Safety Tip

Bird Strikes

We live and fly right along the central FLYWAY, so we know we're gonna be sharing the airspace with millions of BIRDS! Here's some thoughts about that. With a BIRD STRIKE FLY THE AIR-CRAFT FIRST NOWS NO TIME TO LOSE CONTROL!

Check NOTAMS and get PIREPS if you suspect unusually large numbers of BIRDS avoid landfill areas, published sanctuary areas and coastal beaches. First step to MISS 'EM. VAST MAJORITY of bird strikes are below 3000 AGL perhaps more than 60% during approach and landing phase. Although I once hit a CANADA GOOSE at 14,500'.

It is believed that over half of all bird strikes are not reported depends on DAMAGE yes.

When evading aircraft, BIRDS like to DIVE pitch up to avoid but don't STALL. BETTER to hit one at 70 than 120. F=MA Force equals Mass X Acceleration. Oh YEAH!

A really bad bird strike could require an immediate landing perhaps OFF airport often tough to evaluate structural damage.

IF you can't or don't DUCK below your aircraft glare shield good idea to wear safety glasses to protect your eyes Windshield can be replaced.

After sunset in cool weather, birds, and other creatures, ,like to wander on still-warm blacktop runways. Perhaps fly by first to scare your landing runway CLEAR.

FLY THE AIRCRAFT FIRST NOW IS NO TIME TO LOSE CONTROL!!

Oh NESTED BIRDS missed on bad preflight inspection can also be a threat. double check! Bruce B, AOPA AIR SAFETY, EAA, FAA, all contributing.

B-21 Raider makes public debut; will become backbone of Air Force's bomber fleet

PALMDALE, Calif. (AFNS) --



In a tangible display of the nation's resolve in meeting security threats, the U.S. Air Force, on Dec. 2, 2022 publicly unveiled the **B-21 Raider**, the first new, long-range strike bomber in a generation and an aircraft specifically designed to be the multifunctional backbone of the modernized bomber fleet.

While the B-21 isn't expected to be operational and introduced into service for several more years, the formal unveiling ceremony hosted by Northrop Grumman Corporation at its production facilities in California is a significant milestone in the Air Force's effort to modernize combat capabilities. The B-21 is designed to be a

more capable and adaptable, state-of-the-art aircraft that will gradually replace aging **B-1 Lanc**er and <u>B-2 Spirit</u> bombers now in service.

According to design requirements, the B-21 is a long-range, highly survivable stealth bomber capable of delivering a mix of conventional and nuclear munitions. The aircraft will play a major role supporting national security objectives and assuring U.S. allies and partners across the globe.

While the precise date when the B-21 will enter service is unknown, basing decisions have been made. <u>Ellsworth AFB</u>, South Dakota will become the first Main Operating Base and formal training unit for the B-21. <u>Whiteman AFB</u>, Missouri, and <u>Dyess AFB</u>, Texas, are the preferred locations for the remaining home bases. Each will receive aircraft as they become available.

In addition to building a bomber with state-of-the-art technology and capabilities, Air Force officials emphasized the focus on containing costs while simultaneously allowing for maximum flexibility.

2004 ANNUAL BANQUET

No blizzard this year - in fact, we had very nice weather for this year's EAA Chapter 289 banquet held Saturday, February 28, 2004, at the Marv Randall Memorial Chapter Building - Lincoln County/Marv Skie airport.

Eighty-five members, guests, and friends of the Chapter attended.

Elmer Den Hartog, Gary Van Skike, and Jack Crowls and his wife drove up from Sheldon (EAA Chapter 1295). Thanks for coming we were glad to see you folks again.

Randy Dolph brought the color guard from Crow Creek School (Nick Estes, Alan Bagola, Tristen Harrison, and Ira Jones) who presented the colors to open the festivities. They made a long trip to join us - we hope to



see them in April when we fly to Chamberlain for a special Young Eagle event.

We were honored to have Brigadier General Curtis Shupe (Ret) as our special guest speaker.

General Shupe has had a long career in military and civilian aviation, beginning when he entered the Army Air Force during WWII, in 1943.

After completing military pilot training, he was assigned to the Southeast Air Command, based in Alabama, and flew and instructed in



the B-25. He later moved on to flying and instructing in the B-24 and B-29 heavy bombers. At end of the WWII, Curt was flying the T-6 and was assigned to the Air Force Reserve in Sioux City where he continued to fly the T-6.

In 1947, General Shupe joined the SD Air National Guard, flying aircraft ranging from the P-51 (one of his favorites) through the F-102 and a number of other jet aircraft.

Upon retirement in 1973, Curt sold aircraft in Sioux Falls "Hangar 3" and in Canton, where he also managed the airport.

He entertained us with stories of near misses ranging from exploding de-icing boots to detached gap strips and offered to give anyone a Twin Beech if they could retrieve it (it lies in 3000 feet of water 60 miles off Hawaii).

Thanks to our favorite Master of Ceremonies, DK Koller, who again presided over the event. Of course, he brought "THE HORN"
