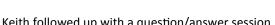
#### October Program:

EAA's Spirit of Aviation mobile experience trailer is bringing EAA's mission and passion to aviation and non-aviation events throughout the country, with its debut at the National Business Aviation Association (NBAA) Business Aviation Convention & Exhibition in Orlando early in November.

The mobile experience has been in the works for more than a year and is designed to bring the EAA brand to aviation enthusiasts through hands-on, member-tested activities engaging people in what EAA is all about.

"We want to promote EAA, our passion for flight, and our mission of growing participation in aviation in way that's fun and engaging," said Dave Chaimson, EAA's vice president of marketing and business development. "The Spirit of Aviation mobile marketing unit brings EAA to life through immersive activities and virtual reality experiences, giving visitors a glimpse into the world of aviation, as well as inviting them to be part of EAA's dynamic, growing, and innovative member community."

Visitor experiences include flight time in two Redbird TD flight simulators, a "Welcome to EAA" 360-degree virtual reality video, and two hands-on EAA-branded activities: a sheet metal cookie cutter project sponsored by Aircraft Spruce & Specialty, and an FT Venture foam glider, sponsored by Flitetest.

The 53-foot semitrailer is also a rolling billboard for EAA, which includes graphics highlighting a Long-EZ homebuilt aircraft and its futuristic design representing EAA's experimental aircraft roots. It also features visibility for EAA AirVenture Oshkosh and the 25th anniversary of the Young Eagles program. Other unique features of the mobile display are a reproduction of the Wittman Regional Airport control tower, a pop-out stage, and an activity area that can be repurposed for presentations and other activities.

"Naturally we want to welcome current EAA members at aviation events, but this experience reaches beyond to non-aviation events, where we can engage people of all ages who are fascinated with flight," Chaimson said. "EAA has always been open to everyone who wishes to participate. Going beyond the usual airport and aviation locations will allow EAA to connect with more people throughout the country in ways we haven't been able to previously. We're taking Oshkosh on the road!"

## Contact Tower by Larry Lyman, Retired ATC

Have you taken a tour of the control tower?

As helpful as a familiarization flight can be for a controller, a visit to the tower may help you to understand the bigger picture while you are in the National Airspace System (NAS). At Waterloo, we are fortunate to have both an operational FAA control tower and a TRACON (Terminal Radar Control).

Call in advance to schedule a tour, and see how the system works from the controller's perspective. Don't be afraid to ask those questions that you may have, and share your concerns with the controllers...everyone benefits when we are all communicating well. Safety is the controllers' first consideration, and you will see how safety permeates everything the controllers do. This is a good time to visit, as traffic is a bit slower in November and thus there may be more time to visit.

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# Tech Notes - Power Up! Part 5 by Mike Lewis

We were talking about cylinders and the various inspection points last month. I promised to discuss options if your cylinder has issues which do not pass inspections.

Let's talk about the head first. Probably the big issue is cracks. What do you do if a crack is detected?

As I noted in last month's column, the head is not replaceable, so can the cylinder be salvaged? I would answer that with a qualified yes, at least in some cases. There are cylinder shops that can weld a crack. Is a weld in the cylinder head going to make the head as good as new? I've heard arguments on both sides of that issue. I would generally have to stand on the side that says no. My goal when overhauling the engine for my project was to have it run essentially trouble free for a reasonable overhaul period -1000 to 2000 hours or more. I think that the probability that an aluminum head that has been welded will survive that long is low. That doesn't mean that there may not be good reason for doing it. It might be that you have a particular engine that is very difficult to impossible to find a replacement cylinder for.

How about the barrel? There are more options here. If the barrel cannot simply be honed, there are at least a couple options. You may be able to have the cylinder rebored (some nitride barrels cannot be rebored – check your overhaul manual). Lycoming barrels can be rebored to either .010 or .020 inch oversize. Corresponding pistons and rings are then sold.

The other option is to have the barrel chrome plated. Note that chrome plating requires different piston rings than steel or nitride barrels require – don't mix them up! When the cylinder shop chromes the barrel, it is first rebored to get it round and straight. Then it is chrome plated back to the standard size bore. Normal aircraft plating is referred to as channel chrome. That is because the surface contains a series of fine channels giving it an appearance somewhat like a cracked egg shell. This channel surface is done to improve oil retention.

Several years back there was another proprietary chrome process called Cermichrome. This was a chrome process where some form of ceramic material was infused into the surface, the purpose of which was also to retain oil. Cermichrome was originally a highly regarded process. As such it became quite popular and as so often happens, the vendor (ECI) had to "farm out" some of the work to keep up with demand. Unfortunately ECI lost control of the process, and Cermichromed cylinders developed a very high failure rate, which ultimately killed the process.

Several years ago, I had a chapter member ask why anyone would want chromed barrels. As discussed above, it is a way of rebuilding barrels back to standard bore. Perhaps another plus for chromed cylinders is that they wear very well. Some say they will last forever (maybe at least 'till the head cracks). The other positive feature of chromed cylinders is they don't rust. The down side is that they will probably consume slightly more oil. Those channels let a little more oil go through. Similarly a differential compression test may show slightly lower compression. I think both of these issues are very minor though.

Some vendors also offer a nickel plating process. I really know nothing of that so if you are interested I would defer to the vendor (ECI).

The other option is replacing the entire cylinder assembly, either from OEM (Lycoming or Continental) or an aftermarket assembly from Superior or ECI. I'll continue with that discussion next month.
