

Please join us for a special EAA 113 presentation, on March 20, 2025, at 7:30 pm.

Dave Trojan will present a program called "Michigan Aviation Archeology - Every Wreck Tells a Story". The program will examine several historic aircraft accidents related to Michigan. The presentation will also include the following: What is aviation archaeology, and what do aviation archaeologists look for? Accidents investigated include P-35s Midair Tawas - 1938; Ford Built B-24 Almont - 1944; Oscoda area Bombing Range and aircraft accidents; B-26 Glennie -1944; F-86D Holly - 1954.

Dave Trojan is an Aviation Archaeologist, Aviation Historian, Air Crash Detective, and writer. He is a finder of lost and forgotten aircraft, abandoned airfields, aircraft crash sites, and historic aviation-related properties. David Trojan served 21 years in the Navy and retired in 2000. After retiring he started researching, locating, and documenting historic aviation sites across the country and the world. To date, He has been to

over 500+ military aircraft crash sites. He has written over 60 published articles for military base newspapers, Naval Aviation Magazine, WWI Aero magazine, and many local newspapers across the country. He was featured on the worldwide Armed Forces Radio and Television Network where he presented the military's policy on protection and preservation of historic sites. He has given lectures to the Civil Air Patrol, FAA, Professional Pilots Associations, EAA, American Aviation Historical Society, and university students concerning aviation archaeology and aviation history. His goal is to educate the public about aviation history and tell the stories that go with each site.



There will be a mandatory Safety Briefing held promptly at 8:30 a.m. the morning of the events for all volunteers.

YOUTH PROTECTION TRAINING

ALL pilots MUST take this training and go through a Background Check prior to giving any Young Eagle flights. Anyone assisting with the Youth Workshops and preferably anyone performing ground support duties at Young Eagles are also requested to take this training. It can be found at the www.eaa.org website by logging into your account. Under your profile account is a Training Information Tab. This training takes about 15-20 minutes and passing a short quiz. You will get your completion card a few days later, so be sure to do this promptly if you are not current. You must renew this every three years.

RISK MANAGEMENT TRAINING

This training is required by EAA for all Coordinators and Chapter leaders. They are also requesting that all Young Eagle pilots take this training. It explains the insurance requirements and what can or cannot be done during Young Eagle events and flights. This training can be found in the same location stated above and again, takes about 20 minutes. Immediately following the quiz you will receive a certificate card. Please send notice of your completion to Debbie, as soon as possible.

This program has proven to have a positive impact on the future generation of aviators, including many of our very own Young Eagles. Our very own volunteer pilots have made a difference in the lives of local young people. Won't *you* be one???



2025 EAA Chapter 113 Ray Scholar

Building these models requires some careful cutting and glueing


We had some great help from a few of the parents as well



St. Petersburg Salvador Dali Museum with Airport Bonus! - Dave Steiner

We flew Delta to MCO at the end of January for a nephew's wedding and included some shoulder vacation days. Hey, it was about 80 F, so why not escape from the Great White North for a bit, given the opportunity? As we had the time, we decided to take the 90-minute drive from the Lake Wales, FL wedding venue to St. Petersburg to see the Salvador Dali Museum, one of only two in the world dedicated to his work. **BONUS**, directly adjacent to the museum was Albert Whitted Airport (KSPG)! There was even a window in the museum where you could observe the ops on 7/25. Wait, it gets better. The Dali parking lot attendant told us there was great restaurant overlooking the field at the terminal. Say no more.

I knew where we'd end our day in St. Pete!

The field was built in 1928. According to Wikipedia, it is the first airport to have scheduled commercial airline service. In the fall of 2024, the airport lost 32 hangars, eight aircraft and two helicopters due to tornadoes spawned by back-to-back hurricanes Helene and Milton. Do a Google search to see the damage in detail. There are some fly-over shots from news copters after the hurricanes. The \$1.1 million cleanup was just starting when we were there on January 29th. Some AC, condition unknown, are still in hangars where the doors cannot be safely opened as the structures are bent.

There was some urgency to the cleanup as the first INDYCAR race of the season, the Firestone Indy Grand Prix, is Feb 27th thru March 2nd. Crews were working on the scaffolding for pit row that is adjacent and parallel to runway 7/25, which serves as the main straightaway for the race. The race is held every spring, utilizing the airport and downtown/marina areas near the waterfront. It will be broadcast on FOX at 12 EST March 2 if you want to get a peak at the airport. (cont'd)









So, if you want to fly down to St. Petersburg to see the Dali Museum, you literally need only walk across the street from KSPG. But maybe leave the jet at home ... the longest runway is only 3676ft. We saw some small turbo props come in and could hear them reverse pitch. And if you lose an engine on take-off, you are most certainly going to get wet. All the traffic was taking off over the bay.

Have a great meal at *The Hangar Restaurant and Flight Lounge*. It serves breakfast, lunch and dinner. We had a delicious lunch at the Dali Museum café, too. (cont'd)


