### <u>Member Profile – Christopher Coleman – our newest Private Pilot –</u> CONGRATULATIONS!!!!

I always knew I wanted to be a pilot. My grandfather and father are pilots and they instilled in me the desire to fly. As a toddler, I remember sitting on my dad's lap and flying on our flight simulator for hours. I took my first flight lesson two days after my ninth birthday. I appreciated the invitation to join the local EAA chapter when I was so young. I remember working the radio on the ground at the Young Eagles events, as well as handing out certificates. Before I turned sixteen, I slowly continued my flight training, working around school and instructor availability.





I soloed in N4376H on October 29, 2022, my sixteenth birthday and a beautiful day. This opened up the opportunity for me to fly more consistently. The following spring, that plane suffered a landing gear strut failure, so I couldn't fly for many months. With this setback, my grandpa started looking for a similar plane that could be used for training. Last October we received the plane (N5164S) and I proceeded to fly as much as possible. However, the plane had to go in for maintenance. So, over the winter I continued to study for the oral

portion of the checkride. When we got the plane back in April, I flew numerous hours in the weeks preceding the checkride. At that point, I felt very confident in myself.

I went to take the test on the 30th of May in Cadillac. The ground portion went great, however, I made a hard landing on my soft field so I was unsatisfactory. In the weeks after, I practiced a lot of these landings, and I felt very confident in my abilities. I was scheduled to go back to Cadillac on June 14th, but the examiner had something come up, so he asked me to reach



out to another examiner. That other examiner was able to get me on his schedule on the 15th but in Traverse City. Now, I'm sure for almost everyone reading this, towered airports are second nature. I, however, hadn't been into one for a very long time. Therefore, my dad and I flew down and did some practice earlier in the day, to review tower procedures. We returned to Traverse City later in the afternoon and I had my retest. It was exciting knowing I had so little left until I had my license. After three takeoffs and landings, I taxied back and was done.

I want to extend my thanks to everyone in the aviation community in Harbor Springs and Petoskey especially my instructors, including Al Sturza, Jerry Schmidt, Winston Weibel, and Robert Bowden. I couldn't have done it without all of the support and encouragement.

# Local senior awarded flight training scholarsip from Experimental Aircraft Association

Forrest Neff, a senior in the Edward Mayne, bravely served Aviation Science and Technology program held at Pellston Regional Airport, has been awarded an \$11,000 flight training scholarship from local Chapter 1087 of the Experimental Aircraft Association.

Neff, of Harbor Springs, is a student at Crooked Tree High School who will graduate in early June. He has attended the aviation program, a Char-Em ISD Career and Technical Education class, this school year and developed a passion for flying, something that has run in his family through generations.

"Aviation runs in my family's blood," said Neff. "My grandfather, Mort Neff, was a pilot who flew around Michigan in search of stories for the Michigan Outdoors television program. My step-grandfather,

as a pilot in World War II and was shot down twice. A family cousin, James Cameron, was a B-24 Liberator pilot who was also shot down during WWII. Receiving this scholarship provides invaluable support as I pursue my aviation goals."

EAA chapter president Pete Aiello said this is the first year the local club participated in the Ray Aviation Scholarship, part of a national scholarship program that helps high school students seeking to pursue careers in aviation.

"Our five-member selection committee interviewed eight students, reviewed their applications and letters of recommendation, and made our selection," said Aiello. "It was a remarkably rewarding experience for our chapter

as we got the opportunity to meet some great young people in Duane Enos' aviation class. We were very gratified by the experience and wish all of the students well."

Aviation instructor Duane Enos said community support continues to lift students skyward to meet their goals.

"I am so blessed to have so much support from the local community, verbally and financially," said Enos. "The local support is fast tracking the training of these future pilots. It's giving them focus and putting them on the right path. Forrest is very dedicated to his training and I know he

will succeed at whatever he sets his mind to. I look forward to flying with him when he gets his commercial license!"

In accepting the award, Neff said, "It's an amazing opportunity. It's driving me harder to get my private pilot license."

After graduation, Neff said he plans to "Fly, fly, fly!" This fall he will attend North Central Michigan College in Petoskey for a year, then transfer to Northwestern Michigan College's aviation program in Traverse City.

About the EAA: EAA Chapter 1087 based in Harbor Springs is a group of local pilots who belong to the Experimental Aircraft Association. Each year, the group conducts several "Young Eagles" programs that give hundreds of kids the opportunity to take their first flight in a small airplane owned and flown by a chapter member. Flights take place at the Harbor Springs, Boyne City, Pellston and Mackinac Island airports.

About the Aviation Science and Technology program: Char-Em ISD offers 20 dif-

ferent Career and Technical Education programs throughout Charlevoix, Emmet and northern Antrim County high schools. The Aviation program is hosted by Alanson Public Schools and housed at Pellston Regional Airport. All career tech classes are open to any student, in any Char-Em ISD district.
