We are really getting on a roll here with our summer stamp collecting. Adventure number 5 happened on July 31st, 2020 with the starting airport being the Merrill Municipal Airport. Meet up time is 8 am in order to give Larry Gordon a chance to arrive from his home base of Wild Rose. Larry arrived shortly after 8 and with a call from Paul Buss it was decided he would meet us at the Tomahawk airport. Lyle Banser, Larry Gordon and myself departed for Tomahawk and upon landing were greeted by Paul and Brandon Buss who had flown up from Fond du Lac to join today's trip. Stamp and go at Tomahawk. then off to the Rhinelander Oneida Co. Airport. While at Rhinelander we discussed today's route and after a cookie and stamp it was off to Noble F. Lee Memorial Field in Minocqua. Lakeland airport is another name used to describe this nice port just north of Minocqua. Off next to Manitowish Waters Airport where upon landing on the grass runway we were greeted by hundreds of grasshoppers. This airport has a really nice terminal

building and the area is quite a tourist attraction with the Manitowish chain of lakes. There was even a biplane selling rides.

From Manitowish Waters we called Joey Salaja in Boulder Junction so he would meet us there with the stamp.
