THE MAN WHO FELL FROM THE SKY by William Norris. SnergyEbooks, 2000.
William Norris, British journalist and historian, likes solving mysteries. He stumbled across this one from 1928 and became intrigued because although the fallen man was a famous multi-millionaire, and the circumstances suspicious, the man was quietly buried, the grave remained unmarked, and no serious investigations ever occurred.

The initial accident facts reported were: Captain Alfred Lowenstein, 51, appeared to have accidentally fallen out of his own transport plane, unnoticed by the pilots and other passengers, while crossing the English Channel to France.

The curious Mr. Norris compared all the conflicting newspaper accounts and unofficial hearings and testimonies. He kept poking through the many stories of the outrageous and tea-totaller Lowenstein and his distant but beautiful wife. Mrs. Lowenstein tried to get the Belgian court to declare him dead so that she could inherit his wealth, but a body was required as proof.

Quite a mystery, simply told in 355 pages with 7 pages of black and white photos of Lowenstein and his family.
