

August Marks EAA Chapter 211's 50th Anniversary!

It was in the month of August 1964 when 16 adventurous, area pilots got together and filed papers with Paul Poberezny's fledgling *Experimental Aircraft Association* to start an EAA Chapter in West Michigan. Their efforts would become known as EAA Chapter 211.

To those bold "Charter Members" the possibilities must have seemed endless. It was a time of both turmoil and great promise. Gasoline was 20 cents a gallon and the new Aerospace industry was bourgeoning. I imagine they may have thought, as did I as a young boy in that era, that one day nearly every family would own an airplane and that flying would be as commonplace as driving. Well these sixteen courageous souls were



going to lead the way, and even build their own aircraft! And why not? It was an age that exuded "can-doism."

Well I am thankful for the vision and initiative of those sixteen charter members, and all those who followed as well. Over the past 50 years Chapter 211 has been fortunate to have been home to a great number of inspired thinkers, creative designers, talented engineers and exceptional craftsmen, all willing to confer their knowledge, lend a helping hand, and simply share their love of aviation with others. Chapter 211 is a good place to be!

Some have estimated that over the years our members have built more than 100 aircraft! I would like to compile and publish a list of as many of those aircraft and their builders as possible. Proud Grandparents!

Chet and Patty Uncapher's grandson, Leo Panish, who Chapter 211 sponsored to EAA Air Academy a couple of years ago, is now 16 years old! On July 21, while staying with Chet and Patty, Leo soloed for the first time after only 9 hours of dual instruction from flight instructor Hugh Eisen. His plane was a Grumman Cheetah.

Leo is an exceptional student, not only in the cockpit, but in the class room as well. Below is his beautifully written account of this milestone in his journey.

It was a normal lesson; nothing gave it away. We flew south to the practice area and reviewed a few things from previous lessons: stalls, basic instrument flying, and some ground reference maneuvers. At the end of the lesson, we flew back to Ottawa Executive and did some landings. I was guite pleased with myself because my first 18 landings were never quite how I wanted them to be. Often I would not be right on the center line and most of the time the plane would just fall to the ground with a hard "bump". This was much different from the soft touchdown I have seen my grandparents achieve time and time again. For some reason, these three landings were wonderful and just absolutely satisfying; I brought the plane down each time almost perfectly lined up with the runway, and I was able to feel it rest gently onto the asphalt.

After this, my instructor, Hugh Eisen, asked me to taxi off the runway and park the plane on the ramp, but not shut it down. Even at this point I had no idea what was to

come next. I was just asking myself, was apparently left behind on the "I wonder what we'll be doing here...." It wasn't until he asked for my logbook and medical certificate that I finally realized I was going to solo. I was more nervous about my grandparents missing it than the actual task itself. They had mentioned many times that they would want to take picture and be there when I solo for the first time. I was able to cure that discomfort by asking Hugh to give them a call for me.

He stepped out of the airplane and told me to do three takeoffs and landings. He then mentioned that it might feel different with only myself in the plane. I taxied back to runway two zero and began the takeoff checklist. I then made a radio call, added full power, and was off. The biggest difference I noticed was how much quieter the cockpit was without another person in the plane. Whatever nervousness existed on the ground

runway. It felt so good to be flying an airplane solo; it was almost like hard-evidence that I'm actually capable of flying an airplane myself, or that I am at least capable of taking off and landing. After the final landing, I taxied to the hangar where my grandma was waiting with a great smile. It is certainly a day I will never forget.

Before Leo returned to his home in New York, he logged 17 hours and 65 take-offs and landings. Leo plans to obtain his private pilot license next summer when he is seventeen.
