• CHAPTER 878 FLY-OUT COORDINATOR and EAGLE FLIGHTS LEADER by Kyle Weatherly

Ed. Note: Chapter 878 member Kyle Weatherly recently committed to Greg Thomes to "take over / start-up" two positions with EAA Chapter 878. These are: **Fly-Out Coordinator** and **Eagle Flights Leader**. The Fly-Out Coordinator has a fairly self-evident goal (coordinate fly-outs by EAA Chapter 878 members to aviation events or destinations). The Eagle Flight Leader will manage local participation in the national EAA "Eagle Flights" program, a free introductory flight experience and mentoring program for adults. Below is a dialog from Kyle about his vision for these programs. As with any endeavor, these cannot be just "Kyle's programs;" they need his dedication and leadership but must have the support, cooperation and partnership by everyone in the chapter.

Eagle Flights Leader:

I have read the information available on the EAA website in regards to Eagle Flights and have sent away for the materials provided by EAA.

The Eagle Flights are for people 18 and above. This is a program that will allow adults the ability to learn a little about flying to see if they want to pursue it themselves.

As part of this program ramping up for EAA 878, the chapter will need to maintain a list of pilots willing to be a Mentor Pilot. There is a Mentor Pilot Handbook that EAA encourages mentor pilots to read to help give the interested adult the best introduction to flying possible.

Qualifications to be a Mentor Pilot:

- EAA member in good standing
- Airman's certificate or a comprehensive understanding of aerodynamics and regulations
- Ability to communicate well, both verbally and written
- High energy level with ability to spark enthusiasm in others
- Arrange Eagle Flights, either personally or with a chapter mentor pilot, for any adult expressing a desire to participate in the Eagle Flights program.
- Communicate with the Eagle Flights office by providing constructive criticism and suggestions to improve the program.

Please let Greg Thomes or Kyle Weatherly know if you are interested in assisting with Eagle Flights.

As a group we may want to discuss offering parents the same opportunity as their kids when EAA 878 has Young Eagle events.

Fly-Out Coordinator:

Since this is fairly new to EAA 878, I will be working through some formatting and trying to get a simple procedure in place so I and others in the group can issue a Fly-Out event for the club members, friends, family, and others that may be interested in joining the event.

My intent is to use an electronic invitation program called Pingg to setup this structure. The benefits of doing this online is that it eliminates the need for countless e-mails going back and forth keeping everyone informed on what the event is and who might be attending. There are provisions on the program to allow invited guests to look to see who else is planning on attending the event.

None of the information below is set in stone, but this is what I would like to start with and we will develop the EAA 878 Fly-Out group as we go. Here are some of the ideas below

As I see it there will be two types of events:

- 1. Planned Events: Something that is fixed on a calendar or requires some planning in advance for a group of people to go do.
- 2. Pop-Up Events: Very little planning with very little notice (a day, or even hours)...events just because the weather is nice and someone wants to go flying.

Examples of events:

- Breakfast, Lunch, or Dinner somewhere on a whim
- Visits to Museums, National Parks/Monuments,
- Fly to a Minnesota town to attend an event such as a car show, fly-in, air-show
- Hiking and Camping Excursions
- Golf Outing
- Or just Stamp Collecting (MN-DOT Passport)

I will be working out the bugs in the method of announcing events by seeing what works and what doesn't, with feedback from everyone who attends, or those who couldn't attend but wants to provide some input. I hope to have a presentation prepared for February or March to show anyone interested in sending out an event how it is done. I expect that Pop-Up events might become a popular way for 2 or 3 planes to get together for a nice flight and dinner on a summer evening.

A few other notes and some items still to address

- Everyone attending will leave from their own airport, on their own timeline, and meet at the event location, based on the time of the invitation.
 - One thing I have learned from managing resources, and attending gatherings is we all have our own clock. No one should be forced to adjust his/her own personal preparation or plans based on other people's clocks. That is why I feel that the event starts at the destination.
- All scheduled events will be subject to change based on weather and forecasts. I will try to develop a procedure for alternate dates, cancellation, or delay's based on the invite service being used.
- I will try to use hyperlinks (Website addresses) within the invitation to allow easy access to the event being planned.
- One of the things I will request in the invite is what airport you will be leaving from and if you have an open seat. I believe that other attendees will be able to look to see if a seat is open and ride along if they are not flying themselves for any reason. Arranging seats will be done between the person needing the seat and the person with the available seat.
- Another idea I think we should implement is the use of a simple laminated sign placed in our planes when we are on the ground, simply stating we are "Members of EAA 878 Maple Lake/Buffalo." I haven't seen this before but it makes some sense to draw attention to the club as we are seen wherever we are flying.

This will be a work in progress, so please have some patience and provide feedback. I think this will be a good way to get our flying hours up and see more of what this state has to offer.

• CHAPTER 878 RV-4 BUILDER REPORT by Tom Rammel, Chapter Build Project Coordinator

Progress: The RV-4 rudder is close to being done (although that may be like saying 90% done and 90% to go)! The leading edge of the rudder is bent into a rounded shape and riveted together. This is where the hinge line is and the sheet metal was not pre bent, so it had to be done with a dowel to prevent creasing the sheet. It maybe looks more done in the picture but the fiberglass tips still need to be riveted and the aluminum sheet covering the fiberglass still needs to be dimpled. Dave and Harold have all the dimpling dies so I need to schedule some time to go over there and get it done.

I am a mentor for the Dassel Cokato high school robotics team #5348 again this year. The competition details were announced Saturday, January 7th. So now we have 6 weeks to build the robot for the competition. Since I am writing this before the 7th I don't know yet what the competition is. This is a very well kept secret so that none of the teams have an advantage. Last year I taught the team about pneumatics and it was the first time they had pneumatic cylinders on the robot. They placed 16th out of 60 teams that competed in Duluth last year. The reason that I mention this is because almost all of my time other than working full time will be spent with the robotics team.



Yes, this is in my house downstairs, but at least I covered the carpet with cardboard first. My Wife Loves Me!

I think we should order the fuselage kit directly from Vans. Harold has already spent many hours cleaning parts before he and Dave could start any assembly. Used kits get handled and stored for so long that things happen. Because of this and the fact that it is expensive to go pick up a used kit that we don't know the condition of or if all the parts are there. I recommend that we order the fuselage kit new from Vans directly.

Dave Swanson and Harold Greseth are working on the wing build. You can see in the pictures below that they are taking this very serious and not having any fun at all...NOT!!! They are having loads of fun. Don't you wish you were having this much fun?





Notes from Dave on 1/5/17: finally figuring things out! We are ready to fit wing spar to bulkhead...it should be done by the weekend. Then finish ribs. Will maybe work on flaps or aileron next. We will need parts to finish the wings.

• CHAPTER 878 FLIGHT SIMULATOR GOES TO SCHOOL by Mark Greseth

To EAA chapter 878: here is a little overview of how we are using the sim in our *Science of Flight* class. It has been a great tool and the kids love it!



9th to 12th grade Students at Woodbury Math and Science Academy were offered their first aviation elective this year. In the class, titled *Science of flight*, students explore the evolution of flight through research and building models. Students also use a flight simulator programs to design, fly and perfect aircraft designs.

In the second half of our elective, students have applied some of the information they learned to the flight simulator loaned to us by EAA Chapter 878. With the use of this simulator students are better able to apply some of the science behind flight, and to understand the controls and gauges that are found in many aircraft. Students have found it very helpful to have the actual foot and yoke controls found in aircraft and have achieved a greater understanding of what actually happens when flying a plane. To say this simulator has been a hit would be an understatement! Students are regularly asking to use the simulator to better hone their skills, and have competitions to see who can fly and land in difficult conditions or challenging locations.
