

On Tuesday September 16th the FAA Safety Team led by the Des Moines FSDO's Chris Manthe and two members from the KALO tower facility presented a program entitled "Pitfalls for Pilots" at the Waterloo Airport. The controllers addressed problems and concerns they see in their daily contact with pilots. Runway incursions are still one of the most significant problems for the FAA and the two controllers discussed the hotspots at Waterloo.




Lone Rock WI - September 25th from Chuck Rottinghaus




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Boscobel WI Fly-In Breakfast - September 28 from Chuck Rottinghaus

TECH NOTES - TAP TAP by Mike Lewis

"A good spiral tap...can make all the difference in the world."

Probably most homebuilders today will not have to tap threads in anything. If you are scratch building rather than kit building you may. So this trick is probably useless for most of you, but it is so neat I just had to share it.

If you have tapped very many holes in your life, you have probably broken a tap. The broken end stays wedged in the work piece, often times ruining the piece. Sometimes you can break up the tap remnants and get them out. Often the hole will be damaged. Sometimes the hole can be repaired with a threaded insert (Heli-coil). If your part that you were tapping into is aluminum, there may be a better way.

I discovered that a solution of Alum, available in the canning department of the grocery store, in water can be made to etch the broken tap out of the part. I used about three cans of alum in a two quart sauce pan. You need to heat the solution to something in the neighborhood of 160°F - 180°F. Submerse the part with the broken tap in this solution and soon you will notice small bubbles coming out of the hole with the broken tap in it. The solution is eating away at the steel tap, while not damaging the aluminum. Obviously it would be pretty tough to do this on a wing spar, but perhaps a small mounting bracket or something. The process is not fast, but a broken tap

can be removed this way without damaging the hole. I understand nitric acid will also work without the need to heat the solution.

If your broken tap is in steel – lots of luck! Look for someplace with an EDM tap burner.

While talking tapping, there is one more thing that will greatly reduce the probability of breaking a tap. Buy a good tap! A good spiral point tap (sometimes called gun taps) can make all the difference in the world. These are probably not available at the corner hardware store- check McMaster-Carr, Enco, Msc or other industrial houses.

The Safety Checklist by Dave Hummel

Tower Talk begins a series of articles by Dave Hummel, CFI, CFII & MEI. "The Safety Checklist" will include safety tips designed to help keep everyone safe in the air.

Being a CFI, I have people wanting to learn to fly and reviewing with pilots during flight reviews what are the requirements to remain current as a private pilot? (14 CFR 61.56, 61.57).

 a. Accomplish a flight review (biennial) given in an aircraft for which that pilot is rated by an appropriately rated instructor within the preceding 24 calendar months.

b. To carry passengers, a pilot must have within the preceding 90 days:

I. three takeoffs and three landings as the sole manipulator of the flight controls of an aircraft of the same category and class and, if a type rating is required, of the same type.

II. if the aircraft is a tail wheel airplane, the landings must

have been made to a full stop.

III. If operations are to be conducted during the period beginning I hour after sunset to I hour before sunrise, with passengers on board, the pilot-in-command must have, within the preceding 90 days, made at least three takeoffs and three landings to a full stop during that period in an aircraft of the same category, class, and type (if a type is required) of aircraft to be used.
