Schools in Aitkin, Brainerd, Crosby, Pine River, Nisswa, Pequot Lakes and Staples were contacted to announce the availability of the newly-funded Aviation Careers Scholarship sponsored by EAA Chapter 1610. Interested candidates could request an application on February first via an email to eaachapter1610@gmail.com.

The applicant will need to describe or answer the following essay-type questions:

- What is your planned aviation field (Pilot, Mechanic, Controller, Airport Management (etc.)?
- Why have you selected this field and where will you begin your education?
- Have you been accepted into a post secondary institution (college, university, technical school etc.) and if so where and course of study?
- Explain your long-term aviation goals.
- List activities, organizations and positions of leadership in school, community or volunteer experience.

  - \*\*Volunteer
- Tell us about your work experience, where have you worked and what were your responsibilities.
- References: Include two school references. Teachers, coach, mentor
   including contact information.
- Please tell us why you are the best candidate to receive this scholarship.

Once completed, they must submit their application back to Chapter 1610 either by USPS mail or attaching a scanned copy to the above chapter email address.

The application deadline is April 15.

# CHAPTER 1610 AVIATION CAREERS SCHOLARSHIP ADDITIONAL FUNDRAISING INITIATIVE

Last month Craig Rodamaker spearheaded another project to raise funds for the chapter-sponsored aviation scholarship. As you know, this \$1000 Scholarship will be offered to eligible high school seniors or beyond such as second year post-secondary students. Craig's letters were sent to a variety of local businesses and non-profit organizations that announced our goals of encouraging continuing education in aviation-related fields. Inserted below is a copy of one of the letters sent.

Thank you, Craig, for taking the lead to launch this initiative.

## Dear Neighbor,

Do you remember the thrill of your very first airplane ride? I do. I was 8 years old when my Dad took me to the local airport for a ride. It changed my life! I started my pilot training in high school, earned my pilot's license in college, and have been flying for the past 50 years.

I'm now part of our LOCAL EAA (Experimental Aircraft Association) Chapter #1610 based out of Brainerd Lakes Regional Airport. Our mission is to promote aviation in our community, primarily with LOCAL kids and students. For example, we give LOCAL kids ages 8-17 a free airplane ride much like the one I got at age 8. Last year we provided almost 100 kids with that free flight. Maybe one of your kids, or one of your employee's kids, experienced the thrill of that flight. In addition to working with LOCAL youth, we help area pilots via our FAA Safety Seminars and guest speaker presentations. We are in the middle of an aircraft restoration project, and once completed our 1930s Longster aircraft will hang from the ceiling of our LOCAL Brainerd Lakes Regional Airport!

As you know, our country is experiencing a nation-wide shortage of professional pilots, aviation mechanics, air traffic controllers, aerospace engineers, drone technicians, and numerous other aviation professionals. At the same time airline travel volume is predicted to set another record level in 2024. It's a big problem, and our goal is to encourage LOCAL students to seek out aviation careers to address the issue. Last year we participated in the national "Ray Aviation Scholarship" program and awarded a LOCAL high school student a \$10,000 scholarship towards earning his private pilot's license. In fact, we did the same in each of the past 3 years! Recently we established a new scholarship to be awarded in June to a LOCAL student seeking a career in an aviation field.

Please know that 100% or our efforts, campaigns, and scholarships are funded from our member dues and volunteer activities, various fundraising campaigns, and donations from individuals and organizations like yours. We receive no government funding. We are a local chapter of the national EAA organization and operate as a 501(c)3. Our tax ID # is: 82-3520395. EAA Chapter 1610 is now approved to nominate a scholar for the 2024 Ray Aviation Scholarship."

This scholarship will provide \$11,000 to one local youth between the ages of 16 and 19 for flight training culminating in the individual earning their private pilots license.




The EAA Ray Aviation Scholarship program relies on the best of the best EAA Chapters to achieve its unprecedentedly high success rates. The involvement of the local EAA chapter is critical to supporting the Ray Foundation's mission of developing youth into the leaders of tomorrow! Without the mentorship of a healthy and active chapter, the probability of completion of flight training decreases drastically.

Due to the importance of the chapter's mentorship and support, chapters interested in administering the EAA Ray Aviation Scholarship are required to apply on an annual basis. When selecting eligible chapters the following criteria are taken into consideration:

- Overall chapter health and activity
- Youth activities the chapter engages in (Young Eagles Workshops, Young Eagles Build and Fly, Youth Builds, etc.)
- Chapter experience administering a scholarship
- Availability of potential scholars

Each chapter participating in the EAA Ray Aviation Scholarship program will be required to appoint a Scholarship Coordinator. While Mike Petersen is serving in this role as Chapter 1610 program point of contact with EAA Headquarters, Walt Roberts will serve as the scholar's mentor.

## THE GREAT AIR RACE by John Lancaster

As members of Chapter 1610 adhere and shrink fabric over wooden and metal airplane structures, I found this story to be quite timely, enlightening, and amusing. It gave me a new respect for the pioneer fliers who piloted these aircraft. The author recounts the daring exploits of post-World War I pilots as they vie to finish first in a race across the country by airplane. It was organized by Colonel Billy Mitchell in his attempt to prove the airplane was a viable mode of cross-country transportation.

Many airplanes in those days were literal death traps. A biplane known as the DH-4, used as a bomber by Allied forces in World War I, had its gas tank immediately behind the pilot in the cockpit. As Lancaster explains, "Even in relatively low-speed crashes, the tank sometimes wrenched free of its wooden cage, crushing the pilot against the engine." To get a DH-4 properly balanced for landing, a co-pilot or passenger might have to climb out of the open cockpit and shimmy back to hang onto the tail. And this was one of the era's most popular and successful models.

Some planes had no gas gauge, so pilots would learn they had run out of fuel only when the engine stopped. Just a tiny portion of the country was covered by charts; pilots' navigation tools were a magnetic compass and their own eyes. (Mapping was one of the industries that aviation's growth fostered.) If pilots were fortunate, they could follow a river or railroad tracks, or read city names on water towers. If not, they went the wrong way, or landed in pastures to ask farmers where they were.

This is definitely an entertaining read you will enjoy.



## FERRY PILOT: NINE LIVES OVER THE NORTH ATLANTIC

Join Minnesotan Kerry McCauley in the cockpit as he battles a fuel system malfunction over the Atlantic, a total electrical failure at night over the Sahara, being struck by lightning off the coast of Portugal and losing his engine in a thunderstorm. As an international ferry pilot Kerry's almost insatiable, reckless quest for danger and adventure also led Kerry to put international smuggler and bank robber on his resume. Kerry's skill, ingenuity and a heavy dose of luck were what allowed him to survive the countless mishaps, catastrophes and a nearly fatal plane crash. A true tail of adventure and courage, this harrowing account will have you on the edge of your seat wondering how Kerry is still alive. "Ferry Pilot" is destined to be a true aviation classic.

Kerry McCauley's life of adventure started out in the Minnesota National Guard as a UH-1H "Huey" crew chief and winter survival instructor. His taste for aviation led him to be an international ferry pilot, professional skydiver and corporate jet pilot. As a ferry pilot he delivered planes to 60 countries, crossing three oceans and six continents. He's flown about 50 different types of aircraft, has 9000 hours of flight time and 20,000 skydives. Kerry is an engaging and entertaining speaker, whose retelling of his adventures as a ferry pilot and his starring role in two seasons of the Discovery Channel's series \_Dangerous Flights\_ puts people on the edge of their seats. Kerry lives in Wisconsin with his wife Cathy where they own and operate a skydiving school along with their children, Claire and Connor.

## EAA CHAPTER 1610 LONGSTER PROJECT: STATUS REPORT

February saw the completion of the starboard wing up to these next steps in the Stewart Systems process: (1) applying 6-inch reinforcement fabric strips along the leading edge, (2) heating the "pinked" edges of all the fabric strips, then (2) brushing the EcoBond into the fabric to seal the weave.

Before moving forward with this, the Longster Team met on February first to finish applying fabric to the port wing, shown below.

Once the fabric was applied to both sides, the process used on the starboard wing was repeated.

- Progressive heat shrinks at 250-Deg., 300-Deg., and then three times at 325-Deg., both sides
- Apply half inch wide reinforcement tapes where the ribs contact the fabric on both sides
- Secure the fabric to the ribs using #4 Truss-head screws. These were placed into each rib with 6-inch spacing.
- Adhere 2-inch fabric over the ribs with EcoBond.

Only one side of the wing progressed this far as we ran out of the 2-inch wide fabric tape.

In the meantime, work resumed on the fuselage at Paul's workshop.



On February 15, Joe, Rollie, and Paul met at Paul's shop to start putting pieces of the fuselage together so we know we have all the necessary parts. Then, disassemble and prepare what's needed for painting.


## From Rollie Noordmann's Garage in Merrifield, MN.
