## **President's Message:**

My fellow EAA'ers,

You all know about our long-planned celebration of flight, "Instead-O-KOSH," originally intended to be held during the last weekend of the cancelled AirVenture in August. Developments of the pandemic caused this local gathering to be postponed, into the then-distant month of November. Surely things would have settled by then, right?

Then we decided to tie our event to the Warriors and Warbirds show in Monroe, due to be held the weekend before our event at Unity. If they ran, we ran, and if they cancelled, we'd cancel.

Then last week they cancelled.

And your board got together and we discussed. And two things became very clear. First, the Monroe folks expressed extremely strong disappointment in their cancellation, which seemed to be driven mostly by the expected attendance, and the gatherings along a flight line. Second, it became very clear that we are not Warriors and Warbirds.

Both SC and NC are lifting restrictions. It was not, however, enough for the Monroe planners to allow the show to run. It seems our positions now illustrate the difference between IOK and Monroe. They were expecting thousands. We were expecting dozens. They would have a flight line where there would be little opportunity to maintain a social distance, where we would have lots of room for that. The NC documents I've found allowed for gatherings up to 300, and SC indicates 250. And further, South Carolina now allows 100% capacity at restaurants.

Anything we would do at our event would pretty clearly fit within the SC guidelines (I actually found a SC proclamation to this effect, dated Oct 2!) Additionally, the owners of the airfield have expressed a desire to go ahead with the event.

Besides, it looks like we are in good company. Many of the Carolina traditional fly-ins are running. Pageland is on, Laney's and York both ran last week, and I believe there is something fairly local every weekend in October. It seems there is a strong desire to make this event happen. We as a board, therefore, have decided to go ahead with the "Instead-O-KOSH" event to be held at Unity Aerodrome the weekend of the 13th of November, just over a month away.

But we have made some changes. It will now be a two-day, one-night affair, rather than the two-night shindig we originally planned. So, the new and improved IOK will be held Friday the 13th of November (and we'll openly flout the old wives' tales), and continue into a breakfast, then a traditional fly-in at Unity on Saturday the 14th. Still on the schedule is dinner, a movie, and flour bombing on Saturday.

So, we have work to do! Watch your email! Check your SPAM folder! If you aren't receiving the emails from Dick and Emma, please reach out. Those who were originally scheduled to work on committees will continue. And for those of you who would like to volunteer, we would love to have you! Time to start planning!
