John Schwister Historical Marker

This Historical Marker was dedicated to John Schwister on Saturday June 6, 1998 at Rothschild Park in recognition of flying Wisconsin's First Home-Built Flying Machine.



WISCONSIN'S FIRST HOME-BUILT FLYING MACHINE

On June 23, 1911, near this location, Wausau native John Schwister became a pioneer of Wisconsin aviation. Research indicates that on this date Schwister flew the state's first home built airplane capable of sustained, powered flight. Constructed of wooden ribs covered with fight cotton cloth and powered by an early-model aircraft engine, Schwister's biptane flew for several hundred feet at a maximum affitude of twenty feet. Calling his plane the Minnesota-Badger, Schwister began the design and construction of his "flying machine" in St. Paul, Minnesota, but finished it in Flothschild, Wisconsin. Initially, Schwister flight-tested his biplane as a glider, towing it behind an automobile like a kite. He also built his own airplane hanger here. Schwister made many flights in 1911, including a 27-mile flight in which he soured to 2,000 feet, higher than nearby Rib Mountain. In 1912, Schwister was seriously injured in a plane crash, yet he continued to construct and fly his own airplanes making him Wisconsin's first successful "home-builder."

A TOURNEY THROUGH THE PROMISED LAND TO PARADISE CITY

(Day 6 April 22nd)*

There is so much to see at Sun-N-Fun that we were running all over to get in what we could. I spent a lot of time working on the C gearbox from the GT-500 that had spun a bearing and with help from vendors like South Mississippi and Lockwood the problem was fixed.

Phil checked out the UL area and the Vintage airplanes that interested him. Jack visited with friends in the Powered Parachute area and along with Phil assisted with some repairs on our 3 machines. Gordy and Rich were on a mission to find a new headset for Gordy for the trip home. Rich and Gordy returned with a new David Clark headset and a new electric starter for the Chinook. All repairs and pre-flight was done as we watched the evening ultralight flying session. There were Chub members and friends that stopped by to congratulate us on our trip and to wish us well for the return flight.

(Day 7 April 23rd)

With the weather checked at Flight Service and the UL briefing at 6:30 am we were ready for the first leg of the return to our wonderful Wisconsin. Liftoff was at 7:14 and as Paradise City faded out of sight we all talked of the short but special time we had there. Our first leg was to Ocala and for the first time on this trip we encountered headwinds. The winds were out of the north at about 20 and it seemed that we were standing still. Ocala was 80 miles from Lakeland and it took us about 2 hours to get there. Rich was burning the most gas and he didn't have enough fuel to make Ocala so he set down in a big field and I flew back to bring him gas. Back at Ocala Rich changed jets to try to reduce fuel burn and we were off to Lake City Fla. On this leg of the trip the headwinds persisted and the thermals kicked in, what a bumpy ride! As soon as Rich landed he was checking things out for he had developed some engine problems on this last leg. He and Gordy tried different things to no avail. At about 3:00 p.m. the difficult decision was made to pack up the Sport for a ride home on the truck. Our friends Paul and Sue Buss had made the offer that if we had problems they would be available to haul a plane home for us. Jack and Phil were called to help and in short order the plane was packed and rolling north. Gordy and I said our farewell to Rich and continued toward home. We made it to Perry-Houston Ga. and tied down for the night. A call to the motorhome told of our location and the happy crew met us about 10:00 p.m.

(Day 8 April 24th)

We woke early to get a jump on the day but during our preflight it was discovered that the oil tank bracket on the GT was broke. To the rescue were my mechanics Jack and Phil who did a temporary repair and we were off again. For the whole day Gordy and I flew with little or no wind to speak of so our ground speed remained about 70 mph. We called the motorhome at each stop and was pleased to know they were also making good time. The most beautiful part of the trip was midday as we flew through the Smokie Mountains of Tenn. If you remember that on the way down we had overcast conditions, but today it was bright sunshine and calm winds. The mountains were spectacular and the valleys green with life. The lure of the green valleys was too much to resist, so down we went to get a real bird's eye view of the Tenn. backcountry. We pushed on through the day and when we set down we were back in familiar surroundings as we landed back at our friends, Lloyd and Nancy Brewer. We made 550 miles today and loved every minute except after landing I bent the nosewheel of the GT so we had more repairs to make. After supper Lloyd and Gordy helped to heat and straighten the fork and by this time the ground crew was there to help with the re-assembly. A successful day was had by all.

(Day 9 April 25th)

The wake up call was for 5:30 am and we knew we had a storm coming in from last night's weather report. After a wonderful breakfast it was out to the planes for preflight and departure. We lifted off about 6:40 and headed for Danville III. At Danville the weather radar showed the rain to be about 20 miles away so we gassed up and headed north. We had smooth air and about 25 mph on the tail so we really made good time to Dekalb Ill. We then called the motorhome to report of our progress and they had been driving in rain for a couple of hours now. We departed Dekalb with a lead on the ground crew of a couple of hours and northbound to Wisconsin was our chant. The trip was going surprisingly well when the wheels fell off, so to speak. Just north of Janesville WI. Gordy encountered a failing engine and made a precautionary landing in a field. He suspected that he had lead fouling from 100 avgas and changed the plugs. I circled Gordy and shortly after takeoff he encountered the same problem again but this time was able to land at a private strip 2 miles away. After some trouble shooting it was determined that the CDI box had failed. Gordy borrowed a CDI from the GT and the problem was solved. We were ready to depart for Portage when the GT wouldn't start. After some fiddling with the float levels in the carbs and a couple of other adjustments we were on the way. I was now flying for the first time with only 1 ignition, but Gordy and Rich had always had only 1 so I decided to make the best of it and not worry. Portage airport greeted us with another 20 mph crosswind landing that once again tested our skills. After landing the springs from the steerable nosewheel of the GT had let loose so another half hour fix had to be done. We called the motorhome to find out that with our minor breakdowns they had made up all the lost time and we were together again. As we left Portage the wind was quite strong from the east, but it was smooth at altitude and a tailwind besides. Next stop was AUW the Wausau Downtown Airport where we call home. As we approached the Airport we could see a large crowd gathered to welcome us back. After a fly-by and wave Gordy and I setup for landing. It was a great feeling to be back home to the cheers of good friends and family. Bill Markstrum had the checkered flag to wave us in and unofficially Gordy crossed the finish line first. The stories were told to eager listeners and the memories we have will last a lifetime!
