John Schwister Marker Dedication

You will recall from the May newsletter, that the historical marker honoring Wisconsin's first airplane homebuilder, John Schwister, was to be dedicated in Rothschild on June 6th. The weather was overcast, windy and with showers but the National Guard had set up a tent for the attendees, about seventy strong. Bob Wylie, the prime mover behind this marker placement, was the master of ceremony, introducing relatives of John Schwister, Michael Goc the author of Forward in Flight, and other dignitaries involved in the marker placement. When the group left the tent to unveil the marker, I called in the previously arranged fly-over. With Dan Marlenga as flight leader, Paul Buss right wingman and Steve Norris left, the group made two, low, formation passes over the site to the cheers of all present. The Schwister relatives were especially pleased with this aerial salute to aviation pioneer, John. I add my thanks to those of Bob Wylie for your significant contribution to this historic moment, Dan, Paul and Steve.
