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Bob & Susan Brandt Fly to Mackinac Island, MI-Trip Report

Bob and I departed from DPA, DuPage County Airport in West Chicago, IL, on Saturday, September 19, 2009 for a weeklong, around Lake Michigan, flying, biking and camping adventure. We made a fuel stop at MNM, Menominee-Marinette Twin County Airport in Menominee, MI, before spending the night camping under the wing of our 1954 Cessna Skywagon at ISQ, Schoolcraft County Airport in Manistique, MI, before reaching our final destination, MCD, Mackinac Island, MI. It was beautiful flying low the short distance, while dancing around a few low clouds. Our intention was to camp, then stay in a hotel for a couple days and then fly onward for some more camping.

Our Sunday morning departure from Schoolcraft airport was delayed by fog, heavy dew and a wet tent, but the sky finally cleared to reveal a sunny, mild September day. Earlier, while eating a simple breakfast of hard-boiled eggs and toaster pastries, we were thrilled - despite safety concerns - to see three Sandhill cranes moving through the fog along the side of the airfield. Later, just prior to take off, another pilot radioed to let us know that there were several deer running across the airfield. Again, a wonderful but potentially dangerous wildlife sighting.

We landed on Mackinac Island around 1pm. Because the island is a popular travel destination, there was a lot of activity at the airport with visitors and pilots leaving, as well as new arrivals. Our tie-down neighbor and his wife had just flown in from Montana and planned on staying on the island for a few days before heading home to Boston. We chatted about the planes - our Skywagon tail dragger and his twin with a pressurized cabin and our folding bikes - our Cadenza models by Dahon and his Bike Friday which actually disassembles and folds into a suitcase. Once we loaded our gear into our bike saddle bags, we road into town to find a hotel room, with our tie -down neighbor as our personal tour guide.

We took our chances and didn't book a hotel reservation, which gave us the opportunity to get our bearings and check out the hotels first before making a decision. This is not recommended during the busy season, which is Memorial Day through Labor Day. However, we got what we thought was a good off-season mid-week rate at the Windermere Hotel, which has a water view from the front porch and is located across the street of the public library. We also enjoyed the peace and quiet in the evenings as the hotel was far enough away from the shops, bars, cab stands, and ferry landing. There was a television in the common area of the hotel lobby.

Since automobiles are banned from the island, with the exception of emergency and public works vehicles, Mackinac Island is the perfect pilot get away. No worries about how to get around once you arrive since everyone has the same four choices: walking, biking, horseback, or riding in a horse drawn cab.

Frankly, we didn't miss riding in a car or having to worry about being run over by one. However, you need to be alert and learn to navigate around the horses as well as other bike riding tourists, as many of them wobbled along like they hadn't been on a bike since they were children.

Since one of our outdoor activities is biking, we were in our element getting around the island by bike. We saw some birds and hiked a little. We took full advantage of the 8-mile trail along the lakeshore, riding it once in the morning, and then again late in the afternoon finishing just in time to stop along the lake to watch the sunset.

The first night of our visit there was a steady rain that continued into the morning, which can be relaxing as we watched from inside the sunflower yellow walled quaint sitting room of the hotel. We began the morning looking through the shops on the main drag, until we made our way to Fort Mackinac.

We loved the restaurants, fudge shops, bike trails and beauty of the non-motorized island, so we stayed a few extra days instead of going camping to a more primitive nearby island with an airport. It was easy to convince Bob.

On our departure for home, it was windy, and the low ceiling slowly raised up so we could fly low across the lake channel, while waves and whitecaps were right below! The weather going down the east shoreline of the mitten slowly lifted and cleared up for our gas stop at Traverse City. After take-off, we heard a clunking noise, so we landed, Bob thinking it was a gas cap bouncing around on the safety chain. It seemed Bob had let his camping shirt sleeve hang out when he closed the door, and it really was flapping loudly against the aluminum.

We are lucky to have Lake Michigan, all the Great Lakes and the many airports that can take us the great destinations awaiting.

A sidebar about the airports:

MNM is very well maintained and is located in a quiet setting in a residential area. Along with fuel, they have an impressive waiting area with a television and spacious tables, a pilot's lounge, flight planning computer, clean restrooms (no showers), a vending machine for cold drinks, coffee pot, and snacks available on the honor system. We were greeted by someone with the FBO who offered us the use of bicycles that are kept for guests. Unfortunately, camping is not available at this airport.

ISQ Schoolcroft allows camping, but the airport is located on a very busy highway, so it's noisy. The waiting area has a flight planning computer, seating and coffee tables with magazines, but no television. There are clean restrooms (no showers) and a vending machine for cold drinks. There was a flyer posted in the waiting area with a phone number to call for a shuttle to a local casino that advertised a buffet, which we should have advantage of. Walking along the beach was probably better....

MCD on the island is very well maintained with a waiting area, restrooms, and a flight planning computer. A State Park employee is on site to man the radio and check in and check out visiting pilots and will assist you with contacting one of the horse-drawn cabs. There's a landing fee and a daily tie-down fee, which we found to be reasonable considering we stayed five nights.


