What is the meaning of "BA GOOD" on NOTAMS and the standard aviation weather products, such as METAR/TAF, SIGMETs, AIRMETs, etc.



What is it?



The November "What is it" is a Smith Termite

Wilbur L. Smith, was an experienced wooden construction aircraft homebuilder, having built a Pietenpol Sky Scout in 1930. He designed the Termite using chalk on a basement floor. Don Cookman later drew up the

plans.

The aircraft is a braced parasol wing monoplane with all-wood construction. The exception being the motor mount, struts and landing gear are made out of steel. It was designed to use an Aeronca E-113C 36 hp engine. Spruce was used as the structural material with birch plywood covering. The spars are from an Aeronca K. The controls are modified from a Piper Cub. The aircraft does not have brakes or a tailwheel.
