

The Sound of Wings; the Life of Amelia Earhart by Mary S. Lovell, St. Martin's Press, NYC. 1989. Contains 420 pages, black/white photographs, and a lengthy appendix (her "last flight" radio communications, technical aspects of the Lae-Howland flight, Earhart Disappearance Theories, Chronology of Earhart's Life Events, Glossary, (Foot) Notes, Suggested Further Reading, and maps.

The author, Lovell, has also written a biography of the British-born Kenyan aviatrix, Beryl Markham.

This is our 12th biography of Miss Earhart on the 629.130 924 EARH shelf.

From the jacket notes, "Sound of Wings describes Earhart's tomboy childhood in Kansas at the turn of the century, her relationship with her father, her early fascination with aviation, the impact of Lindbergh's 1927 transatlantic flight," thru meeting her husband/ promoter G. P. Putnam and the developments of her career and flights.

More biographies of women (aviators, of course) are on the 620.120 922 WOM shelf. They include Poncho Barnes, Julie Clark and Jackie Cochran. The 629.130 922 shelf is for collective biographies. Books by and about Charles and Anne Morrow Lindbergh are mostly found on the 629.130 924 LIND shelf.

SANJAY DHALL'S MOJAVE AIRPORT VISIT

On my recent visit to LA I had the opportunity to visit Mojave airport. I contacted a couple of my friends who work at Scaled Composites, to see if I could get a tour of the company made so famous by the unique projects they work and by the one-of-a-kind designs they build. Scaled Composites, as you know, is the company founded by Burt Rutan, notorious for his outrageously radical departures in aircraft design.

I was not allowed to take any pictures inside their aircraft building facilities, only in the front lobby and outside. The visit began with a lunch-n-learn, where they invite speakers to give talks to their staff on various topics. This day they had invited me to give a one hour talk and discussion about my flying car project with about 25 of their engineers and technicians. They were quite enthusiastic about it, had great advice, but suggested I proceed slowly, and test individual new features independently first.

This was followed by a plant tour of their sprawling facilities. I was a kid in candy shop! Mouth wide open in wonder. I got to see numerous projects really close up. What came through very clearly was their ability to keep their aircraft designs remarkably simple, despite their defense or space missions. Hints of the home building roots and construction techniques developed in planes like Varieze, Longeze, Quickie, are all still visible in all their commercial projects. We had lunch at the Voyager restaurant, named after Rutan's around-the-world non-stop flyer.

Standing on top of the center section main spars of the wings of the Statolauncher, maybe 30 feet in the air, was a literal high point of my visit. The Statolauncher is the biggest airplane ever built, designed to carry spaceships to launch points at high altitudes, for manned low orbit flights. I also got to see the Proteus, Firebird, and several other airplanes in development. Alas, no photos allowed inside. As I drove by, I also saw Richard Branson's VirginGalactic building and the airplane graveyard from outside.

It's hard to put a finger on how much invention has originated from this open stretch of barren desert. Would you believe me if I said it was a trip of a life-time?


Honoring the P-51 legacy and an American hero

The Old Yeller Mustang was designed to pay homage to the legendary North American P-51D Mustang, which served as the official pace and safety plane at the Reno National Championship Air Races.

The car also pays homage to Bob Hoover, who piloted Old Yeller for more than 20 years, making more than 1,000 airshow performances. Hoover is considered one of the greatest pilots of all time.

This Old Yeller Mustang started as a 529-hp Shelby GT350 and was built up and customized into the most race-ready road legal Mustang yet, which has everyone really excited.

"This year's one-of-a-kind Ford Mustang honors two aviation greats, the iconic and historic P-51D Mustang fighter plane and highly decorated fighter pilot, test pilot, and airshow performer Bob Hoover, who is referred to by many as one of the



greatest pilots ever to have lived," said Edsel B. Ford II, a member of the Ford board of directors. "The Ford Shelby GT350 Mustang, with

its nimbleness, speed, and aerodynamics, provided us with the perfect platform to create this tribute to the P-51D aircraft."




