Performance Take Offs

The sun is setting and it is time to get back to home base. Suddenly the runway you landed on is not as long as you thought and it also seems to be a lot rougher. You told your significant other you would be home an hour ago. All of your fixed wing buddies are behind you waiting for you to get off the ground. Time for a Performance Take Off.

You have your engine at idle and the pre-rotator is engaged - this is where a performance take off differs from normal. Time to use your hands and feet and a few more. Holding brakes on and advancing the throttle the rotors become a blur and you can no longer count the rotor rpm. Easing the stick to full back, continue to advance the throttle. Depending on your brakes, the runways surface, and thrust, you will probably still need more braking power by using your feet. At this point you have used up every hand, foot, and elbow you have for brake, throttle, prerotator, foot brakes and control stick. The gyro at this point is about ready to hemorrhage and still hasn't moved. Basically your trying to make the Gyro behave as a helicopter by powering the rotors, remember the faster you get the rotors going the shorter the take off roll. You have now reached a point where you can't get any more out of your pre-rotator and its time to release the brakes and start the take off roll. As soon as you release your brakes (foot and mechanical) you notice the Gyro wants to yaw to the right. This is because of the torque applied to the rotors by your prerotator. You must correct this yaw by immediately applying left rudder to hold the Gyro straight on the runway. Stick is full back and the pre-rotator is still engaged. You should be at about full throttle and rolling down the runway at a good rate of speed. As soon as your nose wheel lifts off the ground release the pre-rotator and now you have gone from

a helicopter (powered rotors) back to a Gyro (unpowered rotors). The torque to the right is now eliminated and left rudder pressure can be relieved. At this point you have relieved some workload from your appendages and the Gyro should start balancing on the main wheels. The takeoff roll will be significantly shorter than a normal takeoff. Continue to gain airspeed and rotor rpm until you can climb out safely. It all sounds a bit confusing, technical, overwhelming, and difficult. This is all true but not really. Once you have performed this takeoff a few times it does become easier. Because this technique does put more strain on the pre-rotator and rotorhead, it should not be performed often. Next month I will try to cover more fun things you can do with a Gyro. If you are interested your comments and questions are welcome.

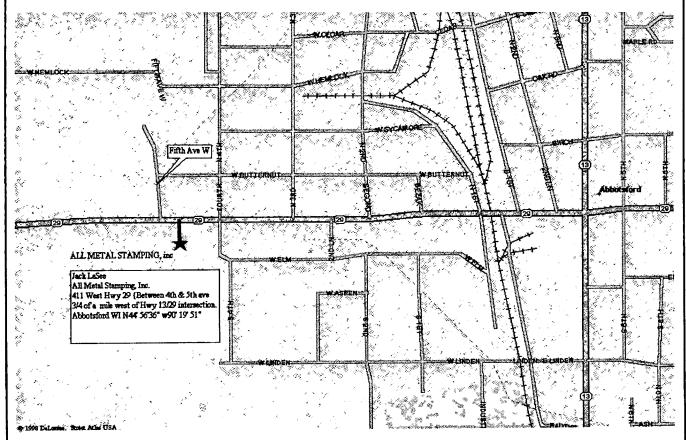
