Flying in New Zealand

I recently returned from a our third (every 10 years) monthlong stay in New Zealand. I flew twice while I was there; once at Wanaka on the South Island, and once in the Hawkes Bay area of the North Island. (On earlier trips I even got to fly a hot air balloon and a DeHavilland Tiger Moth, in addition to more typical Cessnas and Pipers.)





The flight from Wanaka, approximately in the middle of the South Island, was in an area with what might be the most spectacular scenery anywhere in the world (and I have flown in many places in the U.S. and the world). There is a miles long lake there, surrounded on three sides by snow-capped mountains. I flew in a Cessna 172 with an instructor. The photos give an idea how fantastic a flight it was.

The Napier/Hastings/Hawkes Bay area on the east coast of the North Island is not as spectacular, but still beautiful, flying over an area with at least three rivers coming down in a flood plain (which flooded in the Spring of 2023) from the lesser mountains. I flew with the chief instructor in a Piper Archer which had a paint job almost identical to my 40J. The Hawkes Bay and East Coast Aero Club was an impressive operation, with 8 airplanes (3 Piper Tomahawks; a Cessna 150 and a 152; an RV-12; a Cessna 172; and the Archer), based in a two story building that served as the office and clubhouse. Oddly enough, we took off and landed from a grass runway despite there being a paved runway right alongside.

The big nearby city is Napier, known for Art Deco architecture, rebuilt after being destroyed by an earthquake in the 1930s. We flew over the Napier Airport. I asked the instructor why there were no flight schools there. He said it was too busy. Eight airline flights come in daily from Auckland, and six from Wellington! (He was in contact with an air traffic controller as we flew over.)


Flying in New Zealand

I consider New Zealand to be one of the best places in the world. As an American, it is easy to get used to. Grocery stores and drugstores and other stores all seem very familiar. An exchange rate of .6 to 1 is easy to get used to. (The \$200 NZ motel room is \$120 US.) There is no tipping at restaurants, so eating out is a real bargain compared to back home. Gasoline is a different story. The price of just less than \$3 NZ/litre converts to around \$1.87 US/litre or about \$7.06 US/gallon.

Driving can be difficult in parts of the country. First, you have to get used to driving from the right side of the car on the opposite side of the road. The main road all the way up the west coast of the South Island is a narrow two lane road, in places going up and over mountain passes with twisty curvy roads with hairpin turns. If you have a short range bladder like I do, one very good thing is that the country, particularly on the South Island, has some of the most readily available and clean restrooms anywhere. Every little town you pass through will have signs plainly marking them.

The main thing of course is the geography and the scenery. We love "mountains coming down to the ocean". About the only place you get that in the U.S. is on the west coast. In New Zealand, made up of two big islands with lots of mountains (especially the South Island), it is the entire country!













Look closely, beyond the ridge line. Imagine living there!





"I've made good recent progress on my RV-7 fuselage. The aft section is riveted together and the center section (there the seats are) is in the process of being assembled."





"I finished all of the empennage at the end of 2022. I received my wing kit in February of 2023. Both wings are nearly complete, including the installation of the heated pitot hardware in the left wing, and the autopilot roll servo in the right wing. Left to do is to mount/attach the flaps, install the last 2 lower wing skins, and then install the fiberglass wing tips. I constructed the wingtip lights from a Fly LEDs kit, so those are on the wing tips and ready to be wired."






From EAA 196 member, Patrick Mullane:


