



A Visit from James Tripp of Lycoming Engines: This month, we had the pleasure of welcoming an unexpected but very exciting guest to our chapter meeting. James Tripp, the Regional Manager for Lycoming Engines, joined us and shared some valuable insights into the world of aviation engines.

Insights from Lycoming Engines: James provided an in-depth update on the status of engines for both certified and experimental aircraft. He noted that certified engines currently have long lead times, which has been a challenge for many. However, for experimental engines, such as the Thunderbolt, the lead times are even longer. This information was crucial for those planning their builds and needing to schedule accordingly.

He also explained how Lycoming works closely with the local union in Pennsylvania to keep mechanics and technicians employed and engaged in the manufacturing process. Despite facing significant challenges, Lycoming is committed to their customers, workforce and has invested in new manufacturing equipment which is key in increasing production to meet the demand.





Oshkosh AirVenture: July 22nd - July 28th



Plane Fun: Special Edition

Remembering Hobbs Army Airfield: This month, we are excited to highlight a

remarkable tribute to the rich aviation history of our region: the life-size metal art of a B-17 on the Lovington Highway, known as "Fortress of the Plains." This intriguing piece, created by Brian Norwood of Jal, New Mexico, serves as a memorial to the Hobbs Army Airfield. The city of Hobbs commissioned this incredible artwork, which stands as a testament to the area's significant contribution during World War II. Preserving History: The City of Hobbs has made substantial efforts to keep the memory of the Hobbs Army Airfield alive. One such initiative is the free book, "Keep 'Em Flying," which details the construction, operation, and post-war history of the airfield. This book offers an in-depth look at the airfield's pivotal role during the war and is available for download <u>here</u>.

The Hobbs Army Airfield was not only a central hub but also supported six auxiliary airfields used for training purposes. These auxiliary fields included:


- Knowles Aux #1: Located 14 miles northeast of Hobbs AAF.
- Hobbs Aux #2: Situated east of Lovington.
- Hobbs Aux #3: Southwest of Lovington.
- Hobbs Aux #4: 19 miles west of Hobbs AAF.
- Wink Aux: 3.5 miles WNW of Wink, TX, later reused as Winkler County Airport.
- Hobbs Municipal Aux #6: 5 miles south of Hobbs AAF, later reused as Lea County Regional Airport.



Final Flight Notes

Safety Tips for July:

<u>Runway Safety:</u> Always be vigilant for Foreign Object Debris (FOD) on the runway. Small objects can cause significant damage, so a thorough pre-flight check of your departure path is essential.

<u>Cockpit Organization:</u> Keep your cockpit tidy and organized. Loose items can become hazards during turbulence or abrupt maneuvers. Ensure all equipment is securely stowed and accessible.

<u>Pilot Fatigue:</u> Summer activities can be exhausting. Be mindful of your physical condition and ensure you are well-rested before flying. Fatigue can impair your decision-making and reaction times.

<u>Passenger Briefing</u>: Always brief your passengers on safety procedures, including the use of seat belts, emergency exits, and the location of safety equipment. Make sure they understand the importance of staying calm and following instructions in an emergency.





Young Eagles Coordinator – EAA Chapter 123 - Description of Role

General duties

- 1. Build and maintain a list of participants for upcoming events in the order that they registered (to avoid line-jumping). This pool of future participants is the basis of the local Young Eagles (YE) program. It allows you to quickly form a YE Rally with 15-20 participating kids.
- 2. Respond in a timely fashion via email, Facebook, text and phone to discuss YE and Eagles programs and direct participants to the appropriate sign-up location online or add them to the list for upcoming events.
- 3. Follow all EAA rules and guidelines for the EAA program

Pre-event

Refer to EAA's Rally Planning Checklist: <u>YE_GeneralSupport_2023_Digital_YEHandbook</u>)

- 1. Choose a date for the next YE event, in consultation with chapter pilots and volunteers
- 2. Gather a list of pilots who are available and willing to fly kids on the selected date (be sure the pilots meet requirements to fly YE)
- 3. Obtain permission from the FBO or location where the Young Eagles rally will be held and confirm with airport that no other major events are planned that might impact the YE rally (we have used Floris Flight Services at KMDD for the last several events – John Carnett typically asks Floris for permission).
- Create a Young Eagles event on the yeday.org website (when you are working from a pre-registration list, I highly recommend you create a "Private Event" to avoid line-jumping)
- 5. Apply for free YE event insurance through the EAA website at least 30 days before the event
- 6. Order supplies: ensure printed materials are available for the event (in case iPad app doesn't work, paper copies of waiver will be required). Extra copies are a good idea because of writing errors made by parents and by EAA volunteers.
 - a. Young Eagles Registration and Waiver Form (Rev 06/21)
 - b. Young Eagles Engagement Guide
 - c. Young Eagles Promotional Brochure
 - d. Young Eagles Logbook
 - e. Young Eagles Certificate
 - f. Parent Ride-along liability form
- 7. When the event is confirmed (# of pilots committed, weather looks ok), begin to fill the event by calling or texting YE parents and directing them to the yeday.org website to sign up. This is best done 1-2 weeks prior to the event.

Event

1. Arrive ~1 hour before the first scheduled YE flight and set up laptop, printer, and iPad. Log onto Wi-Fi.



- 2. Arrange paperwork on table
- 3. Greet arriving parents and YE's
- 4. Ensure parents sign the waiver(s) needed, either on the iPad app or on paper
- 5. Match each YE with a pilot
- 6. Fill out logbooks and YE certificates
- 7. Greet returning YE's and parents and hand over the logbook and certificate, and explain the benefits available for free (see back of logbook for code)

Post-event

- 1. If paper forms were used, confirm all info was filled out on the forms (pilot info including EAA #)
- 2. Mail paper forms to the EAA
- 3. Provide post-event statistics to chapter leadership
