Ch-1326 Website: Under Construction – Please Stand-by

Last Month's Meeting

EAA Chapter 1326 Shelbyville Airport Conference Room Mark Stauffer, Presiding

The November 18th meeting kicked off at the usually scheduled 6PM.

President Stauffer kicked of the meeting with a quick summary of the agenda. Mark's time was limited that evening so only two primary items were on the agenda, first whether we'd have available manning for the upcoming fly-in breakfast the weekend after Thanksgiving, and the Chapter Hangar Lease issue.

Mark Cannon, the Wharton's and the Kelly's said they'd be available to help with breakfast, and with "el-Presidente" Mark also being available, the group decided there was enough support to host the monthly event.

As some of you may be aware, the hangar and tiedown rentals for Shelbyville airport had basically doubled and the there was a lot of protest by aircraft owners about the new rates, plus the doubling of the EAA Chapter 1326 hangar rent was possibly going to become prohibitively expensive. At the November Airport Commission Meeting, the Commission decided to offer Chapter 1326 free use of the hangar for breakfast and events but the airport would lease the floor space to a commercial customer. After the decision to make Ch-1326 that offer, the Commission subsequently decided to cancel the doubled rates and reassess the new rates. After the Ch-1326 board discussed the offer, they decided that losing control over the floor and airspace in the hangar was NOT to the Chapter's advantage, and given the fact the Commission had just revoked the previous rate increase, Ch-1326 lacked sufficient information ot make a decision as to whether they could our couldn't afford to rent the hangar. The Board requested a representative relay to the Airport Commission that although Ch-1326 didn't discount the offer of "free space" for the use of Breakfasts or other events, that losing control of the hangar was NOT in the Chapters best interest, and that the Chapter wished to add for an extension of the existing lease at a lower rate until the Commission had set new official rates and the Ch-1326 board could re-evaluate their options. New Ch-1326 Secretary, Randy Kelly, volunteered to relay the board's position to the Airport Commission at the upcoming December 2nd Commission meeting.

Because of the uncertainty of everybody's schedule over the holidays, no specific date was set for either a December meeting or a holiday party.

Editors Follow-Up

Randy and Leigh Kelly and Helene Wharton attended the 2 Dec Airport Committee Meeting and Randy passed on the Chapter's position as requested by President Mark Stauffer. The Chapter's request stirred significant discussion during the meeting, with the end result being the Committee voted 3 to 2 to renew the Ch-1326 lease at a rent of \$250/month. The contract contains a 90 day notice clause allowing KSYI airport officials to modify the rent once new rates are set. So for the time being, it appears EAA Ch-1326 will retain control of the hangar. The 6 January 2022 Airport Committee meeting was cancelled because the ice/snow storm and has not been rescheduled. Once it is, we expect the subject of tie-down and hangar fees to still be a "hot" topic at the next board. We'll update folks when the meeting actually happens.

Santa Clause arrives at KSYI on Dec 11 2021!

Months ago, the Shelbyville Airport staff asked Ch1326 if we could help (as we've traditionally done) with the annual Santa fly in event. Of course the members of Ch1326 with minimal prompting said yes. So on the requested day and designated time, Mark Stauffer, Helene Wharton, and Randy and Leigh showed up to boil water and mix up hot chocolate for Santa, his helpers, and kids and parents. Hot chocolate, the wonderful fuel Santa carries to stay warm (at least according to the movies) as well as millions of kids (and adults) in cold weather. So, heat the milk and chocolate and sugar to the appropriate temperature ----- Rrrrrrppppppp (sound of record needle ripping across the top of a vinyl record). --- Nooooo, this isn't rocket science, it just simple heat up water and add the instant hot chocolate. Easy peasy, except with instructions intended for mixing small or single cups of hot water into hot cocoa, and the realization that coffee "cups" aren't equivalent to measuring "cups". (Zurg notes: normal cups hold 8 oz of liquid, while normal "coffee" cups hold more like 6 oz, but for some reason the Ch 1326 coffee urns being used were 5.3 oz which was going o cause some small problems later.)
