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Florida EAA License Plate

AOPA/EAA MEMBERS BRING AVIATION LICENSE PLATE TO FLORIDA DRIVERS

Proceeds to support General Aviation education scholars

A general aviation license plate will soon be available for purchase in Florida because of the passionate efforts of three aviators with support from the AOPA advocacy team.

Local Florida pilots (l to r) Rick Golightly, <u>Dr. Ian</u> <u>Goldbaum</u>, and <u>Joseph Hurtuk</u>, bonded over their shared

interest in aviation and determination to give back to the industry. They designed a Support General Aviation specialty license plate to reflect the economic impact aviation has on the state—



which is ranked third in the U.S. for the total number of pilots, aircraft, and airports.

Proceeds from the sale of the specialty plate will help fund aviation education scholarships for Floridians managed

through the Aerospace Center for Excellence in Lakeland, Florida.

The three pilots worked with AOPA Southern Regional Manager Stacey Heaton to collabo-



rate with elected officials to promote the plate. Integral to legislative efforts to pass the plate through the House and Senate were state Rep. Doug Bankson (R-District 39) and his office, and state Sen. Gayle Harrell (R-District 83) and her office. Thanks to ongoing collaboration, the plate has passed through the Florida legislature and is headed to the governor's desk for signature—which is eagerly anticipated by the end of the month.

"Special thanks go to Representative Bankson and Senator Harrell," said Heaton. "The representative's own passion for aviation and the senator's recognition of our members' passion for aviation made this effort possible."

Once signed, coordination with the state to get these plates to the public begins. Pre-sales for the plate are slated to begin October 1 and 3,000 sales are required before a single unit can be produced.

Amendment of Class B and Class E Airspace, and Removal of Class E Airspace; Jupiter, FL

AGENCY: Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), DOT.

ACTION: Pinial risks.

SUMMARY: This action amonds Class D and Class E atropage extending upward from 700-linet above the surface for William P. Cwinn Airport, Jupiter, FL. This action increases the radius of the Class D airspace and amends verblage in the Class D description. This action also updates the geographic coordinates for the Class E airspace extending upward from 700 feet above the surface, it revokes Class E airspano designated as an extension to a Class D surface area. DATES: Effective 0901 UTC, May 16, 2024. The Director of the Federal Register approves this incorporation by reference action under 1 CFR part 51. subject to the annual revision of FAA Order (C) 7400.11 and publication of conforming amountments.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

Authority for This Rulemaking

The FAA's authority to issue rules regarding aviation safety is found in Fitte 49 of the United States Code, Subtitle I, Section 106 describes the authority of the FAA Administrator. Subtitle VII, Aviation Programs, describes in more detail the scope of the agency's authority. This rulemaking is promulgated under the authority described in Subtitle VII, Part A. Subpart I, Section 40103. Under that section, the FAA is charged with prescribing regulations to assign the use of airspace nonecesary to ensure the safety of aircraft and the efficient use of airspace. This regulation is within the scope of that authority, as It amends Class D and Class E airspace and removes the Class E airspace designated as an extension to a Class D surface area in Jupiter, FL. An adrepace evaluation determined that this update is necessary to support IFR operations in the area.

History

The FAA published a notice of proposed rulemaking for Docket No. FAA 2023-1587 in the Federal Register (88 FR 48396; July 27, 2023), amending Class D and Class E alrepaces extending upward from 700 feet above the surface for William P. Gwinn Alrport, Jupitor, FL. Interested parties were invited to participate in this rulemaking offert by submitting written comments on the proposal to the FAA. No comments were received.

Incorporation by Reference

Class D and Class E airspans designations are published in Paragraphs 5000, 8004, and 6005 of FAA Orthe JO 7400.11, Alexpano Designations and Reporting Points, which is incorporated by reference in 14 CFR 71.1 annually. This document amends the current version of that order, FAA Order JD 7409.31H, dated August 11, 2023, and officitive Soptember 15, 2023, FAA Order (C) 7400.11H is publicly available as listed in the ADDRESSES section of this document. These amendments will be published in the next FAA Order 10 7400.11 update.

FAA Order JO 7400.11H lists Class A. B. C. D. and E airspace areas, air traffic service routes, and reporting points.

The Ende

This action amonds 14 CFR part 71 by amonding Class D airspace and Class E airspace and Class E airspace extending upward from 700 feet ahove the sertace for William F. Gwinn Airport, Juptim, FL, by increasing the Class D radius to 4.5 miles (proviously 4.1 miles) and updating the geographic coordinates of the Class E airspace extending upward from 700 feet above the surface to coincide with the FAA's database. This action removes the City name from the second line of the Class E airspace

description. This action also replaces Notice to Airmen with Notice to Air Missions and Airpert/Facility Directory with Chart Supplement in the Class II description. Finally, this action removes the Class E airspace designated as an extension to a Class D surface area, due to all approaches utilizing the United NDB and Pahokov VORTAC have been canceled, and the extensions are no longer required. Controlled airspace is necessary for the area's safety and management of instrument flight rules (IFR) operations.

Regulatory Notices and Analyses

The FAA has determined that this regulation only involves an established body of technical regulations for which frequent and routine amendments are necessary to keep them operationally current. It, therefore: (1) is not a "significant regulatory action" under Executive Order 12886; (2) B not a "significant rule" under DOT Regulatory Policies and Procedures (44 FR 11034; February 26, 1979); and (3) does not warrant proparation of a regulatory evaluation as the anticipated impact is minimal. Since this is a routine matter that only affects air traffic procedures and air navigation, it is certified that this rule, when promulgated, does not have a significant. economic impact on a substantial number of small entities under the criteria of the Regulatory Flexibility Act.

Environmental Review

The FAA has determined that this action qualifies for categorical exclusion under the National Environmental Policy Act in accordance with FAA Order 1050.1F, "Environmental impacts: Policies and Procedures," paragraph 5–6.5a. This altspace action is not expected to cause any potentially significant environmental impacts, and no extraordinary droumstances warrant the preparation of an environmental assessment.

Acceptable Payment Methods

ACENCY: Citties of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement, Interior. ACTON: Direct final rule.

SUMBARY: The Office of Surface Mining Registration and Enforcement (DSMRE) is bouring this direct final rule to amond its regulations by reducing the threshold for electronic payment of quarterly Abandoned Mine Land (AML) reclamation fees from \$25,000 to \$500. On April 30, 2024, the U.S. Department of the Treasury (Treasury) will closu OSMRE's lockbox, which is used to process non-electronic reclamation for payments. After April 15, 2024, quarterly reclamation fees of \$500 or more must be paid by electronic transfer, while quarterly reclamation focs of loss than \$500 may be paid by electronic transfer or by check or money order sent to OSMRE's Division of Financial Management. By reducing the threshold for electronic payments, OSMRE will receive more payments through electronic funds transfer, which will expedite and streamline its feecollection afforts.

DATES: This direct final rule is effective April 15, 2024, without further notice, unless OSMRE receives significant adverse comment by March 7, 2024. If OSMRE receives a significant adverse comment that leads it to contribute that the rule is controversial, OSMRE will publish a timely withdrawal in the Federal Register.

I. Hackground

Title IV of the Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act of 1977 (SMCRA) (30 U.S.C. 1231-1244) created the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Fund, which is funded in part by a reslamation the (also known as the Abandoned Mine Land (AML) fee) assessed on each for of oral produced in the United States, and that, among other things, provides funding to allgible States and Tribes for the reclamation of cost mining sites abandoned or loft in an inadequate reclamation status as of August 3, 1977. Section 402(b) of SMCRA (30 ILS.C. 1232[b]] requires coal mine operators and/or permittees to pay reclamation fores no later than thirty days after the and of each calendar quarter.

CSMRE collects these fees from coalmine operators and/or permittees through electronic funds transfer and non-electronic payments. Currently, coal mine operators and/or permittees are required to send non-electronic fee payments to CSMRE's lockbox in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

in April 2018, Treasury's Bureau of the Fiscal Service published a white paper tilled, "The Future of Federal Financial Management," which outlined an Initiative to transform Federal collections by, among other things reducing revenue collection lockboxes and increasing digitization. Subsequently, OSMRE received notice from Treasury's General Lockbox Notwork (GLN) that it intended to class OSMRE's lockbox by Suptember 30, 2023, as part of its effort to close all lockboxies functioning below a minimum them threshold of 1,000 items. (OSMRE's lockbox receives fewer than 400 from annually.) The GLN is a collection and processing service provided by option financial institutions to help federal government agoncles process paper checks and other remittance documents (not related to taxes) that are received through the mail. To allow time to amend its regulations, OSMRE requested a lockbox alosure exhination until April 30, 2024, which Treasury approved.
