Landing Fees: Now With Automation

Perhaps it was inevitable, but here we are. Private companies are sprouting up advertising turnkey solutions for airports to collect automated landing fees. Scheduled, nonscheduled, ADS-B, transponder-free, it doesn't matter. Through a system of monitoring open-source data and optically capturing N-numbers, they can track just about any landing aircraft.

We're still working on the regulatory and legal implications of these systems, though landing fees have been a fixture at large commercial airports for years. They are rarer at small GA airports, as they have been impeded in the past by the lack of an efficient collection system for aircraft that never park and drop by the FBO desk or honesty box. Now there apparently is

Landing fees in general aviation set a dangerous precedent. They rank alongside air traffic fees in penalizing safe practices, as the cash register ticks over with each landing. Landing an aircraft is probably the most fundamental — and perishable — skill in aviation, and it is important to be able to practice it at a variety of airports and settings. There are indeed countries where it is commonplace for all airports to charge by the landing. We simply cannot permit that here. Does your local basketball court charge by the free throw practiced?

This is not to say that airports cannot collect fees to sustain themselves. Self-sustainment is an important concept at airports, and there are unique funding challenges at facilities that do not receive federal Airport Improvement Program (AIP) funding, such as privately owned, public-use airports. Probably the most equitable fee an airport can charge is a fuel flowage fee. Like the federal fuel tax that funds the FAA, fuel-based fees are scalable to the type, size, and frequency of operation, where heavier aircraft or frequent fliers pay a bit more. As we say with regard to federal user fees, we have no problem with funding the infrastructure we use, but not in the form of à la carte fees that disincentivize the use of certain parts of the infrastructure and could affect safety as well.

Not to mention, this form of fee collection does feel like an invasion of privacy. In today's interconnected world, many of us are accustomed to being tracked when we fly, but a technology that identifies even those aircraft that opt out of ADS-B? Pilots in the United States have a unique ability to navigate the airspace with few restrictions, which is a cherished privilege. Getting a bill in the mail that identifies which airport you visited on which date — and how much you now owe — erodes that feeling of freedom.

The most effective pushback against these sorts of fees may well be at the local level. Absent new legislation or regulatory action there may not be a way to prevent these pay-to-land schemes. So, engage with your airport sponsors. Let them know this is a bad idea that could easily drive traffic away from the airport.

While each airport — especially those with federal funding — is a node in a national system, the taxpayers and constituents on the local level will likely decide whether these fee systems are successful. It's yet another reason to engage positively with your local community and airport leadership to show them the value of a healthy GA airport.

Young Eagles Online Registration Revamp Update



September 2024 - The new EAA Chapter Events online registration tool continues to come together quite nicely! Although the tool isn't going live as soon as hoped, I am very pleased with the product updates that have been taking place.

As has been documented in a number of locations, the delay in the product development is largely attributed to my absence from the office for a number of weeks in April and May. That quickly bled into AirVenture preparations, so the development of the new tool took a bit of a backseat.

In the lead-up to AirVenture, we were able to release an early beta test version of the software to several chapters. In addition, Young Eagles volunteers were able to demo the system at the EAA Blue Barn. We collected approximately 100 comments of feedback, ranging from technical glitches to desired software enhancements. All this feedback was collated into one document but split into two sections. Section 1 — Bugs and Breaks and Section 2 — System Enhancements. This document was sent over to the developer in mid-August.

The majority of the bugs and breaks have been addressed, but as with most software testing, our team has identified a few other glitches. Those have been sent over to the developer as well, but we are awaiting the chance to review these fixes.

Many of the system enhancements are simple, but there are some bigger ones that users should look forward to seeing post-production launch.

- Addition of other event types Young Eagles Workshop, Young Eagles Build and Fly, Flying Start, etc.
 - Optional functionality for chapters to reserve a certain number of seats for firsttime Young Eagles.
 - Updated look and feel of automated emails.

- Sequence numbers assigned to youths upon check-in.
- Improved integration and functionality of the iPad app.
- Assurance that events will not be overbooked if the event is bombarded right at the registration opening date/time.

What to expect next?

As of late August, our plan is to finish addressing the items that came up in beta testing. Once those items are taken care of, the tool should be ready for production launch. I anticipate production launch to occur in early October.

EAA is also working on a communication to all Young Eagles Day users, notifying them of the new system, how their profile was migrated, and how to access their new profile.

Updated training materials are also high on my list to address. Though the tool should require little training for current Young Eagles Day users, there are a few changes that need to be highlighted.

Thank you for your patience as we work through this massive transition to a new Young Eagles online software. Although the desired launch date was missed, this delay has given us the opportunity to slow down and go over the tool with a fine-tooth comb. Rather than rush into production with a half-baked tool, EAA is taking the slow approach to make sure we get it right. Young Eagles Day set a high bar, and EAA needs to be sure this second offering meets volunteer expectations. There is only one opportunity to make a good first impression upon production launch, we don't want to miss that opportunity.

California Avgas Legislation Aligns With EAGLE Timeline to Eliminate Lead Emissions

California's Assembly and Senate closed out August by passing state bill CASB1193, which will prevent the sale, distribution, and availability of leaded avgas after January 1, 2031. The bill's date corresponds with the Eliminate Aviation Gasoline Lead Emissions Initiative's (EAGLE) target date of the end of 2030 for the transition to a lead-free aviation fuel. California's governor has until September 30 to sign or veto the law.

Introduced in February by State Senator Menijivar, the bill originally proposed a ban on the sale or distribution of leaded avgas in a phased approach, beginning at California airports in disadvantaged communities starting in 2026 and throughout the state by 2030. In June, EAA joined with AOPA, NATA, NBAA, VAI, and the California Pilots Association in a letter cautioning issues of federal preemption and safety concerns with individual state actions

creating a patchwork of fuel availability. Due in part to this input, the final legislation contains the statewide elimination of leaded fuel sale in 2031, mirroring the unified effort of the EAGLE initiative.

General aviation remains committed to the goal of eliminating the use of leaded aviation fuels for piston-engine aircraft in the U.S. by the end of 2030, or sooner, without adversely impacting the safe and efficient operation of the existing fleet. An important consideration in this safe and smart transition is avoiding uncertainties regarding fuel availability created by unilateral actions from states and local municipalities.

At AirVenture 2024, EAGLE provided an update on the industry's status and ongoing efforts. A common theme throughout the presentation by the EAGLE executive members is the need for a safe and smart transition to unleaded fuels, which includes not prematurely banning the existing fuel. The group stressed the need for a supply of 100LL to be kept available for aircraft and engines that need it to fly safely, a point addressed in the 2024 FAA Reauthorization Act.

The EAGLE briefing also included updates on the three fuels currently in play. G100UL from General Aviation Modifications Inc. (GAMI) and 100R from Swift Fuels are pursuing Supplemental Type Certificates (STC). GAMI received their broad approved model list STC in 2022 and is now developing distribution. Swift is expecting its STC later this year. LyondellBasell/VP Racing is pursuing FAA Fleet Authorization for their UL100E fuel through the Piston Aviation Fuels Initiative (PAFI) testing, having moved into full-scale engine testing this past November.

A Pilot...a Passion...a Calling By Sharon Puschmann

Pilots come in all shapes and sizes with different motivations, drives, and desires. Some are inspired by family members, military ambitions, or dreams of becoming an airline pilot. Our 2023 Ray Scholar, Josiah Harding, opened our eyes to something more....

The Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) Ray Aviation Scholarship is a merit-based scholarship program that is funded by the Ray Foundation and administered by individual EAA chapters. Through the generous support of the Ray Foundation, EAA provides up to \$11,000 to deserving youths to help cover their flight training expenses, totaling \$1,800,000 in annual scholarship funding. Our local EAA 382 Chapter at the Greene County – Lewis A. Jackson Regional Airport (Ohio) was fortunate to receive one of these \$11,000 scholarships in 2023. At EAA Chapter 382, we hold in-person interviews with our scholarship applicants. It gives us an opportunity to hear from the applicants, meet their parents, and understand their motivations. Josiah (Joey) was a quiet young man who had just begun learning to fly at our local airport. Then, when we asked why he was inspired to learn to fly, he lit up. He told us that when he

learned about the Jungle Aviation and Relay Service (JAARS) organization, he knew that he wanted to be part of it.

Founded in 1948, JAARS is a non-profit, worldwide, mission aviation, and support organization with a primary focus on Bible translation support. Their pilots fly into remote areas to provide access to translators, support staff, consultants, linguists, Christian mission organizations, hospitals, and governments. Their services can also include medical evacuation and disaster relief work.

Once Joey found his calling, he focused on achieving his goal. He competed for and received the Lewis A. Jackson Aviation Scholarship as well as the EAA Ray Aviation Scholarship. Joey made plans to attend the School of Missionary Aviation Technology (SMAT) in Michigan after graduating high school. In the interim, he decided to stop running cross country in high school and gave up guitar lessons to have more time to fly and study. Next, he applied for a job at the Greene County airport to be near his passion of flying. Although too young initially to become a mechanic apprentice, Joey started washing planes. Once he turned 18, he joined the MacAir mechanic staff—absorbing and learning as much as he could. This knowledge will be instrumental in helping him as he navigates worldwide areas as a JAARS pilot. While juggling this full-time job, he supported our EAA chapter by helping at Young Eagle Rallies and meetings—even taking on the role as head grill master at our Chapter's recent cookout. Joey became a private pilot on August 5, 2024. His family, his instructor, and EAA Chapter 382 are his biggest supporters. We all know, Joey, that you will achieve your dreams. Joey packed up to drive to SMAT on August 21, 2024. He moved into his new location and met other SMAT students from around the world, all seeking to focus on maintenance and flying skills to serve God and others through aviation.

The skies above us will miss him being here, and the mechanic staff at MacAir will definitely miss him. But for Joey, the skies are yours. You inspire all of us.





Ruby Wine Sheldon Collection - After a dedicated career in photography, Ruby Wine Sheldon pursued a career in aviation by achieving her pilot's license in her late 40's. After instructing for

some time Ruby took on an even greater challenge by becoming an employee to the U.S. Geological Survey, Water Resource Division in which she flew countless different types of aircraft. Ruby had become the first civilian - man or woman - to achieve an instrument instructor rating for helicopters. After her career with the U.S. Geological Survey Ruby continued to be active in aviation by participating in numerous air derbies. Ruby's life brought great encouragement to other women interested in the field of aviation and many of her memorable items from her life were donated to the museum by her niece, Jeanine Wine, in 2015.

IWASM Photo Archives - The IWASM Photo Archives include photographs from multiple special collections, donors, and contributors. It encompasses nearly 100 years of aviation and space history, including photographs of early aviators.


