County Airport. Guntly Memorial is a nice grass strip airport. There were a few planes tied down here that seemed to be long time residents. We chatted with Thomas Guntly for a bit and then we were off to Sylvania. Paul landed first on the grass runway and because of his report of rough conditions, the rest of us landed on asphalt. A little to our surprise, no one was around at Sylvania. Sylvania Airport is very popular for the Skydive Midwest Skydiving Center. There were several big Piper Caravans parked there that are used by the Skydiving Center.

Next stop was Batten International Airport in Racine WI. This airport has a Customs Area in the terminal building. I suspect that back in the day, this airport must have had International Air traffic? Some local law enforcement

Ben, a member of EAA chapter 838 took us into the museum. The Wall of Visitors is one of several very nice displays. This airport has a rich history of hosting some famous flyers. John Moody's Easy Riser was on display along with several

very nice restorations. Alfred W. Lawson was featured here as an airplane manufacturer and aviation pioneer!

Kenosha Regional Airport was our next stop, and after a stamp and go we were off to Camp Lake Airport. Elliott is the new owner of this nice airstrip located in Trevor very near the WI and IL border. Elliott was very excited to

see 4 airplanes arrive in a group just to get a stamp. We visited with Elliott and his mother, who were both busy cleaning up the years of accumulation from the former owner. Elliott was very familiar with central and northern WI, his folks have a vacation place in Three Lakes. He makes a living as a Jet mechanic in Waukegan Illinois.

Bigfoot Airfield in Walworth was our next stop. A local pilot was working on his airplane there and we borrowed his truck for a trip into town for lunch. Small airports seem to have some of the nicest people! Returning from lunch we toured another hanger where we saw 2 very nice Gyrocopters. Lake Lawn Airport in Delavan was our next stop. Grand Geneva Airport was a nice setting with the airport on top of a ridge surrounded by the golf course. Stamp and go to Burlington Municipal Airport. East Troy Airport was our next fuel stop and then off to Palmyra. We landed on a beautiful grass strip at Palmyra. Stamp and go. Gutzmer's Twin Oaks Airport in Whitewater was our next

flying hang gliders. There was a local plane there that towed the gliders to altitude for the release and return to earth. A nice fire ring with benches and several covered
