Today, more than 2 million young people have enjoyed a free introductory flight through the Young Eagles program. These flights are made possible through the generosity of EAA member volunteers.

Join us in offering youth ages 8-17 the opportunity to experience The Spirit of Aviation® by becoming a Young Eagles volunteer today!

This year's Young Eagles event is scheduled for June 28 and once again we will be looking for pilots and people on the ground to help make this event a success. We will discuss the details at our Thursday meeting.

Young Eagles Pilot Requirements

The Young Eagles pilot requirements are basic, but MUST be followed.

- Be a current EAA® member and hold an appropriate airman's certificate (sport pilot or greater).
- Possess a current medical certificate (if applicable).
- Be current to carry passengers in the aircraft you plan to use.
- Have a current flight review.
- Complete the Young Eagles registration form before the flight, including parent or legal guardian signature, and pilot signature.
- Conduct flights in an aircraft that is in airworthy condition.
- Have aircraft passenger liability insurance for the aircraft used (owned, rented, or borrowed) with \$100,000 per seat coverage.
- Adhere to all applicable Canadian Air Regulations (CARs).
- Complete both the online training and basic background check as a part of EAA's Youth Protection Policy. For more information visit EAA Youth Protection Policy and Program

G7 Summit Air Restrictions: What Alberta Pilots Need to Know

The 2025 G7 Leaders' Summit in Kananaskis is bringing unprecedented airspace restrictions to Alberta that will significantly impact general aviation operations from June 14-17. As members of the aviation community, it's crucial to understand these restrictions and plan accordingly.

Restricted Airspace Zones

Two major no-fly zones will be established during the summit:

Kananaskis Village Zone: A 30 nautical mile (56 kilometer) radius around the summit venue, representing the most restrictive area where world leaders will be meeting.

Calgary International Airport Zone: A 20 nautical mile (37 kilometer) radius around YYC, designed to secure the primary arrival and departure point for international delegations.

Both restrictions take effect at 6:00 AM on June 14 and remain in place until 11:59 PM on June 17.

Enforcement Measures

The RCMP and Canadian Armed Forces are taking these restrictions seriously. Sgt. Mark Basanta from RCMP Protective Operations has made it clear that unauthorized aircraft will face immediate interception by CF-18 fighters conducting combat air patrols and Griffon helicopters. In extreme cases, persistent violators could face being shot down as a last resort.

"Shooting is an extreme measure, but yeah, we have the capability to take them down," Basanta stated during a briefing at Springbank Airport.

Impact on Commercial Operations

While commercial airline operations will continue at Calgary International Airport, significant route changes are already planned. NAV CANADA has published alternate IFR arrival and departure routes that will reroute westbound traffic around the Kananaskis restricted zone. Passengers should expect delays and are advised to allow extra time for travel.

The Airport Trail Tunnel will be closed from June 15-18, requiring travelers to use alternative routes

via Country Hills Boulevard NE to Barlow Trail NE.

Drone Operations - Critical Concerns

Drone operators face particular scrutiny during the summit. The RCMP has expressed significant concern about recreational drone flights, not just for security reasons, but for the safety of security aircraft operating in the area. A specialized counter-drone unit will be deployed to the Kananaskis area.

Recent incidents, including a California man's drone that crashed into a Quebec water bomber fighting the Los Angeles Palisades Fire in January, highlight the serious consequences of unauthorized drone operations during critical operations.

Planning Considerations for Pilots

General aviation pilots should avoid the restricted areas entirely during the summit period. The "hardline zone" at Kananaskis will have a combination of military and police assets maintaining constant surveillance. Emergency aircraft, such as those designated for wildfire fighting, have special provisions to operate within the zones when necessary.


Security preparations have been underway for eight months, with aviation industry consultation to minimize operational impacts. Practice flights by security aircraft will be conducted in the lead-up to the summit.

Looking Ahead

This represents one of the largest security operations in the world, with leaders from Canada, the United States, Germany, the United Kingdom, France, Italy, and Japan attending. The presence of high-profile figures who have survived assassination attempts has heightened security concerns.

For the latest updates and specific NOTAM information, pilots should monitor official channels and expect the formal NOTAM to be published around June 17. The aviation community's cooperation with these measures is essential for maintaining safety and security during this significant international event.

Remember: when in doubt, stay out of the restricted zones. The consequences of violations extend far beyond regulatory penalties and could pose serious safety risks to all aircraft in the area.
