

Put In Bay 3W2 For anyone wanting to experience Key West without flying over 1016 miles to get there I would recommend Put In Bay 3W2 just north of Port Clinton Ohio in Lake Erie. From BMI it is only 285 miles and can be done as a day trip there and back. The airport can set you up with a golf cart which seems to be the main mode of transportation to get you around on the island to see all of the sites it has to offer. There are many restaurants, bars, wineries, shops to stop in at and you can even have a drink on a fire truck if you like. There is a monument that honors Oliver Hazard

1812 on the approach to RWY21 that you have to watch out for and also the restricted area just southwest of the island that the military shoots off shells from a tank into Lake Erie that needs to be avoided, but other than that it is easily doable and you are not over the water for more than 4 or 5 miles - *Paul Krueger*

Kirk Sampson **W**ho hasn't heard the phrase - there are old pilots and there are bold pilots, but very few old and bold pilots? Pilots manage risk as they plan, prepare, fly, and hopefully evaluate what went well and what adjustments may need to be made for the next flight. An unavoidable risk that every pilot faces is aging.

Max Trescott hosts a fantastic podcast called Aviation NewsTalk that covers recent aviation related news and in some podcasts a focused discussion. <https://www.aviationnewstalk.com>

In episode 257 Max talks with Dr. Victor Vogel (who is an oncologist, CFI, and has flown for 40 years) about challenges pilots face as they get older. These include deteriorating vision and hearing, memory loss and declining strength, endurance, and proficiency. But there are strategies pilots can use to counter declining proficiency. These include frequent flying, training, and scaling back on more challenging flight conditions.



I'll be honest, I thought about many of you while listening to this podcast - it is the reality of the demographics of the broader pilot population. Dr. Vogel provides some practical approaches that you can use to evaluate your situation and think about what you can do to mitigate the risk of flying as an older pilot.

"PEOPLE MAKE FUN OF me because I get a \$318 haircut," George said. "I have a personal barber up here." George, EAA 37947, and Janice Wilts, EAA 1282004, may joke and be modest about why they keep coming to Oshkosh. But their contributions as EAA volunteers are no joke. They have worked in a variety of areas on the AirVenture campus: Vintage, Chapters and Homebuilding, and South Maintenance. George first came to the convention in 1974 when a friend was planning to fly a Waco biplane to Oshkosh. "I really didn't know anything about it at that time," he said. "So, I went home, asked permission, and packed my bags, and we flew up here in the Waco." George has only missed one or two conventions since 1974.

Janice, who is ready for an airplane excursion at a moment's notice, would follow him in the late '80s. "He just pulled me in!" she said.

"Aviation is my life. I'm on my seventh airplane," George said. In addition to building and restoring airplanes, he also helped start two EAA chapters, is a member of five EAA chapters, has flown 175 Young Eagles, and works as a flight instructor. "EAA has been very good to us," he said.


The Wilts have become staples on the AirVenture campgrounds over the years, making new friends that span generations. Those who have been attending AirVenture since they were kids may know George as "Popcorn George," an endearing nickname he earned by making popcorn at their campsite every night. "We've camped in the same spot for like 20 years and watched people's children grow up," he said. "Now we're watching their grandchildren grow up. We're still friends with the same people."

It's amazing." Others may know George for his talent for creating airplanes on a much smaller scale. "Another one of my hobbies that I do is put a smile on someone's face for two dollars," he said (see photo). The Wilts' generosity with their time and variety of talents are part of what makes AirVenture special.

But their influence as volunteers doesn't stop at AirVenture. For George and Janice, a pilgrimage to Oshkosh once a year is simply not enough. The Wilts drive to Oshkosh from Streator, Illinois, for weeklong stretches during the year. During the fall and winter months, Janice volunteers in EAA's Print/Mail Center, and when he's not getting his \$318 haircut, George does everything from building rivet kits for seminars to working on airplanes in the Weeks Hangar. "I was one of the 14 builders of the AirCam that was built over in Weeks Hangar," he said. "I helped restore the B-25. I've done all kinds of work over there, [including] working on the Tri-Motor over the years."

As for advice for future volunteers, George and Janice are eager to share that EAA needs all kinds of people for the behind-the-scenes work that goes into AirVenture. "Everybody can do something," George said. Janice added, "Whether it's painting or cleaning or just whatever. There are jobs out there for everybody."

June 1st was a special day. My dream of having a four-seat traveling airplane at my own strip came to be once again. I have been fortunate enough to have had them in the past. First a Cessna 182, then a 210 but they had moved on and had been eventually replaced by a partnership in a Champ. It is fun to fly and I was able to teach my son Gabriel to fly in it but Holly and I wanted a four seat to be able to travel. Crosswinds Flying Club has been able to fill the gap and we have made some great trips in the last couple of years. But I had room in the hangar that I can see from my kitchen table for a bigger airplane. I had considered another 182 or older 210 but had really dreamed of owning a 195 someday.

Two years ago I was finally able to fly a 195 just to see if I really wanted one. I did but had to wait until I had the means to own one. Last summer, I was able to have Holly sit in a 195, thanks to Bill Thacker, just to get her approval. Now, I was still working on the "means" late last year and got a nudge from Bill on one he had heard was for sale. It would have been a good airplane but my dad was failing in health and it just wasn't the right time. However, during his final weeks, I had shown him a couple of photos of it and another one and he encouraged me to get one.

After he passed away in February,

I decided that I was going to get a 195 because if I didn't do it now, I might never do it and regret it later.



After looking at three airplanes and talking in depth to sellers of three more, I decided on N127GM. It had been rebuilt from a ground loop by Butterfly Aviation five years ago. All new paint, interior and panel. Once again, Bill was very helpful and happened to know another 195 owner/mechanic friend right on the same field that know the airplane! We looked at the airplane and maintenance records and I knew pretty quickly that this was the one. It needed an annual and Bill's friend helped oversee to make sure everything checked out A-OK.

June 1 came and Paul Krueger, Bill Thacker and I headed for Port Clinton, OH. We ate lunch at the airport restaurant as they finished a couple of last details on the airplane. Paul brought the Crosswinds Dakota back and Bill

and I headed for my strip. What a thrill to be in the left seat of my very own 195! There were thunderstorms in the area so we landed and put it in the hangar, not taking the time to practice any landings. Since then, I have gotten more comfortable with it on grass and am ready to move to hard surface landings.

I have plans to add an autopilot, IFR GPS and a Heater this winter. Most 195's have had the heater removed but there are updated gasoline fired heaters that now work well. I want to be able to fly the airplane most of the year and this is a must!

I'm looking forward to giving rides and Young Eagle flights along with other trips. I hope to bring it down some Saturday morning to breakfast in the near future!

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Builders Updates

Jim Hazen's Legal Eagle XL is getting its first coats of paint. Four coats on the left wing and ailerons. Looking like an Illini color scheme in the works.



The Schneider family, Cohen (16), Noah (15), and Claire (13) RV 12is project is taking shape since the delivery of the first crate in February. Have about one evening left of work on the tail section, and are waiting on more kits. The wing kit and fuselage kit are scheduled to be delivered on the 13th of this month. So the timing is perfect. 'When we get back from vaca, we will tear into it and hopefully get some real good progress before Oshkosh. Then get the kids up there again and get them fired up to come back home and really get hammering (err, riveting) on it.'



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Builders Updates

Dean Olson is completing the first wing for his **Wag Aero** build. The wing is ready for me to seal all the wood. "Because I am learning, the hard way, I am working slowly on the wing. I didn't seal the ribs before I placed them on the spars. They will need to be sealed after everything is where it needs to be. I'll probably put my paint booth back up and spray the ribs in place after I seal the spars. lots of new things for me here. I pre-shaped the wood tip bows that come from WagAero needing re-worked to fit properly. I am making all the hardware for both wings now so the right wing should go a lot faster."

Flying yourself into EAA AirVenture Oshkosh is a rite of passage for some pilots, a bucket list item for many others, and an annual must-do for still others. Whichever category you're in, arriving at Oshkosh is only difficult if you're not prepared. Read the NOTAM

If the headline for this story was "One Tip for Flying in to AirVenture," this would be it. Some NOTAMS are one or two sentences — ours is 32 pages, and it's an absolutely mandatory read before you fly in. Wittman Field in Oshkosh becomes the busiest airport in the world during the week of AirVenture, and that only works because people follow the rules in the NOTAM. It's available as a [download](#) or you can [order a printed copy](#) and we'll send it to you for free, as long as you promise to read it.



Here are [ten tips](#) to make sure you're ready when the time comes.

We also made a change to the June schedule. We had a request from a summer camp to do a private event on June 22nd. This is a Thursday 9-11am. I texted our regulars and found enough volunteers to make it happen and because of pushing the May event back a week and adding this private event on the 22nd, we eliminated the June 17th event. This would have been 3 Rallies in 26 days and I don't want to burn out our volunteers.


