

New from EAA.org: January 20, 2022 – The opportunity for an EAA AirVenture Oshkosh once-in-a-lifetime camping experience is the grand prize as EAA's Pilot Your Own Adventure contest, supported by Flight Outfitters, is now open for pilots and aircraft owners. Identify this Airplane

Last month's image was of a Turbine Powered Super Seawind aircraft, built by Steve Wightman of Massachusetts. The pictured aircraft is the only turbine-powered Seawind in the world. The Seawind aircraft design originated in Canada and first flew in 1982. The Seawind 2000 kit was produced and sold by Seawind International of Haliburton, Ontario and powered by a 200-hp engine. The Seawind 3000, powered by a 300-hp engine, was introduced in 1993 and acquired by Seawind North America (SNA), based in Kimberton, Pennsylvania. The Seawind 300C's cabin can fit two adults and three children. The cruising speed is 190 MPG or 165 knots at 75% power.
