• MINUTES OF MEETING, May 8, 2013 Chapter Secretary: Wayne Flury

Meeting Program: EAA Chapter 878 gathered in the hangar of D'Shannon Aviation at the Buffalo Airport and were greeted by Scott Erickson, president of D'Shannon. Scott addressed the group at the beginning of our meeting as he reviewed the origin of the company and how it eventually became headquartered at Buffalo.

Then, with the assistance of D'Shannon employee Drew Prest, he showed and described examples of the various modifications they currently provide for Beechcraft Debonair, Bonanza and Baron aircraft. He also gave us insight to some possible future D'Shannon offerings.

Chapter Video Magazine / Chapter Leaders Academy: President Tom Rammel introduced a video, the first of an EAA "Chapter Video Magazine" that will be sent monthly to all chapters, which we watched. Tom had recently attended a Chapter Leaders Academy at Oshkosh where this new video series was unveiled and he summarized his experiences at the Academy. He noted that Chapter 878 does a lot of things right, but there were also some things we need to work on.

Tom noted a push by EAA to get back to our "roots" of the organization and to promote flying to potential pilots. He highlighted the new "Eagle Flights" program which is a

one-on-one introduction to flying for adults. Tom has some registration forms for pilots who are interested in participating. Kent Peterson inquired as to how a person (prospective pilot) would learn about the program? It has to be a person-to-person contact or networking through the EAA membership and talking about it. Don Kruse suggested to have Eagle Flight info available at our fly-in.

Chapter Pot Lucks: Tom noted that one of the things the chapter is doing "right" is to include families in chapter social events, and he noted the "Chapter Pot Lucks" that Kent Peterson is organizing. The first one is scheduled for May 25th. Kent advised he would be sending an email to chapter members as a reminder of this inaugural event.

Video Equipment Needed: Tom asked for input on how to show the chapter videos at future meetings. The video is sent to chapter presidents as a ".mov" file, and Tom had borrowed a projector (and brought a bed sheet to the meeting to use as a screen). In the future, if we want to watch the video as part of the regular meeting, we will need equipment that will show the video on something larger than a laptop screen. Does someone have a projector or a large TV, etc. they are willing to donate? No resolution...to be carried forward.

Young Eagles: Glen Morrow noted there will be a Young Eagle event on May 15 at 6:00 p.m. at Maple Lake at his hangar. A rain date is May 22. Volunteer pilots and ground school persons are needed. He also reported that Keith Smith has a number of kids that need rides. Persons who can participate are asked to contact Keith to set things up.

Treasurer's Report and Secretary's Report: as printed in the current newsletter.

Fly-In 2013 / Raffle: Wayne Flury asked for chapter commitment for our September fly-in. Agreed to schedule for Sunday, September 8. Wayne will handle publicity and will send notices to the various Calendars of Events. Elaine Morrow agreed to develop a fly-in poster. Fred Jude noted that Bob Shadduck has offered the use of the old Wright Aero hangar for our fly-in. Another option is to use Tim Bond's hangar. Fred noted that we will need to get an accurate cost of pork chops before determining meal price. Wayne noted he had contacted EAA about a possible contribution to be used in place of the "Prop Clock Raffle" of past years. Fred Jude suggested a radio controlled airplane as a raffle item. No further action.

Nametags: Wayne circulated two examples of a new chapter nametag, with the recently updated logo. Members approved the 1 ¼" x 3" size. These are available with a pin backing for \$6.50 each or a magnet backing for \$7.00 each. Nametags to be provided by the chapter for all members. Wayne will send an email to chapter members requesting proper name spelling and pin backing preference.

Miscellaneous: Kent Peterson asked about access to the chapter's tables and chairs that are currently stored in the old Wright Aero hangar, as he needs tables and chairs to use for the monthly pot lucks. Fred said he has a key to the hangar. Glen Morrow noted that there are several hangars available for us to use as a meeting place.

• EAGLE FLIGHTS by Wayne Flury

There were some questions about the EAA Eagle Flight program at the last meeting, so here's a synopsis of the program from the EAA website (<u>http://www.eaa.org/eagleflights/</u>). In short, Eagle Flights are an introductory flight experience for adults. This is for people who tell you, "I've always wanted to fly."

Similar to the Young Eagles program, this is a flight experience offered by EAA member pilots. It is to be free of charge to the Eagle Flight participant, and they should experience the full range of flying, including preflight, take off, cruise (maybe to a breakfast?), navigation and landing.

Persons who are interested in the program can learn about it from the EAA website (perhaps they are directed there by an internet search or from advertising), and might then contact the local chapter. Or, perhaps you overhear someone saying they would like to try flying. If so, grab them (not literally) and a registration form and head for the airport! But, be ready to answer questions!

There is a webinar on the EAA site if you really need more answers about the program.

Get Eagle Flight registration forms directly from EAA (to register the prospective new pilot and EAA member), or Tom Rammel has some.

FLORIDA REPORT

Ed. Note: Joe sent this report and photo too late for last month's newsletter, so you will have to disregard the comments about winter!

It looks like winter is grudgingly leaving Minnesota, the love-bug season is beginning here and humidity is moving into Florida, so it must be time to head back to Maple Lake. I won't be back in time to make the May meeting, but will surely make the following meetings for the next several months. It is nice to be out of the winter cold, but it is also unfortunate that I have missed so many good meetings and activities with the club. I know all of you feel my pain!

It is especially gratifying to see we have gained several new members. I am looking forward to meeting each of them and to welcome them to the club. I know that if we continue to offer the activities and learning experiences that keep interests up, we will continue to gain new members throughout the years.

I haven't been totally out of the aviation loop. I didn't bring my Glastar to Florida this year, so I treated myself to a floatplane rating at the Jack Brown Seaplane base in Winter Haven, Florida. For those unfamiliar with the Jack Brown operation, this is its 50th year of operation and is now run by Jack's son Ron Brown. Ron is the chief pilot and FAA Flight Examiner. He has several instructors from the northern states and Alaska that come down to Florida to work part time for him each winter. My instructor was a retired Northwest pilot from Chisago Lakes, MN.

My training consisted of two days of intensive flight training beginning with a one-hour ground school to cover any questions from the pre-work study guide that was provided. We had about three and half hours of flight time following the ground school and about one half-hour of ground to end the first day. My training was in a

J-3 cub, which I had never been in before and was a blast, except for trying to peer over the instructor from the rear seat.

We took off the next day at 7:30 and flew until lunch at noon. I was signed off for my check ride that afternoon and promptly failed my first attempt by not being ready for an engine out test. One must always know where is the best place to land in case of emergency and sometimes it is the lake behind you. After an hour of follow-up flight training and the addition of a 4-inch seat cushion, I was again signed off for my check ride. This time I passed all my maneuvers and got signed off as an official Single Engine Sea pilot. I can honestly say it was one of my most fun flying experiences. I don't think I am ready



to put floats on my plane, but I certainly will look into renting an hour of recurrent training once in a while.

I also attended the Sun-n-Fun fly-in again this year and hooked up with Wayne, Glen, and Elaine while I was there. I believe attendance was as good or a little better than last year in spite of not having the armed forces flying that is normally scheduled. I visited the seaplane base and though not very large, there was several interesting vintage seaplanes represented. SeaRey experimental and certified amphibians were well represented also. Several exhibitors were not represented or had reduced sized exhibits due to the rising cost of Sun-n-Fun fees.

I most recently took a couple of hours of training on the Redbird simulator based on the G1000 panel. It was my first encounter with a glass cockpit and it was somewhat difficult for me to get used to the display. In spite of the transition from the six-pack environment, I was still able to get my instrument proficiency sign-off completed. It would be neither practical nor cost effective to change out my instruments for a glass cockpit, but I wouldn't hesitate to buy an airplane that has one installed.

Speaking about airplanes, I am anxious to get back into mine and get into the Wright county skies.
