Flying Into Bob Maxwell Airport

Just east of Oceanside harbor, and north of Palomar Airport is an awesome little non-towered airport named after one of the Tuskegee Airman, Bob Maxwell. The airport was named after him for his efforts to keep the airport from being closed in 2006. He passed away in 2010 but left Oceanside CA with a fantastic alternative to landing at Palomar Airport in Carlsbad, CA.

The following may be old news to experienced pilots, but the entry and exit procedures out of Bob Maxwell Airport were new news to me. After talking to one of our EAA members, I was surprised to find out Bob Maxwell has some very specific instructions not as well covered in the FAA chart supplements as they might be, so I have included the information below.

With its 2,712' runway, you'll never find yourself waiting for a bunch of large private jets to take off. However, it's not a runway to land on if you're coming in high and fast. If you do, be prepared to go around; the runway seems to vanish,

and the surrounding hills will have you following the river as you try to climb. It is also wise to tune into the CTAF and listen for traffic and parachute activity at least ten miles out. All patterns are to the North, and when I was there last week, they were parachuting at 13,000' and landing about 300' feet North of the runway, within the downwind pattern to Runway 25. Like Palomar Airport, several months of the year, the morning marine layer often gobbles up Bob Maxwell Airport, making VFR flight difficult. However, it does have very reasonable monthly tie down fees.

The picture below describes the recommended entry and exit to the airport for noise abatement, traffic, and parachuters. About a year ago, the runway number was changed from 24 to 25 (most likely to avoid confusion, since Palomar has also has a runway 24). The picture below incorrectly depicts it as runway 24; now it is listed as runway 25.

Be sure to check for updates, but basically, pattern altitude is 1028', and they don't want any straight in approaches. If arriving from the east, fly over the field at 2000', following the river bed until you're over the ocean, then turn north and descend to pattern altitude over the Santa Margarita River, then at the water tower turn southeast to enter the pattern on a 45 degree angle to intersect the downwind leg for runway

Don't go North of that water tower; you will find yourself either in restricted airspace or Camp Pendleton's Class D airspace, easy to do if you're dodging a cloud!

If you ever need to pick up passengers at Palomar Airport, consider Bob Maxwell Airport, it is a fun airport to fly into with none of the headaches of large private jets, wake turbulence, crowded patterns, or control towers. But be vigilant for traffic; some traffic may have neither a radio or ADSB.

Civil Air Patrol

Short summary based on notes from Lista Duren

The following information is based on a talk given by Major Mark Nicholson.

Major Mark Nicholson, who has been flying for 40 years and is a CFI, provided an informative and interesting talk on the Civil Air Patrol, the U.S. Air

Force Auxiliary. The Civil Air Patrol (CAP) was incorporated just before WWII as a group composed of volunteers with three primary missions: emergency services, cadet programs, aerospace education.

To begin the talk, Major Nicholson showed the "80 Years of Excellence" video which provided a visual celebration of many of the areas in which CAP has been involved: Cadet programs, community service (e.g. deliver supplies), search and rescue (e.g. after natural disasters), orientation flights for young cadets, homeland security, aerospace education, saving lives (e.g. first aid), physical fitness, building future leaders, terrain research and aerial photography.

He then switched to a PowerPoint presentation and discussed each of the primary missions.


Emergency Services

Their Search and Rescue mission has changed over the years. Previously they did a lot of search and rescue for missing planes, but now because of ADS-B, they concentrate more on disaster relief and aerial photography. As part of counter drug missions, they fly routes along the border.

Mark pointed out that the cadet program for youths age 12 to 18 is like the Boy Scouts on steroids. It concentrates on 4 main areas: leadership, aerospace, fitness, character.


He provided some interesting facts about the scope of the program:

Quick Facts:

- 25,000 cadets
- 24,000 powered flights
- 12,000 glider flights
- 15.5 is median age
- Adult supervision & mentors
- 82% earn B or better in school
- 65% have an interest in aviation
- 72% have an interest in military service

Aerospace Education

Mark was very enthusiastic about the Aerospace Education mission and no wonder. It offers outreach to the teaching community as part of the Teacher Orientation Program (TOP) and provides specific materials that teachers can use in the classroom.



Mark also provided a quick overview of the organization. CAP is organized into Wings. The California Wing has 8 Groups. San Diego is in Group 8. There are 6 Squadrons in the San Diego area. Kids ages 12 through 18 can join as youth members. At age 21 they become adult members of the senior squadron.

Adult volunteers do not need to be a pilot – there is a lot of need for other talents as well. Who volunteers? A wide variety of adults with background or interests in logistics, communications, public affairs, legal, administration, emergency services, finance, aviation and outdoor enthusiasts. This includes FAA Certified Flight Instructors, Certified Ground Instructors, attorneys, medical professionals, Certified Public Accountants, clergy, licensed educators & administrators.

How can you join? Attend three meetings, complete a basic background check, pay a national fee of \$82, (squadron fees vary), pay for the CAP "uniform." EAA Chapter 14 member Steve Handrop, a member of CAP, modeled the "uniform": gray slacks, blue polo shirt.

After the presentation, Mark answered questions, including the following:

- Where/how do kids join? VFW on 3rd Ave in Chula Vista or in Kearney Mesa (Miramar) or in Oceanside/Escondido.
- ➤ How many hours per year should a senior member expect to put in? It depends. Example: Wing Mission Alerting Officer (WMAO) duty might spend more time. Some tasks: We fly for FEMA after big earthquakes to see if railroads and roads are still where they should be and passable. We found a lost girl scout troop in Montana. We can check the status of forest fires by looking for traces of smoke.
- > Several questions involved using CAP aircraft. CAP has aircraft at Fallbrook and Gillespie.

Board Decisions

- October 2022 Minutes reviewed and approved. Larry Rothrock/Kevin Roche: passed.
- Authorize the Lease Committee to present the proposal discussed during the Board of Directors' meeting. Kevin Roche/Jimmy Kennedy: passed.
- Motion to adjourn. Stu Strebig/Ted Krohne: passed.

Old Business

<u>Lease Option</u>: **Trinidad Lopez** discussed recent developments with the City regarding exercising our lease option. After a lengthy discussion, the Board passed a motion authorizing the Lease Committee to present the proposal discussed during the meeting.

New Business

Concrete Pad costs: **Jimmy Kennedy** and **Gary List** have been looking at the costs for laying a concrete pad for our proposed hangars. During the meeting, **Ryan** obtained a current price quote from a local supplier of \$2,500 for a 30' by 35' pad – delivery only. We would need to do the prep work, smoothing, and finishing.

<u>Asphalt Inspection</u>: After discussion, **Trinidad Lopez** suggested that we have appropriate members do an inspection of what we actually need done in terms of asphalt resurfacing.

Opener for Hangar 1 door: The Board wanted to make sure that the recent winch installed at the Chapter met all safety expectations and asked engineer and new Director **Gert Lundgren** to research this.

<u>Chapter Holiday Lunch</u>: The Chapter will hold a potluck holiday lunch on Saturday, Dec 3. **Trinidad Lopez** and others will prepare the basic food; members are encouraged to bring their families and a dish to share.

<u>Young Eagles</u>: The Board expressed its deep appreciation for all the hard work done by our Young Eagle pilots and volunteers. The Board also expressed its gratitude to

Hermes Hernandez for the fine job he has done as Young Eagle coordinator and wishes him our best in Officer Training School as a Navy pilot. The Board also was very pleased with the announcement that **Grant Rotunda** will be taking over as our Young Eagles Coordinator and look forward to working with him. The Board mentioned the need to add more STEM activities as part of our overall outreach to Young Eagles.

<u>Food Drive</u>: The Young Eagles are hosting a food drive to benefit the San Diego Food Bank. Trinidad shared some ideas for improving participation. **Francisco Muñoz** had suggested a raffle for a Bay Aircraft Tour hosted by one of our Young Eagle pilots (one of the pilots has already volunteered). Francisco will provide **Ashley Lopez** with material needed for a flyer and discussed some social media options to advertise the raffle. **Gene Hubbard** suggested that we provid a diagram of the proposed flight for use in the newsletter.

<u>Volunteers</u>: **Donna Ryan** had prepared a list of many of the functions that need to be filled by volunteers. Some of these are very visible (e.g. Fly-out Coordinator); others occur behind the scene, but are vital to the Chapter (e.g. Tower Liaison). A similar list will be prepared for the newsletter; **Trinidad Lopez** asked that all directors identify at least one of these functions for which they will be responsible. At the meeting, **Francisco Muñoz** volunteered to help with social media and Trinidad mentioned that his daughter, **Ashley Lopez**, has volunteered to help with community outreach.

<u>Ray Scholarships</u>: **Trinidad Lopez** mentioned we appear to have several good candidates for our Ray Scholarship for the upcoming year and will share the information with the Board soon.
