How Important is Radio Communications to General Aviation? Contributed by Tobey Straub

General aviation is not well known by commercial pilots for having good radio communications. Many Part 61 schools leave radio communications up to the certified flight instructor (CFI). This means that radio communications may not be a high priority, or the student only gets one point of view. Part 141 schools have more motivation because the FAA regulates their class topics and teaching plans. Regardless, all pilots must prioritize radio communications for the simple thought that others and Air Traffic Control (ATC) need to know who you want to talk to, who you are, where you are and what you want to do.

The radio "talk" can be intimidating and cause apprehension, but it is imperative that pilots communicate. If you are a pilot, it is important to be comfortable talking to other aircraft and ATC. The Aviation Safety Reporting System Database (ASRS) reports that a third of the accidents in general aviation are because of communications. How do you practice? If your CFI finds it important, then they are going to want you to practice on the ground and not just in the air. This method also saves the student money.

One simple solution for practicing on the ground is an application called ARSIM by Plane English. This application lets you practice comms on your cell phone with the proper verbiage and with scenarios that are for visual flight rules (VFR) and instrument flight rules (IFR). Many of us are overly attached to our cell phone anyway, so why not use it to practice speaking ATC scenarios? It is more advantageous than playing a game to kill time.

Also, the FAA recognizes the training as being effective, and awards WINGS credit for utilizing it. If your CFI is also an ATC controller, then they would appreciate it as well. Flying in the vicinity of air tractor pilots? The communication skills gained through this training prepare you for this as well.Let's raise the bar on radio communications and make it a safety priority! Outside of VFR, to proceed with training in IFR conditions, clear communications are even more essential. The point being that communication never goes away. Once you start training as a pilot, advancing your communication skills is a must. Thus, embrace it, and strive to improve.

ARSim can be found at the following link: <u>https://arsim.ai/</u>, or you may Google "ARSim". They have software for ATC or pilots. Utilizing this program is good practice and practice is a part of piloting. The traditional radio sources are also available like ground school practice with the CFI and listening to the LiveATC.net. However, the cost of ARSim is comparable to any other application and the simplicity of it is great for those occasions when you can not receive LiveATC.net. Also, ARSIM is interactive, grades your voice and verbiage, providing necessary feedback for self improvement.

Try it out. Safe piloting.



According to FAASTeam Notice NOTC3401, no FAA approval is required to modify or customize a checklist, at least for those of us operating under Part 91. However, it recommends that aircraft owners start by consulting their aircraft's POH, AFM, or panel placards in some older aircraft. A general rule promoted by some flight instructors is that it is permissible to add items to the manufacturer's checklist, however nothing should be omitted. One should also note that when taking a checkride for a pilot certificate or rating, the Designated Pilot Examiner may request justification for changes made to the checklist being used, and may wish to verify its validity.

For checklists used in Part 135 or Part 121 operations, FAA approval of checklists is required. FAA Order 8900.1, Volume 3, Chapter 32, Section 12, contains the guidance that FAA inspectors use when accepting or approving checklists for Part 121 and 135 operators.
