

Bob was one of the original founders of EAA (Experimental Aircraft Association) and went to every single Oshkosh AirVenture, only missing this year, 2018. Bob was beloved by SO MANY, but especially his friends here at Chapter 95. He was a source of information and stories and we all loved talking to him and learning from him. Bob will definitely be missed!

Robert W Bushby "Bob", age 91, passed away on Sunday, October 14, 2018 at the Joliet Area Community Hospice Home. Born in Joliet on February 24, 1927 to the late Merritt L. And Esther G. (nee Gallop) Bushby.

He was a proud US Air Force veteran during W.W. II. He was a self-employed designer and builder of experimental aircraft. He designed his own version of the Mustang I and Mustang II after the P-51 Mustang which is widely regarded as the finest all-around piston-engined fighter of World War II to be produced in significant numbers. He was a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association.

Preceded in death by his parents, Merritt and Esther Bushby; two brothers, Merritt and John; and one sister, Gwendolyn.

Survived by his loving wife of 44 years, Sharon (nee Blake) Bushby; three children, Wesley (Christi) Bushby, Paula Bushby and Sandra Bushby; two step-children, John (Jackie) Blake and Kim (Stephen) Seth; four grandchildren; one brother, Harvey Bushby; and by numerous nieces and nephews.

Doug Harford's Flying Journey - Leading to Float Flying... and Gliders

Mark, Mike, and I have been asked about our float flying adventure which was awesome, but I would like to talk about the journey that led there and the people who made it happen.

I learned to fly in Dwight where they had a very active Flying Farmers Chapter. Dwight Aero was a Cessna Dealer, flight school, and charter business. Dave Constantine, the owner, invited me to fly with him to the Farm Progress Show and the seed was planted. Bill Morrison taught me to fly there.

The Flying Farmer Chapter Members were buying airplanes and flying to breakfast like we do now. They eventually mounted a group trip into Central America. I was learning to fly then and that was a powerful incentive to keep going. I wanted to make that trip! By the time I learned to fly, got a few trips under my belt, decided I needed an instrument rating, enough time had passed the Flying Farmers had moved from airplanes to Buicks. Now being more on my own I took trips with my family exploring Canada and some to the south and west US. Deb's parents moved to Arkansas, so that gave us a place to fly, but the group was gone. Then I sold the 182 to end a failing partnership and decided at age 58 I was done with trips and bought a powered parachute and joined that group. Not satisfied with that experience, I tried gyrocopters and that group. The gyro group was made up of guys my age flying gyros, but you couldn't go anywhere with a gyro.

So, one night sitting on my gyro at Curanda discussing dreams and such, Cindy tells me about a 182 for sale. Scott and I bought that 182 and the journey got back on track! Thank you, Scott! Our flying group took me camping at Oshkosh where I met a guy that said I could fly to the Bahamas! That year we were so excited with the Bahama experience we joined a group that was flying to Central America! Deb and I few to Mexico, landing in Cozumel and Compeche (a personal dream of mine) and met the group in Belize and Guatemala. I finally made it to Central America!! Gary and I flew to Alaska the next summer for an adventure of a lifetime!

What does any of this have to do with float plane flying? Its about the role all of you play in my adventure, Bruce and Cindy telling me to buy that plane and then facilitating it all. Matt and Jana taking me camping at Oshkosh. Gary saying let's go to Alaska. It was at Oshkosh that Mike, Mark, and I bought a seaplane! With out this group, none of this exists! It is not taken away, it just never exists. You all make life and dreams happen in ways you will never know.

Back to Bush Pilot Training as we like to refer to it, (because it sounds much better than "Getting your ASES Rating). I could write a report, but it would never express how much closer we all become when we have the support of friends and shared adventure to build friendships!

Let's continue the journey together! Saturday come to Dwight and cheer Nick on as he flies our new Grob Glider!

It's about all of you, my friends, the shared journey, Flying Farmers, Blue Sky Aero, and Chapter 95! That's my learning from Bush Pilot Training in the Boundary Waters!

The wild blue yonder

Local EAA chapter gives local kids a chance to touch the sky

MORRIS – Seven-year-old Kaija Johnson received the surprise of her life Saturday when her mother pulled off Route 47 into the Morris Airport.

"I didn't tell her until we got here,

I went out on a limb to surprise her," said Kaija's mother, Samantha Johnson.

Kaija soon found out her mother, who saw a flyer at Saratoga Elementary School, registered her to take a free plane ride in a kit built plane.



"I didn't know the next time she would be able to sit in a two-seat plane. How many 7-year-olds can say they sat in one?" Johnson said.

On Saturday, about 60 children, ages 8 to 17, took part in the Experimental Aircraft Association Chapter 95 Young Eagles Rally where pilots donated their time and fuel to take the children into the air for a 10-minute ride at no cost to the participant.

"We want to encourage kids who are interested in flying. There is a shortage of pilots, don't know if people realize that there is a need for pilots. This gives them experience in a small plane and hopefully encourages youth to want to fly in the future," event coordinator Jacqueline Nawojski said.

The event originally was scheduled for Sept. 8, but was called off because of unfavorable weather.

However, two hours into the event Sept. 22, once again flights were halted because of wind. After a short break, pilot Ron Needham took up his plane to test and came back with an all-clear sign.

Pilot Jana Trofimchuck said this opportunity gives children an introduction to aviation, and the pilots enjoy it because it allows them to share their own passions with others.

"We share our passion for aviation."

A lot of kids never get a chance to fly in a small plane; this is our way to give back. We want to ignite a passion in kids," Trofimchuck said.

Andrew Rickman, 12, of Morris was given this experience as an early birthday present by his mother, and when he got out of the Velocity Experimental plane piloted by Needham, he was all smiles as EAA Chapter 95 member John Limbach helped him out of the plane.

"It was good. I want to do it 10 times," Rickman said.

Shelly Felber said her 13-year-old son, William Felber, had a passion for planes and interest in being a pilot.

Saturday was William's first time in a small plane; he had only ridden in large commercial planes, his mother said.

After the ride, he played it cool and said it was fun, but then said, "It was awesome, it was bumpy at first, but I got used to it. I would do it again, yes."

Limbach, who has a plane in the process of being built, helped out at the event.

"When you see a smile wrapped ear to ear on one of these kids, it's priceless. There are too many negatives in life; we have to find a positive," he said.

The EAA Chapter 95 out of the Morris Airport hosts the free rides twice a year, one in the fall and one in the spring.

The EAA headquarters in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, gives the chapter an incentive to host the event. In turn, the chapter uses the money to send children interested in aviation to an air academy at the headquarters.

Nawojski said the event usually averages 40 to 80 children along with eight or nine pilots. Each participant received a certificate and logbook to show they have flown.

Some children have come back repeatedly and become EAA Junior members, which starts about age 12.

At that time, they can apply for a scholarship for the air academy event in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

The next Young Eagles Rally will be held in June at the Morris Airport, just north of town on Route 47.

Most events require advance registration in order to accommodate the children and pilots.

Robert Bushby

Robert "Bob" Bushby (born February 24, 1927) is an aircraft mechanic and aviator who designed the Bushby Mustang II, later called the Mustang Aeronautics Mustang II. He was born in Joliet, Illinois, and started to learn to fly while in high school in Minooka, Illinois.

Life and career

Bob's interest in airplanes started in grade school and at age ten he had his first airplane ride in a Ford Trimotor. His family moved to Minooka, Illinois in 1941. His first solo flight was in a Piper J-3 Cub in 1943 and he graduated from high school in 1944. During his military service he attended aircraft maintenance school at Keesler Field in Biloxi, Mississippi, followed by time on Guam in the 4th Emergency Rescue Squadron as a B-17 Flight engineer. In 1948 Bob graduated from the Lewis College in Lockport, Illinois aircraft maintenance course as an A&E mechanic (now referred to as "A&P" for Airframe and Powerplant) and later added the Inspection Authorization rating. In 1950 he earned his Commercial pilot license and in 1954, his Multi-engine rating. From 1955 until 1970 Bob worked for the Sinclair Oil Co. in their engine research laboratory.^[1] Robert Wesley Bushby passed away on October 14, 2018 in Joliet, Illinois at age 91.[2]

EAA

Bob was one of the original founders of the Experimental Aircraft Association in 1953, with EAA number 26. He is Technical Counselor number 20 and has attended every EAA national convention from 1953 through 2016. Bob was an early member of EAA Chapter 15, in 1956 was instrumental in forming EAA Chapter 95 and later contributed to the formation of EAA Chapter 260. He conducted metal aircraft building forums at the Rockford and Oshkosh EAA fly-ins for 25 years.[3]

Mustangs

The FAA pre-cover inspection of the first wing of his prototype Midget Mustang was January, 1953. Bob built his prototype version of the Midget, N15J, and first flew it on September 9, 1959. [4] In 1959 he purchased the rights to the Midget Mustang and began to sell prints for the M-I. In San Antonio, Texas he built six Midget Mustang aircraft. In 1963 he began work on a two place design based on the Midget Mustang. In 1965 the first ever Mustang II (N1117M) was brought to the EAA convention at Rockford (by trailer) and in 1966 the prototype was flown K to the convention.^[5] For the next 26 years Bushby Aeronautics sold plans and kits for the Mustang II. In March, 1992 Mustang Aeronautics, Inc. acquired the design rights from Robert Bushby for both the Midget Mustang and Mustang II aircraft. [6] At the Homebuilder's Dinner at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2016, Bob received special recognition from the EAA commemorating 50 successful years of his Mustang II design.^[7]
