
Dylan Fricke made a sweet video for the IG. Check it out <u>here</u>.

TRAINING AND EDUCATION

There is an opportunity to fly into the Las Trancas (17CL) Private Airport on the coast north of Watsonville.

The Recreational Aviation Foundation (RAF) signed an agreement with the lumber company to keep their private airport open. You need to go to their website (theraf.org) to get a pilot briefing and sign the liability wavier. I

have been a member of the RAF for at least 10 years, and they are a great organization.



The airport is 25 nm on a heading of 282 from KWVI.

The strip can have a lot of wind shear and rotor on short final when the wind is blowing. I landed on RWY 32 and from the white cones marking the start of the strip to the building is 825 feet. There is approximately 300 feet more if you need it.

If you want to see a landing at Las Trancas, you can watch a video of my landing on "Jim's Husky Flying" YouTube Channel. The video name is "Rancho Murieta to Las Trancas."

The thing that I didn't do well was hold a lot of forward stick after touchdown, so the bump about mid strip bounced me into the air. After that the bounce you can see me really put in forward stick. I did a wheel landing, because it works best in the Husky and I wanted to be able to see the curve in the strip.

The day before my flight to 17CL, I went into KCPU for gas with a passenger and easily stopped in 700 feet. The combination of the uneven gravel surface and mid field bump added 125 feet to my landing.

The day I flew in there were 10 airplanes and 20 pilots there for an impromptu BBQ held by the RAF. Several pilots from KWVI drove in. One of the pilots, who flies an RV-7A from KWVI, had flown with Tim and Stan in RV air show group. I asked him about flying his 7A in and he said the strip was a little rough for the RV-7A nose wheel structure.

It is a beautiful place to land, and the RAF even has a BBQ available for pilots who want to cook something while there.
