be the "point-person."

Please examine what draws you to a fly-in, and how we can channel that attraction into our own event. You can be the leader to bring a fly-in back to Maple Lake.

The first Maple Lake fly-in was held on September 13, 1987 (one year after EAA Chapter 878 was formed). It featured a pork chop dinner (something unusual at fly-ins at the time) prepared by the Wright County Pork Producers. It was sponsored by EAA Chapter 878, the Maple Lake Commercial Club, the Maple Lake Flyers, and the Maple Lake Jaycees.

A VISIT TO TUSKEGEE AND BEYOND by Wayne Flury

Joyce and I recently took a couple of weeks to get away from Minnesota winter, traveling by car for just over 2700 miles through the southeast US. (Note to self: next time, schedule more "down days" between "travel days.")

We hung out in Nashville for a few days, toured the city, ate great BBQ (and here's a shameless advertisement for the restaurant chain our daughter and son-in-law are associated with: Martin's Bar-B-Que Joint, see: https://www.martinsbbqjoint.com/), went to the Grand Ole Opry, then to Auburn, Alabama to see our oldest granddaughter (she goes to a school there with a fairly decent football team, but who LOST to the Golden Gophers in a bowl game this year!), ate more good food, and then proceeded west.

I've too often thought of the Tuskegee Airmen as "just pilots," but they were also mechanics and other support services as well...a black force within the Army Air Force.

Wandering through this museum, seeing the sites of our country's history, and reading the stories of these men was both humbling and sorrowful while still conveying the achievements of the Airmen. Though not so long ago in time (1941 – 1945), I wonder how I would have reacted to the conditions of those days?

Tuskegee, Alabama is just a short drive southwest of Auburn. I felt I couldn't be this far into the south without visiting one of our National Parks, the Tuskegee Airmen National Historical Site, the airport home of the Tuskegee Airmen. I've had the honor of meeting a few of the Tuskegee Airmen, including former Col. Charles McGee, recently promoted to Brigadier General. This visit felt like a chance to pay homage to them all.

CHAPTER STEM VOLUNTEER PROGRAM by Kyle Weatherly, STEM Coordinator

Here are a few pictures from a recent Rockford STEM program presentation. 7th grade teacher Corina Sarsland is the Rockford STEM Coordinator.

Chapter 878 has made a presentation at three separate times this school year, with 1/3 of the Rockford 7th grade class in each of the sessions. We covered their questions, reviewed principals of flight, and made and flew paper airplanes.

Our presentation starts with "STEAM not STEM" - Science - Technology - Engineering - <u>Aviation</u> and Math. That is how we start the conversation because all of the elements of STEM are actually part of aviation.
