Gee Bee Q.E.D. to Appear at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh

February 12, 2014 - When we last spoke with Rich Alldredge following the flawless first flight of the late Jim Moss' outstanding reproduction 1934

Gee Bee Q.E.D. last fall, he said, "We definitely have Oshkosh in our sights." Well, this week he confirmed plans to fly the burly two-place Golden Age racer to Oshkosh this summer to participate in EAA AirVenture 2014. 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complete the Q.E.D. after Moss passed away after a lengthy illness at the age of 82 last September. "We've still got a few steps to make - we're halfway through the flight test program," Aldredge said Monday. "We'll start again when the weather improves. We're over the peak and heading down the backside." The airplane was built at Cawley's Prairie Airport (02WA) in Buckley, then transported 50 miles to Olympia Regional Airport for initial test flights.

The airplane was brought back to O2WA where it's spent the winter months being tinkered on in a heated hangar. Hopes are to return to Olympia in April to finish the test program.

Alldredge says the team is targeting the flight to Oshkosh about a week prior to the convention. It will likely take three flight legs to get there, figuring on a range of 600 miles, and not more than three hours at a time. More details will be announced as they are finalized.

The 6,200-pound (gross weight) Q.E.D. is powered by a Wright R-1820 Cyclone engine, not the Pratt and Whitney R-1690 Hornet from the original Granville brothers design. The Cyclone, as Moss stated in Sport Aviation, was the same diameter as the Pratt with twice the horsepower (1,425 vs. 675). To account for the Cyclone's 200-pounds of extra weight, Moss reduced the fuel tank from 480 gallons to 240 gallons.

Moss's masterpiece is also 10 feet longer with an additional 10 feet of wingspan over the original. The rudder and fin were also enlarged to match the area of the R-1820-powered T-28.

Q.E.D. stands for the Latin term quod erat demonstrandum, which means "what had to be demonstrated." Where better to obey that order than EAA AirVenture 2014 Oshkosh?

Hundreds Turn Out for EAA's Annual Skiplane Fly-In

Close to 400 people poured into Pioneer Airport on Saturday for EAA's annual Skiplane Fly-In at Oshkosh, Wisconsin.

Locally the flying conditions were favorable, with light winds and partly cloudy skies, allowing 26 skiplanes to participate. Not so much, unfortunately, to areas further south of Oshkosh as harsher weather prevented a number of pre-registered skiplane owners from flying in. Relatively mild temperatures helped to bring out the large crowd of local enthusiasts.

As the skiplanes landed in the mostly sunny morning, EAA hospitality was well under way inside Pioneer's Phillips 66 Hangar. Volunteers prepared and served 268 pounds of chili with all the fixings and 128 pounds of broccoli cheese soup for the attendees of all ages.

Cake was also served to honor the 61st anniversary of EAA's first-ever meeting, which took place on January 26, 1953, at Curtiss-Wright (now Timmerman) Field in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

New event enhancements included pilot and aircraft information displays for all attending aircraft, outdoor heaters set up on the Flightline, and a slide show with images from past EAA Skiplane Fly-Ins.



Increasing clouds in the early afternoon signaled time to depart, and skiplanes began to head for home from Runway 13 as attendees watched and cheered.
