Bill and I are new pilots, and especially new to flying in Illinois. We started flying lessons in Cape Girardeau MO (KCGI), and then in Gulf Shores, AL (KJKA) when our instructor moved. Our gyro was delivered to KVYS in March after we finished our certifications. Our plan is to gradually increase our territory by making longer and longer trips to local airports. In July, we planned to make our longest trip thus far, to Decatur. Our annual inspection was coming up at Gaitros Aviation and we wanted to make a pre-trip to check out the area before we had a deadline for our inspection day. The weekend before ended up being perfect! It was forecast to be a beautiful day - 90 min to 2 hr flight there, lunch, and then back. Easy! Right? As we all know, things can change, and sometimes quickly.

We leave under blue skies and light wind conditions. We arrive in about an hour and 45 minutes. We meet the attendant at the FBO, get fueled up, and then enjoy a wonderful lunch at The Red Barn Kitchen. Back to the FBO, chat a bit more with the crew there, then out to do our preflight.

During preflight, Bill finds a broken spring on our prerotator. After a little "what now" panic, we spring into team mode. He heads off to get a courtesy car and find a new spring, and I set about opening the cowling just enough to take the broken spring out. Long story short, I get the cowling apart and the spring out, he finds a new spring, we get it back on, we test it, and it works. Woohooo!



Now it's 4:30. Still no problem. Still plenty of time to get home. Check the weather; it looks good all the way. We take off and get about halfway home and hmmm, it looks hazy most of the way ahead. We can still see more than 10 miles but it looks "off".

Bill tries to check the weather, but the internet isn't working in our location. Just as he gets a signal and finds out that there is possible "weather" forming ahead of us, I look west and we are directly east of Mt. Hawley. We decide to divert away from the front and I turn toward Peoria. Bill texts my sister and finds that it is storming in Lacon (another possible diversion airport, closer, but still in the direction of the funky-looking weather) so we continue to Mt. Hawley.

It just so happens that Mt. Hawley has been on our to-do list because there is a Panera right next door! We check our weather and flight apps once we land; there are two pop-up storms directly over Peru and Lacon.

We enjoy dinner at Panera, then check weather again. The storms have cleared and winds are calm.

We walk back to the airport and meet a guy who is taking pictures of our gyro. He lives nearby and occasionally stops down to see what's at the airport. We invite him to come and take a closer look while we do another pre-flight and triple check the new spring. He gets some pictures for his collection, and we get on our way.

Another 43 minutes and we land in Peru. A longer day than expected, but at least our "3 hour tour" didn't turn into years on an island. ;-) Some good decisions, some lessons learned (we need a few wrenches, and a spring added to our repair kit!), and we are a great team \$\frac{\*}{2}\$

Then Hanna, FAA
Master Rigger, followed
with a demonstration
on how to re-pack the
parachute, noting that

it would take 2-3 hours to properly pack a chute that would be used again. . (Joe purchased a replacement emergency chute at Oshkosh, and was retiring his old one.)



Hanna also provided a link to the <u>manual</u> for this emergency parachute system. The

first 10-20 pages have a lot of practical instructions for wearing/using the system. It may be of some interest.
