As mentioned by our Chapter President Jim Sobolewski, our meeting was quite a success considering the pandemic. Our outstanding 5 Young Eagles gave outstanding presentations.

Tyler Pierson our Ray Foundation scholarship recipient. (Flight time logged 58.1, dual 47.7, solo flight 10.5, XCountry 12.4, night flight 3.2, and simulated instrument flight 2.7hrs). Dylan Fricke an excellent student pilot who is nearing his first solo (flight time logged 6.8). Liam Robinson is doing well and will likely solo on his birthday mid-October (flight time logged 9.8hrs). Tyler Stump is our newest Young Eagle joining our weekly Saturday Build, Maintain, and Fly program (flight time logged 5.1) Hayden Schaufel is the senior member of our Weekly Saturday program and has recently earned his Private Pilots Certificate and he is helping us with making sure the younger eagles are on task. In my spare time, I enjoy camping and fishing in the mountains with my family and working on projects with my dad.

I am the newest kid to join the program and will never forget my first Saturday. There was a bright yellow Cessna 150 sitting on the black tarmac. All I felt was the feeling of fear and excitement. It was June 6, 2020, the day that I was going to be taking off for the first time. I was trying to absorb all the information that was given to me from the flight checklist to the conversation with the tower that felt like it was spoken in a different language. Then it was time. I lined up on the runway, throttle in, yoke slowly pulled back, and we were off. As the fear faded away excitement took its place, we were in the air, cows became ants, fields became a quilt of green, and the strong Sacramento River became a stream. I was addicted and could not wait to learn more and fly further.

We had a kit to fix the master cylinder, so we dismantled the master cylinder replacing springs and rubber O-rings. Once it was back in and we bled the brake one more time, and it was fixed. It was a great accomplishment learning the insides of the plane and troubleshooting a problem that needed to be fixed.

Flying to me means a place where your worries can float away. From the time I take off the ground all my worries of COVID, school, or frustrations of the day just evaporate. I hope to one day be able to take my family and friends up in a plane and be able to give them the same feeling I get, the feeling of freedom and adventure.

After getting my pilot's license I want to keep learning and one day be able to fly multi-engine planes and helicopters. Aviation gives you the ability to see Earth from a different perspective and explore.

I am very grateful to be given the opportunity to learn how to fly and maintain the planes. I learn from very smart guys. I can only hope to gain a fraction of the knowledge they know about planes.
