Safety Tip of the Month

Spring is here and more people will be flying, and perhaps for the first time since winter. Albeit a mild winter!

Preflight takes on a very important aspect as the plane has been sitting for awhile. Insure that their are no "critters," dead or alive under the cowling or nests of any kind in the pitot or static line. The oil is at the correct level. Tires have sufficient pressure. Is your transponder current if applicable? Has your ELT battery date expired? VOR check completed, as well as the current GPS software, especially for IMC flight?

Ensure that any and all gust locks are removed or disconnected, before flight.

Look in the engine compartment and tighten up any lines if required, especially the fuel and oil lines.

These are just a few reminders that will keep you safe.

This pertains to the medical requirements for airmen. The text of the request is 41 pages. I urge everyone to read it carefully. It's officially known as Docket no. FAA-2012-0350-0001. It is available online at:

Text of the document can be downloaded and viewed. EAA and Chapter 32 urge our members to review this document, and provide comments to the FAA. EAA has issued a guide to assist aviators when making their comments on the exemption request. That guide can be found on-line at:

Additional data can also be found on the EAA website. Please become familiar with this request and offer comments; I have. If accepted, it will have a large favorable impact on General Aviation, and safety.

"Super Hornet". They were made in Ramona CA but the company has gone out of business because of the economy. They let me build the plane myself in the factory with their equipment and help. I flew it from CA to KSET. It cruises at 110 mph with over 3 hrs of fuel on board and can hold a 492 pound payload with full tanks (600 lb useful load). It has a lot of extras and would have cost over \$70,000.00 if made in the factory in 2007. I'm asking \$30,000.00. Some of its equipment:

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Learning As We Go

"Mr. Designated Airworthiness Examiner, I Present to you This Airplane, my Volksplane II."

Many people have been writing in the Volksplane builders Yahoo group about how long it takes to build a VP I and how much it costs. The responses are varied. Sad thing is the original designer and builder, Mr. William "Bud" Evans built the airframe in SIX months. The story goes that back in 1969, Mrs. Evans (wife of "Bud") told him that he would not be sitting on his butt

all night watching that silly one eyed monster, the idiot box called a television. He had better DO something productive! So he put down on paper his design of a simple wooden airplane, the Volksplane I (one). I wonder how many channels they had back in the day? A good friend, C. A. Aker did a Volkswagen engine conversion for the Volksplane



fuselage in the same amount of time. Though hundreds of planes were built and flown and thousands of plans were sold, Mr. Evans wrote he never made a lot of money selling the plans but he made a whole bunch of new friends all over the world.

Well now I present to the world, and the Designated Airworthiness Representative (DAR), this fine flying machine. As we often say, this airplane is not FINISHED because there is ALWAYS something to do or update. Heck this machine only has a rubber band to hold down the navigation system which is my current St. Louis TAC (Terminal Area Chart). I will have to "upload" the St. Louis and Chicago sectional charts later for any cross country flying.

All in all it has been a GREAT experience. It was supposed to be a learning experience and it truly was. I learned how long things can take and how frustrating certain aspects can be. I still, after days of removing, replacing, cleaning, adjusting, etc., cannot get my right brake line to hold the brake fluid. I will now install the brake fitting in the housing with an aviation gasket sealant and hope that helps. Also I have started to plan

out the new aluminum fuel tank. The pre-molded fiberglass fuel tank (with a lip for the windshield attachment) that was available for the builders in the 1980's is showing its age. Plus, with the talk of 100 Low Lead fuel going away I will need to have an aluminum tank for the ethanol additive in the fuel. New situation!

The present fuel tank

holds the windshield and is mounted to the forward fuselage. New solution, hopefully! I plan to cut the bottom out of the current fiberglass tank out and make an aluminum fuel tank that will slide inside the old fiberglass one so as not to change the WHOLE set up. You see those are the little things in the building process that turn into BIG things that can be a bit challenging. Did I state that right? I could have said this is really going to be a pain in the arse!

I have heard the newsletter editor state that if he buys plans for another aero machine to hit him upside the head with a big rivet squeezer. Heck, that hit in the head must have been the reason for starting the project in the first place!

Well as we say in the Volksplane group, keep making sawdust. The project will be done soon!
