Knucklehead Knowledge larry

Hey Moe! Hey Curly! Look at this thing! I measured twice and cut it twice and it is still to short!

You can prevent this from happening to you by attending the EAA 32 Sheet Metal Builders Conference, June 7, at the ARC, at Smartt Field.

As I get back into the construction of the Evans Volksplane II, I quickly remember how much PREPLANNING AND STUDY must occur so we smartly produce the part or product that looks like the picture in those aircraft plans. It has been written that the builder should read the plans book and review the blueprints completely through twice, before ever starting the project. Highlighting areas of known trouble and putting sticky notes on the plans and in the book can save much time. One builder wanted to do the folding wing option for his airplane but the "changes to the plans" for that option were in the very back of the book. Unless you accomplished "these changes" early in the project, the builder would find out much later that the wing could not be folded!!!

STATE OF MIND is another area of big troubles. In college my faculty advisor was Dean of the College of Education and a brilliant woodworker. Dr. Jacob Stern was building a big wooden boat in which he was going to float down the Mississippi River to his retirement home in South Carolina. While entering his workshop one day I was met by this big chunk of lumber in the doorway of his shop. "What the heck is this and why is it there?" I said! Ole Jake said "That is my bonehead mistake! You see the most important parts of the boat are the main left and right bulkheads (Port and Starboard for you nautical ones). Well, I rushed the process one day and ended up making two LEFT bulkheads. So to remind my self to THINK about what I am doing I hang that expensive piece of scrap lumber right smack dab in the doorway so I do not build anymore scrap."

So, EAA 32 is having a Sheet Metal Builders Conference at the ARC June 7th. Come on out and polish your rusty skills and learn some new tricks. Check in with past and present builders of airplanes like the Zenair 601, 701, and 801's. I even hear that there may be some guys and gals there that know about those rare Van's RV-3,-4,-6,-7,-8, and -9 airplanes. Learning As We Go

This past month of April the YOUNG EAGLES team has had the program running full throttle. What, take a weekend off? Windy weather? No troubles!! I am not sure how the others are doing it but I HAD to go to work to get rest. The YE event in Washington, MO was fantastic! Over 200 kids arrived in groups of 20 or so and were greeted by the INFO DESK/FLIGHT CERTIFICATE people. We must have been doing something right because this Boy Scout group even fed us.

A special show was put on by a tree trimming helicopter that used a 2 stroke Rotax engine to turn, via belt drive, 11- 24 inch saw blades. This \$25,000 contraption is hung from the helicopter, a Hughes 500, (which charges \$1,000 per hour) to cut tree limbs

back from around high tension (13,000 volt) powerlines. The pilot said that, "In the South Carolina pine forest, I can fire up the Rotaxpowered chain saws, drop in along the powerlines and get goin' about 15 miles per hour with no trouble. Up here in Missourah you got it all. Those 24 inch diameter hickory trees, well they take a little work. Usually I have to come in and cut what I can, then pull out, fly up and over the area and come in from the back side to saw the big limbs from the other side." Do you ever get stuck? "Yea and it is a pain because we have to call out a ground crew to come and get the

contraption out of the trees when I just shut it down and let it drop" What else do you hit? "Those old boys in those tree stands slow us down a second or two. But they love to hear us coming because the turkey and deer are running about 300 yards in front of the helicopter and they usually get something out of it"
