




Joe joined the Chapter in the late 1990's and immediately became an active member. Here are just some of the highlights of his activities at the Chapter.

- Active in organizing the Ocotillo Wells campouts and was always a welcome chef, especially on the grill.
- ➤ Helped construct or put up a variety of the structures around the Chapter, including Hangar 4, the Eagles' Nest, the storage shed behind Hangar 2, and Hangar 8.
- Organized several Awards banquets, St. Patrick Day lunches, and Midsummer Day BBQs, frequently arranging for music by his own band
- Ran the popular fly-in/drive-in/walk-in camp outs that featured dinner, movies, and breakfast at the Chapter facilities.
- ➤ Long-time member of the Grumman group here at the Chapter, as well as a Nieuport project and his current project, the Stits Playboy.


Building the Arion Lightning Classic – Phase 2


In the first week of September, I revisited Marana, AZ once again for

the second phase of my Arion Lightning Classic. While it was way less humid than in San Diego that same week, I still was very grateful for the swamp cooler at the company's build site.

Under the direction of the company staff, I made the following progress on the aircraft.








- On the first day I mounted the air box. This houses the filter and switches between outside air and heated air for carb heat. This required a slight modification to the control cable bracket (white block) and sealing of the old holes.
- Next I mounted the engine. This went very smoothly and it was on in about ten minutes. The hardest part was compressing the rubber mounts enough to start the nuts, but Greg had a solution and it went well.

Day 1 continued

- After that I cut, sanded and fitted the cowling halves together. This is a somewhat long process, sanding, clecoing the halves together and then repeat the process.
- Finally, I fitted the cowling to the fuselage, made a rough cut and called it an end to a long day.

Day 2

The next day saw more activity. With the two cowl halves fitting together nicely, I was able to mount it to the fuselage, cut and trim to fit at the rear and cleco it into place. Again this is another cut, sand, fit and repeat process.

Inside the cowl are several NACA ducts for the oil cooler, air box and cabin heat supply. The holes were cut in the cowl and the ducts floxed into place.

Final task for the day: I mounted the wing tips and let them set overnight for glassing tomorrow. I elected to go for the slightly shorter wings which, without the 18" extensions, simplified the process.

The landing light pockets were also installed.



On the following 3 days of the week there wasn't too much more visual progress on the plane, but there was a lot of "hidden" effort in the 12 hour days. I made up a flap motor installation kit and got it all in.



I also made up hinges and mounts for the canopy. Made up and fitted all the inspection panel covers; lots of time at the drill press, vice and band saw, and with file in hand.

Day four was a field trip. We went into town with the modified exhaust and had it welded. It now comes up closer to the fuselage for better streamlining.

Also, after settling on a paint scheme, we bought all the paint and accessories. Sorry no reveals at this point, but it is going to look awesome.

On day five, I had some odd tasks to do. I went through the rudder assembly, tightening up all the jam nuts on the push rods. I replaced some defective parts on the right wheel. Made up some bushes for the nose gear and drilled the bolt for the split pin. I installed the seat belt cables which are attached to the tail.

The plane will be painted in the next few weeks. When I go back for phase 3, it will be for final assembly and rigging and installation of the wiring, instruments and lights.

They say that 90% of the work is done in the last 10%, I think we are approaching that point.

The B-29 now known as "Doc" rolled off the assembly line in March 1945, one of 1644 production B-29s built at Boeing's Wichita, KS assembly plant. The aircraft never saw combat but served various non-combat duties. It was named "Doc" after the dwarves in Disney's "Snow White" while serving as a radar calibration aircraft at Griffiss AFB in 1951.

In 1987, Tony Mazzolini "discovered" the aircraft and began making plans for restoration, finally taking possession of the aircraft in April 1998.

Restoration started in May 2000 by volunteers at the Boeing plant in Wichita, near where the plane was originally built. Taxi tests began in May 2016 with the first flight on July 17, 2016



When not attending airshows, Doc resides at the B-29 Doc Hanger, Education & Visitors Center at the Eisenhower National Airport in Wichita, KS, and is open to the public. See the website <u>b29doc.com</u> for further information.


