Stratux- ADS-B for Cheapskates

Those of you who were at the August chapter meeting heard me give a brief talk about a little gizmo called the Stratux. Some of you may have even heard about this little marvel on various internet forums. For those who still don't know about it, I wrote this short piece to give you some background about it, as well as my own experience building and flying with one of them. I won't go into much detail about the actual construction of the device; Tom Charpentier of EAA HQ wrote an excellent article on the topic, which you can read here...

The parts list mentioned on the EAA site includes a battery pack, but this is not necessary if you have the ability to power it via a USB port. I have such a port hardwired into my panel, but you can buy an inexpensive USB power port that plugs into a cigarette lighter, which most production airplanes have on the panel. Many of you probably already have such an adapter for charging your cell phones, so you can save a few bucks there. Minus the battery pack, the cost of parts is under \$100.

While it was designed for Foreflight, Stratux has been ported to any number of other mapping programs like WingX. For details on using other devices, and for just general discussion about the device, I recommend checking out the Reddit forum at https://www.reddit.com/r/stratux/. Note-you do not need to be a Reddit subscriber to read their forums, but you will need to sign up in order to post questions.

I am not able to get any ADS-B signal on the ground, either at my house or at East Troy airport. This is not unusual and

owners of store-bought ADS-B products report similar reception. In flight, I was able to pick up the towers by pattern altitude. Cruising in the 3500-4500 foot range in southern Wisconsin, I was picking up between four and seven towers at all times. I could receive all the ADS-B weather products, including radar and text weather. I was also receiving traffic reports, but this is somewhat deceiving, because unless you are equipped with ADS-B out in your airplane, you will not see all traffic. ADS-B traffic is a whole 'nuther topic for another time.

The team that is working on Stratux continues to develop and refine the product. This is not a commercial product, but a program that a lone person (a pilot and computer programmer with too much time on his hands) came up with. He posted his new program online for anyone to use for free, and other programmer/pilot types got ahold of it and started making improvements. All of these smart folks are doing this for nothing and freely sharing their work with others. The spirit behind



such open-source software is very much the same as the spirit that makes EAA the organization it is, a spirit of volunteerism and helping others to enjoy a common interest.

In any event, if there is enough interest, we may put together a group buy for the hardware to build a bunch of these gizmos for chapter members. We will discuss this at the September chapter meeting, so be sure to be there.

Editor's note:

If you want to get even cheaper and don't want to spend the \$100 a year for ForeFlight and big \$\$\$ on an iPad, there is a free app that runs on any Android device called Avare (pronounced "AvAir"). http://apps4av.com/avare-overview/ No, it doesn't do all the real fancy stuff that ForeFlight does but it's completely free. It also will run on significantly lower cost tablets like the Samsung Galaxy or the Nexus 7. This ADSB receiver, Stratix, is said to work with this app too. I have not tested this myself but I may in the near future.
