My Eighth Month with the Ray Aviation Scholarship

This month, I took my checkride and finished my first year of college. Good news is I did well in my classes at UC Davis, bad news is I failed my checkride. Leading up to the checkride, I felt confident in my knowledge, and so did my instructor and peers. However, I was also mentally ready to pass or fail. To me, failing means I am not yet fit to be a pilot, and that I still have work to do. I would rather fail and then retake as a proficient pilot, than pass as an unsafe pilot. Approaching my checkride I did lots of group studying and felt like I knew the material in my books and the ACS. Even during my oral exam, I did well on each section, except for limitations and systems.

For limitations, I went into the exam knowing the significance of AV1ATE and ARROW. However, I was not comfortable with the physical documents and where to find them in the airplane's folder. My DPE saw me struggling with the paperwork, which is where my problem began. I managed to find all the documents, but then she asked about the plane's reoccurring AD's. I pointed them out, as well as their due dates, but did not understand the TT. When she asked, how do I know that the airplane is airworthy, even if I knew the deadline, I was at a loss. I thought the deadline was all I needed to know. After she said I would not be flying today, she said the answer she was looking for was the TT on the two reoccurring AD's. I definitely know those now.

Concerning systems, I understood my electrical and fuel systems going into the exam, but when she asked what the alternator did, I said it created the energy to be stored in the battery. However, she was also looking for the answer: it powers the bus bar.

I wish I had gotten to fly that day. I had the greasiest spot landing at the DPE's airport and I felt good about my maneuvers. My DPE went on vacation the days preceding my checkride, and would not get back until after I had left for my vacation. So, I am scheduled to retest in July. I have spent my free time on my vacation studying and going over examination questions. While I don't know what the negative impact of failing my checkride will be later in life, I know success does not come without struggle and failure. This has been a minor obstacle in a much bigger journey for me. I am not discouraged from becoming a great pilot, and hopefully great astronaut someday. This has been great practice falling down and getting back up again.

A huge thanks to all scholarship coordinators and contributors for making this opportunity possible. It is truly changing lives.

Stan's Report

It is with great pleasure I share with you the excitement of announcing another achievement by one of EAA Vintage Chapter 25's Ray Scholars Tyler Pierson. In fact, Tyler was our very first Ray Scholar. He has been attending Sacramento City College. And working on his ratings. He did some training with me in N3062S. But not being a CFII and not able to endorse him for his instrument rating he joined the Sacramento, Flying Panthers Flying Club as a student. His instructor was Tom Jones who is a Flying Panthers instructor and the head honcho at the McClellan Aerospace Museum. Tom Taught Instrument flight with Navy Student Pilots but Tyler was his first civilian student.

Having flown with Tyler for his Private and several hours with him Foggles in place on several ILS, Localizer and VOR approaches I was certain that he was definitely up to the task if his Oral was successful. It was and completed in 1.5hrs.

Tyler's DPE was Dr. Robert Larson, CFII, DPE, 1(775) 303-3255 of Sparks, NV. He flys to various airports doing Check Rides where there is more than one Check Ride. With Tyler it was the Nut Tree Airport, Vacaville, CA. A perfect location for Celebratory milk shakes at Fenton's.

Next is his Multi Engine rating. He has teamed up with Tenley Ong who researched the least expensive and quickest way to a Multi Engine rating. Tenley found a school who has a four day course with an in house DPE in Madison, SD.

They are scheduled to start their training on July 18. The plan is to depart with the Young Eagles to Oshkosh on July 15 spending two nights in Moab, Ut exploring Arches National Park. Departing on

July 17 for Madison, SD. They will then spend 4 days learning the skills necessary to fly the Vintage Piper Apache. Coincidentally, the same aircraft I received my rating in many years ago. The rest of the crew will continue on to Oshkosh. Where we will be dropping our Young Eagle Emilio Martinez at the Air Academy Camp where he will spend 7 days in the Advanced Session #1. The rest of the group will be enjoying the lovely community of Neenah, WI and volunteering at AirVenture.

After the Multi Engine course Tyler and Tenley will be flying one of the RVs to Oshkosh to join the rest of the group. Where we will be staying in the Oshkosh University Dorms and enjoying AirVenture 2023.

Tyler has been an amazing role model and mentor in the young eagles Build and Maintain Saturday program. He worked extremely hard over the past few months to study for and pass his checkride with flying colors.

Aside from studying for his instrument, he has been helping Lina with her Cessna 170B and Tenley with her RV-6. He and Kyle worked on the engine baffing on Tenley's plane, while simultaneously studying instrument questions... talk about multitasking!!

Tyler will be flying to Oshkosh this year with a young eagle in the RV-4. He will stop in Madison, SD (KMDS) to take an accelerated multiengine course and plan to fly into KOSH as a newly multiengine-rated pilot! Tyler, you are AWESOME!
