Every year Aircraft Spruce and Specialty Co. sponsors a 'Customer Appreciation Day' where customers and vendors gather to enjoy a full day of fun, education, and deals! Aircraft Spruce offers many special discounts on commonly purchased items, as well as vendor donated items along with a host of things the company donates to us for raffle. On October 10th, 2015, Chapter 1 and our YOUTH arrived en masse to help Aircraft Spruce have a successful event. The Chapter's and their participation directly funds our re-energized Youth Program.

Each year, many of Aircraft Spruce's vendors exhibit from table-top under the big tent that's set up for the event. There are vendors of all kinds exhibiting... from instrument manufacturers to head-set guys, to battery makers. If you haven't ever been... it's worth attending next year. The raffle basket was about 2/3 full by the end of the event at 3 PM. There were literally hundreds of prizes raffled off, and many of us went home tired, but with smiles on and plenty of 'goodies' in our back seats.

As president, I want to specifically thank ALL of the Chapter 1 Youth and our own Flabob CAP Cadets squadron who spent the entire day helping the Chapter. It was amazing to see them all eagerly offering their time and effort, and it paid off in spades! We brought home \$3329... with much of that set aside to send 2 lucky students to EAA Air Academy in Oshkosh this coming spring. Details on how to participate and get selected will be available for inspection and participation at and after the Christmas Party.

As Chapter 1 members, each and every one of us should say "Thanks!" to everyone at Aircraft Spruce and Specialty on you next trip there. Their very generous support of Chapter 1 at this event and all year long is appreciated in a heartfelt manner. The weather was beautiful, which allowed several planes to fly in for the early bird lunch. Our awesome volunteers grilled and served delicious hamburgers and hotdogs to more than 50 people. For the Early Bird visitors, we had a special treat of using the airport People Mover to tour Flabob's grounds including the development of the new hangars. The highlight of the tour was Tom Wathen's hangar and the exciting Golden Age of Aviation replicas.



Our friends from the Commemorative Air Force located at Cable Airport were gracious to bring over two of their flying gems: The beastly Antonov "Big Panda" with its 1000 HP radial engine made its way over and the crew opened the doors for those interested in touring the interior, which is configured as a paratrooper jump ship. They also brought over their rare and beautiful Messerschmitt ME 108 with its original, inverted V8 Argus engine. It delighted everyone with its unique sound, beautiful deep blue paint, and unique Messerschmitt

profile, as it took to the grass runway multiple times for low passes, touch and go landings, and for those exhilarating "camera shots" many in the crowd took advantage of! The flying of this rare bird continued right



until sunset!




and the Antonov and Messerschmitt from Cable Airport flew in to show their support.

Tips For Frugal Renters October 25, 2015 by Dan Ramsey - General Aviation News

Not all pilots fly their own wings. For a variety of reasons, many frugal pilots choose to rent aircraft. They may not fly enough hours to justify owning. They may own a simple aircraft but sometimes rent specialized planes for more capacity, IFR flights, or to add new types to their log book.

There is no specific point at which frugal pilots should consider getting rid of their plane for lack of use and renting. Many say that for flying fewer than 50 hours a year, renting is cheaper. For others, the number is higher or lower. And there are more reasons than frugality to consider renting aircraft. Most of the tips for frugal pilots apply to those who rent their wings. In addition, frugal renters have a few more decisions to make.

Know why you fly.

A couple of columns ago, we discussed annually reviewing your flying mission by asking "Why do I fly?" and assessing your logbooks to confirm or deny your assumption.

At that point, many pilots reconsider owning an airplane and think about renting — or maybe owning one type and periodically renting another type. In any case, it is important to periodically review the reality of your flying. Maybe renting is your best option.

Know your budget.

Even if flying missions don't change over the years, budgets often do. Instead of flying 125 hours a year, you're now flying 25 for one of a variety of reasons. Jobs, families, responsibilities, personal goals, and time available for flying are upsized or downsized by life.

Review and adjust your current flying budget annually. Maybe you should be renting your aircraft — or maybe buying one instead of renting.

Make it easier.

Renting an aircraft can be a hassle, requiring a check ride, document review, reserving a plane when you need it, and preflighting an aircraft you may not be familiar with.

You can make some of these steps easier by selecting your primary rental service and working out the trust issues before your first rental flight. Get the check ride out of the way, select two or three preferred aircraft from the hangar, and make sure the rental service has an easy way to reserve aircraft by phone or online, and get your credit card information into their secure database.

Many frugal pilots are signing up with aircraft rental networks such as OpenAirplane.com that standardize pre-rental requirements to make renting easier nationwide. Once you are accepted in the system, your certification, logbook, and financial information are available to member FBO rental services with a Universal Pilot Checkout. You may not need a check flight if you are renting aircraft that you have prior experience with.

You also can make renting easier on your wallet by purchasing blocks of rental time in advance of use. Many FBOs offer a 10% discount for prepaid rental fees. That's like getting one free flying hour for every 10.

Get renters insurance.

FBOs that rent aircraft protect their aircraft assets with commercial aircraft insurance. If the plane crashes, they get another one. But what about you and your passengers? Most aircraft rental agreements don't adequately cover you. Just how much renters insurance you need depends on what the FBO covers, but most renter policies are set up to fill the gaps.

When purchasing an aircraft renters insurance policy, the rate will depend on the depth of your logbook, what you plan to fly, and from where. Additional charges are applied if you rent multi-engine aircraft or are flying in Alaska or Hawaii.

If you have had an aircraft insurance policy in the past, contact their agent first as you may get a preferred customer discount.

Aircraft renters insurance is also called non-owned insurance and is for pilots who fly other people's aircraft. For example, if you are a member of a flying club or often fly aircraft you don't own, seriously consider non-owned insurance. Even if you do own a plane, your current policy may not cover you in someone else's airplane. Find out before it becomes an issue.

Preflight your rental.

One of the disadvantages of flying rental aircraft is that you don't know who flew it last. The pilot may have been ex-military with an extensive preflight inspection - or a kick-the-tires-and-light-the-fire pilot. Just in case your chosen rental aircraft doesn't have a checklist, consider buying a CheckMate, QREF, or other laminated modelspecific checklist for your flight bag.

Flying is a safe and enjoyable pastime, even if you're renting your wings. By being a frugal pilot, you can fly more and spend less.
