#### PILOT DEVIATIONS

We had 23 deviations this past month which is significantly up from last month, and committed by Student thru ATP certificate holders, and of the 23 deviations there were 17 Brashers issued. It appears that there are many that still don't seem to understand what type of airspace they are flying in. Always remember, when you fly in controlled airspace, don't be creative, and do something without first talking to ATC. Always follow ATC instructions, and fly with care. #### FLIGHT TEST MANUAL

If you have completed your airplane project and are preparing to make the first flight, and subsequent test flights, you really need to get the new EAA Flight Test Manual. The latest Revision of the Manual has just been released, and EAA is accepting orders; the member price is \$22.50 and \$25.00 for nonmembers. The revised EAA Flight Test Manual is a comprehensive program for test flying your new experimental airplane. Unique to the EAA's system are test cards that take you through each test flight point-by-point and allow for easy data collection. Use of the EAA Flight Test Manual will result in a thoroughly tested aircraft, a full understanding of their craft's performance, characteristics, and limitations, and have enough data to easily build an operating handbook for the airplane.

#### EAA Chapter 228 Falcons Membership Meeting Minutes Summary October 22, 2024

The October meeting of the Falcons was an in person meeting at the CAU hangar. President Don Croyle

brought the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. There were 22 members/guests present.

Don announced that the Air Force is seeking public comments on their plan to lower the operational floor of the MOA's in Arizona. The comment period has been extended to November 12. Contact Gary Christensen or Jim Timm for more information and how to submit your comments. If the proposal is adopted, flying into a MOA will be much more dangerous due to potential supersonic flight at low altitudes.

Don asked if there were any new nominations to run for any of the board positions. There were no new nominations and the existing management team will be up for election at the November meeting.

There will be a Christmas party on December 10<sup>th</sup>. We hope to go back to the On the Green Sports Bar but that has not been confirmed. Don reminded everyone that there is a new website, ValleyEAA.org, which has information on local valley EAA chapters. Check it out.

The September meeting minutes were approved as published in the October Newsletter.

Don asked for visitors to introduce themselves.

Tomas- is a Junior at Dobson High and is in the EVIT aviation program. He is a guest of Gary Hertzler and is very interested in aviation.

Curtis- is a retired airline captain. He is not flying right now and is looking into a build project.

Jessica was not here tonight so there were no updates on Falcon Field activities and events. Check the Falcon Field web site for the latest information. Don had a shout out for Cory B. who just earned his instrument rating. He will be going for his commercial rating next.

Don asked our treasurer Dave Bankhead for his report. We have \$11,108.06 which includes \$686.61 in unallocated YE credits. We are looking get some Tee shirts for kids who fly at our YE events. Dave also gave an update on Arthur A. (aka Albert) who is now with AeroGuard in Deer Valley. He will be instructing there and also will be getting checked out in some larger aircraft including a twin. He will also get some Part 121 training. This new job will make it difficult for him to attend our meetings.

Don asked builders for an update on their progress. Eric (RV-10) and Larry J. (RV12iS) were not available for a progress reports. Don reported that Phillip B. is building a Zodiac with a UL engine.

The Thursday coffee/donuts starts at 7:30 AM but set up usually starts about 7:00 AM. Suggest you bring your own coffee. Come join us in the admin lobby.

Don gave an update on fly out activities.

Check the APA web site for other events.

There were 11 pilot deviations down from 18 in the previous reporting period. Of these only two Brashers were issued. Pay attention to where you are flying and listen to ATC instructions.

There were 11 accidents/incidents including 4 engine failures, a gear up landing, several hard landings with gear damage and a loss of control. Also a Diamond DA20 lost a door in flight. Thankfully there were no injuries in any of these accidents. Andy Elliott's safety briefing tonight was on Cold Weather Operations. Just a reminder that winter has arrived up north even though we are having an extended summer here in the valley.

Here are some things you should consider for cold weather operations.

Dress warmly for the conditions en-route and your destination. Mittens are better than gloves and a good hat will reduce body heat loss. It gets dark early and you may be delayed if you have a mechanical issue away from home. Are you night current/proficient? File a flight plan or at least use flight following.

Know the conditions of the airport you are going to. Has the runway been cleared of any snow? You may want to remove wheel pants. Carry a fully charged cell phone and a PLB. If you have to make a forced landing, stay with your airplane. SAR will be looking for your airplane, not you.

Cold starts can be hard on you engine. Use an engine preheater whenever possible. Check your tire pressure. Pressure will decrease 1 psi for each 10 degree F change in temperature.

Be aware of frozen water in your fuel. Sump tanks before departing and after refueling in a cold environment before the ice can form.

Ice on your wings can be extremely dangerous. DO NOT attempt to fly if you have any ice/frost on the wings. Likewise, avoid flying in clouds. Ice can accumulate very quickly and most GA planes are not allowed to fly into known icing conditions.

The IMC question tonight is can a pilot on an IFR flight plan land with a 20 knot cross wind if the POH says the maximum cross wind is 17 knots? The answer is YES. The POH is specifying the maximum demonstrated cross wind. You can legally land with a higher cross wind and if successful, no one cares. But if you have an accident, the FAA could say you operated the airplane in a reckless and dangerous manner and suspend or revoke your license.

The VMC question is: How do flight characteristics change when the CG is aft of the normal location

(but still within allowable limits)? The answer is an aft CG will mean that the tail does not need to provide as much down force as normally needed and therefore you can maintain the same airspeed with less power. The caveat, however, is the aft CG makes the airplane less stable in pitch and could affect the stall speed and response in turbulent conditions.

Thank you Dave.

Tonight's program was "bring your favorite shop tool" to show the group. Andy E. started by talking about the fabrication of a wood airplane. It is common practice to use multiple gussets on wood wing ribs that have to be nailed in place to hold everything together while the glue cures. There are litterly thousands of these tiny brass screws in a wood airplane. Andy has simplified and sped up this process using a pneumatic "pin nailer". The pin nailer uses a tiny steel pin about 0.25 inches long and quickly accomplishes the same thing as the manually installed brass pin but significantly faster.

Mike C. brought a "tire bead breaker" tool that he bought from Anti Splat Aero. Originally intended to be used with a floor mounted drill press, Mike fabricated a simple lever machine (copied from the Andy E.) to hold the tool and apply the pressure needed to break the bead on a tire.

Ken E. had an alternative method that he has used for many years. Remove the tire valve to let the air out and connect the tire fill stem to a vacuum source. The vacuum will easily break the tire bead.

Dave B. reminded everyone that he has purchased a precision tire balancing machine and will gladly let you use it to balance your tires.

In closing, Don reminded everyone to fly safely and keep learning via webinars and other training platforms. The next meeting will be on November 26, 2024. The meeting adjourned at 8:40 PM.
