

I will be highlighting many of these books in future issues. But first, TODAY'S FAVORITE BOOK:



FLYING WITH THE PROS

We Share The Air: "Birds Of A Feather..."

The ATIS information at Jacksonville local airports will often have a caution about bird activity on or in the vicinity of the airspace. With Cecil Field just 8nm's from the city dump, there is always a danger of an unexpected meeting.

While bird strikes are not as major a cause of accidents and fatalities in general aviation, the possibility of severe damage to the pilot or the aircraft is always present. Bird strikes seldom cause enough damage to stop the engine on a propeller driven aircraft. The greatest damage is from structural damage to the wings and horizontal stabilizer. A direct strike on the windshield will not only shatter the windshield but may cause an impact of the bird (or parts thereof) into the front seat occupants at great force. A 2 lb bird hitting at approximately 100 kts will have an impact of over 2 tons of force. This is certainly enough to cause incapacitation or death to the pilot.


