


2020 Ray Aviation Scholar Cade Stommes is now attending school at the University of North Dakota. He is finishing up his private pilot training at UND's aviation training school and should be finishing up this semester.

2021 Ray Aviation Scholar Joe Van Norman received his Zulu 3 Lightspeed headset from the Lightspeed Aviation Foundation and is continuing to progress through his flight training with his instructor Ellen Quist.

I received word from EAA in September that the Ray Foundation was providing more money for additional Ray scholarships for 2021. The scholarships were going to be offered to chapters, who had previously received scholarships and were successful with their selected scholars. So I applied for another \$10,000 scholarship, offering up two very strong candidates for a split scholarship. I am happy to report our chapter was selected for one of the additional scholarships.

Like we have done in the first two years of the scholarships, we have candidates, whose circumstances allow us to split the \$10,000 in half to give two young people the opportunity to get their private pilot license. The first recipient is our Aviation Explorer Post president, Elijah Durkin. As reported in the August Windsock, Elijah was elected at Air Venture by his peers as the BSA National Youth Representative for Aviation Explorers. As a result of that position, he was awarded a \$5,000 flight training scholarship from BSA. So the additional \$5,000 Ray Aviation scholarship will provide him more than enough money to complete his flight training. Our second scholar is JJ Runde, who is a participant in Sharon Sandberg's and Duane Kruse's Build A Plane program in Princeton. Because of the low cost of flight training in the Build A Plane's flying club, JJ will be able to complete his flight training with the \$5,000 Ray scholarship just like our previous scholars Charlie Ellingson, Owen Nitz and Owen Larson. Both of our new Ray scholars have already begun their flight training. JJ just completed his first solo flight this past Thursday on October 7th. Elijah is also receiving instruction from our chapter secretary, Ellen Quist, who tells me he is very close to his first solo as well. Both of these young men intend to finish up in January, when they turn 17. When these four scholars finish their training, our chapter will have successfully helped seven young men earn their Private Pilot licenses with four scholarships.

## ZENITH PROJECT Update

The building crew has made great progress on the Zenith 701 project as we get closer to completing the aircraft. All the electrical and engine wiring are complete, with the exception of the wiring for engine rpm indications. The instrument panel has been installed and we are working to get the SDS engine control system programed and operating, which will lead to a first engine start. The windshield and doors are the next projects on the list. We have to fabricate the seat and seat back cushions, and would welcome help from anyone with the experience of making these items.

We recently were made aware of the nearly three month delay in receiving an aircraft registration from

the FAA. This document is required before we can have the aircraft inspected for an airworthiness certificate. So we will have plenty of time to get everything working properly and finish up the items left on our to do list. The flying club, 237th Aero Squadron, that will be operating the aircraft when completed, has already been incorporated and will be further organized in the coming months. If you would like to help with the build and are interested in joining the flying club after the project is completed, please come out on Monday and Wednesday mornings from 9 am to 12:30 pm at Mark's hanger, 2155 Kansas on the southwest side of the field. *by Frank Huber*
