Most of us remember the uncommonly—and sometimes wickedly—insightful musings of a giant in the aviation world, Gordon Baxter. His regular article "Bax Seat" in Flying magazine entertained a whole generation of pilots. "Bax," as he was called, wrote of the human interest side of aviation. He tackled embarrassing moments, first-time mistakes, and even, on occasion, took us to task for things we should be doing better.

But in one of his most penetrating moments, he offered this little gem. "Flying is kinda like taking a bath—it is best done alone. But if you must have another person involved, you get picky about who!" I certainly misquoted him, but you get the idea!

I know we can all relate to this—the flying part, not the bath. I know we have all had friends (or heaven forbid, other pilots) we have had along in the cockpit that, after the flight, we regret even offering. Of course, none of US have ever been "That Guy" (in the generic sense) who someone else had remorse over an invitation to come fly with them. Not US! Never!

But Bax misses one very salient point. Our society loves to associate. We love to have others share the experiences we have. We love, especially, to have others discover the joy that flying gives us. We look for clear, smooth days to invite that newbie. We avoid showing them just how far along our snap rolls or lomcovaks have progressed. We DO avoid that, right?

This is a trait common to all cultures, I feel, but a trait raised to high standard by the British, from whom we get a large part of our culture. Winston Churchill said that the US and the UK were two countries "separated by a common language." I spent a large part of my graduate studies investigating why the British did NOT invent the airplane, even though British inventors and scientists had many of the elements already figured out, like dihedral, a cruciform tail with a negative angle of attack, and had reasonably efficient airfoils. The aileron had even been patented in England in 1866!

A major reason for this was their love for "associations." That might seem something helpful rather than not, but the class system, in their case, worked against it. The "scientists," all upper class, talked to the "scientists" and the "technicians," who were predominantly middle class, talked with the "technicians." Neither talked to the other.

Luckily, we have found ways to bridge these gaps. For flying, EAA is a huge one. The annual explosion of enthusiasm that is Oshkosh both fuels and extinguishes the fire. Good ideas catch on fast. Bad ones don't. Promising new technologies endure and proliferate. Dead ends quietly disappear.

Left with no explosion this year, and needing one, your board is seriously considering something local. An Oshkosh Consolation Prize, so to speak. This is still early in the planning stages, but we're looking at a Friday-to-Saturday event. Burgers and movie Friday and pancakes and flour bombing on Saturday. So if we can't get the explosion, as least we can cause a few bangs here and there! Stay tuned!

We WILL get back to normal. But we need something to look forward to! And I can't wait to see y'all when that time comes!

Our thanks to all those folks for giving us our roots! As we have discussed at prior meetings and in earlier newsletters, we are in the process of converting our current non-profit status into a 501(c)3 corporation. One of our primary reasons for doing this is that 501(c)3 status allows individuals and corporate donors to deduct their donations from their personal and corporate taxes.

We've already had some promises of significant donations of materials applicable to our purpose. Hopefully we will be able to secure them with benefit to all.

The Ninety-Nines, Inc. International Organization of Women Pilots

The Ninety-Nines, Inc. is an international organization of women pilots in more than 40 countries. While the majority of members live in the US, the organization has been international since its founding. It was was founded November 2, 1929, at Curtiss Field, Valley Stream, Long Island, New York. All 117 women pilots at the time were invited to assemble for mutual support, the advancement of aviation, and a central office to keep files on women in aviation. Louise Thaden was elected secretary and worked to keep the group together as they struggled to establish themselves and to grow. In 1931, Amelia Earhart was elected the first president and the group selected the name "Ninety-Nines" to represent the 99 charter members. Membership was open immediately to other The Ninety-Nines' mission in women as they became licensed pilots. the fields of aviation and aerospace is primarily educational and mentoring. Every year the organization offers two scholarship awards to qualifying applicants.

The Ninety Nines are organized into 10 "sections" i.e. Southeast Section, Southwest Section etc. Each Section is divided into Chapters. The organization is International with Sections and Chapters around the world. I belong to the Carolinas Chapter which along with Tennessee and Florida Chapters, are the first chartered chapters. Carolinas Chapter was chartered June 19, 1940. The Carolinas Chapter meets the 3rd Saturday of each month at Stanley County Airport KVUJ. One of our projects is painting the traditional Ninety–Nine compass rose on the field. Most recently we completed a compass rose at Rutherford County Airport, KFQD. For a flying trip go check it out. They are a VERY cordial airport.

This June, one of our members will be presented the Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award. She has an amazing flying history. In her early twenties she set an altitude record for a J3 Super Cub of 26,875 ft. Mr. Piper was present for the event. Our chapter has much interesting history.

We welcome all women pilots to join.

We are doing a feasibility study of building 8 to 10 T-hangars at the Unity Aerodrome. The hangars and the airport runway would be owned by a LLC, which is in turn owned by the participants. Each participant would own or lease one or more individual hangars and be responsible for their prorata share of runway and common area maintenance/upkeep.

As the airport is in Lancaster county, the taxes on your airplane and hangar should be significantly less than the same size hangar at Rock Hill. As the property is to be owned, not leased, your ability to sell your hangar in the future is enhanced.
