### IN CASE YOU MISSED IT .....

The speaker at the October Gathering was Larry Diamond who has a Doctor of Pharmacy Degree and is a CFII. In addition to his years as a Pharmacy Specialist in various hospitals, he also is a published author and writes for AOPA. Larry provided an entertaining and informative presentation on common medications that can and cannot be used by pilots.

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Key Points:

• The FAA Safe Medication List is found at <u>www.AOPA.org</u>

- If the label says: "Do not operate heavy machinery when taking"..... That includes an airplane!!
- Half life is the time it takes for half of the medication in the body to be metabolized and eliminated from the body. The FAA warns that pilots should ground themselves for at least 5 times the drug's half-life (or 5 times the maximum dosage). For example, Diphenhydramine or Benadryl, that means 60 hours!



Package Instructions	5 Times Dosage Interval	No Fly Time	Recommendation
Every 4-6 hours^ (Up to 6 times daily)	X5	30 hours	Wait at least 30 hours before flying if taking a medication directed to take every 4-6 hours.
Every 8 hours (OR three times daily)	X5	40 hours	Wait at least 40 hours before flying if taking a medication directed to take every 8 hours.
Every 12 hours (OR twice daily)	X5	60 hours	Wait at least 60 hours before flying if taking a medication directed to take every 12 hours.

^If there is a range, use the higher number


Eleven kids participated this month – and one family brought lots of doughnuts for the group snack! Thanks Finnegan!

### WORD OF THE MONTH – INTERFERENCE ANGLE

### From Canadian EAA Bits and Pieces newsletter, submitted by John Maxfield

You might think that valve seats are ground to the same angle as the angle on the valves themselves. I did, but I learned that there is a tiny difference in the angle (0.5 – 1.0 degree) with the seats being ground at a slightly greater angle.

Apparently the reason for this is that it allows the valve face to touch the seat with a single continuous line rather than over the whole face. This is so that it can provide the best seal.

Who knew? I certainly didn't.



### NIAGARA FALLS AND RARE BELL 47H1

In mid-September, Joan and I took a trip to Niagara Falls to visit friends and see the Northern Lights. I also got a chance to fly with the Paul Faltyn, owner of a very rare Bell 47H-1. His helicopter is serial number 1362, and my Bell 47H-1 is serial number 1361. I helped Paul restore his H model about 10 years ago. Paul is heavily involved in the Niagara Aerospace Museum at KIAG airport. In it is Larry Bell's personal 47H-1, N996B, that I restored for the museum about 15 years ago. We also have a friend near Tulsa that owns serial number 1363. So, of the 32 built in the mid-1950s, we have 3 of about 6 or 7 left flying in the world. We all know each other and keep in touch. Larry Bell's H-1 in the museum was built strictly as a static display, not flyable.

### **BEN HERRICK AT ATP FLIGHT SCHOOL**

For those of you who don't know me, my name is Ben Herrick, and I joined the chapter about two years ago when I moved to Canton. When I was growing up in northern Illinois, my grandfather owned three planes: a QAC Quickie Q2, a Cessna Cardinal, and a CSA Sport Cruiser. We've kept the Cardinal and the Quickie in the family, although the Quickie doesn't have wings anymore. My dad (ironically, the other side of the family) also flew, and we were all members of Chapter 414. I took my first actual flight lesson on August 8th, 2011, and have built up a total of 21.1 hours... In just shy of 13 years.

Anyway, after being a police officer around Michigan for six years and having a Masters Degree in Criminal Justice, I decided to move onto bluer skies and pursue aviation as a career. In wanting to pursue being an airline pilot, I knew I would need to get my ATP certificate, and being 28, I would like to get it done expeditiously. Well, I discovered that ATP Flight School (probably the largest and quickest flight school in the country) has a location right here at Willow Run (KYIP). Perfect!

So, I quit my full-time job as a police officer, became unemployed, and took out a personal loan to pay for flight school. I started on July 8th, and the whole first week was harsh weather, and we never flew. But since then, we've been having a great time! Our location flies the Piper Archer, which has G500 avionics. ATP also has Cessna Skyhawks and Piper Seminoles all around the country (they have 78 training centers and 611 aircraft). There are also FAA-certified AATDs at each location. ATP is a full-time, total immersion flight school, meaning I focus on flying and learning about aviation daily.

The first few weeks were about the fundamentals of flight, Private Pilot maneuvers, and practicing take-off and landings: luckily, with those 21.1 hours, I was doing well. On August 20th, for the first time, I soloed! After that, I completed my cross-country flights as well (YIP-JXN-C62-YIP).

Now, after 76.7 hours at ATP (total of 97.8, not including the 13 hours in the AATD) and a little over three months, on Oct. 26th, I passed my Private checkride! (That includes about two weeks I took off vacationing in Ireland and Iceland!) The checkride went great, and the DPE said I was wasting his time 'cause it was clear to him I deserved the license when I answered his first question in the Oral.

So... what's next? I took a day off, and then jumped right into Instrument. Once I finish Instrument, I'll go into what we call "crew," where another instrument pilot and I fly around the country for a few weeks and build some hours. After that, it will be Commercial, Multi-Engine add-on, and then I'll get my CFI, CFII, and MEI. ATP hires back most of its graduates to instruct and build time to get 1,500 hours to get to the airlines.


So, stay tuned for more updates! Only 1,402.2 more hours to go!
