**MEETING MINUTES**

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**14 JUNE 2022**

Meeting was called to order by President Tim Miller at 1900. There were eight members present, and two guests. Welcome Malcolm Case to the fold.

- ◆ Minutes from previous meeting were reviewed and approved as written.
- ◆ Treasurer’s report indicated \$1888.48 in the bank account. Report approved as read.
- ◆ Plaques were presented to Sam Fisher and Dale Primrose to honor them for achieving Private Pilot status; and, welcome to the Chapter.
- ◆ Tim reviewed his efforts to move forward with the 501c3 filing. A tax number needs to be filed with the paperwork, so a search is being conducted to locate that document in the chapter archives.
- ◆ We had short report on the success of the Young Eagles Day flying activity. Twenty nine youth were flown by four pilots. Thanks to all chapter members who participated in the event, as well as wives Kay and Janet.
- ◆ There was discussion of the Fly In Breakfast proposed for Sunday, 24 July at the Norfolk Airport. The menu was finalized, and advertising will move forward with facebook and other social media platforms, as well as posters for nearby airports. Time is slotted at 0730 to 1100. It was suggested to offer tickets for sale, in advance, to bolster sales and make tracking a bit easier.
- ◆ Menu for the FIB is pancakes, cheese omelets, sausage, biscuit and gravy with Tang, coffee, margarine, syrup (sugar/sugar-free). Pilot in command to eat free; others \$9; children under 12, \$5. For more info, contact Tim Miller.
- ◆ Our safety discussion this month centered on poor pilot decision making before the airplane even left the ground. We reviewed the October 1935 crash of the prototype Boeing B-17, as the aircraft took off with the elevator control lock in place. Recently, an RV-8 owner was killed when he took off with the control stick strapped firmly full aft with the rear seat belt. Three hints to help prevent such senseless crashes:
  1. Pay attention when pre-flying, especially if there are distractions;
  2. Make a full control check before taking the active runway;
  3. Assure sterile cockpit during all operations in vicinity of an airport.



She is ready to put back together for the most part. The only thing that needs to be done is some wiring for a couple of new digital instruments that are going in. A new all in one digital clock, timer, G meter, temperature gage, and a new four-cylinder EGT-CHT gage. They have been installed but need to be wired. I am hoping to get it here soon so that I can finish everything up at the same time. We'll see...


