37th Annual Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show Spectacular

On July 2nd, a day before for the Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show Spectacular, the Dubuque Regional Airport (DBQ/KDBQ) had an aircraft viewing and open house event. This annual event is where you can interact with the air show performers, local airport businesses, and EAA Chapter 327. There were twelve aircraft on display, including a 1956 North American T-26B Trojan (N5443U), 2021 Van's RV-12iS (N744AN), 2012 Cessna 182T Skylane (N230CP), Fairchild Republic A10C Thunderbolt II (80-0181), Boeing CH-47F Chinook (12-08874) and seven members of the Full Throttle Formation Team.

On Monday July 3rd, I attended the 37th annual Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show Spectacular event at A.Y. McDonald Park in Dubuque, Iowa, over Lock and Dam Number 11 located over the Mississippi River. The two-hour airshow went from 5:30 PM to 7:30 PM, with forty-three minutes of fireworks blasting the nighttime sky.

The weather was a fantastic setting for an air show as there was lots of sun, blue skies, and no clouds in sight and I had a blast attending this air show.

The air show kicked off with a beautiful rendition of the National Anthem. Then the first act of the evening took place with the United States Army Golden Knights Black Parachute Team. Each member of this team jumped out of a de Havilland Dash 8-300 (GKA610). One of the members is a local native, Sgt. 1st Class Marcus Denniston from Cedar Rapids, IA.

Their show consisted of multiple jumpers exiting the aircraft while forming a geometric shape with smoke canisters deployed for additional crowd effect. They



also did jumps with the POW/MIA, state of Iowa, and the United State of America flags. Each maneuver, that the Golden Knights performed was execut-

ed for the enjoyment and safety of the audience. With the small and tricky landing zone on the ground in Dubuque, Iowa, the parachutists made it look effortless. They also performed a nighttime jump later on in the show.

The third act was put on by the Air Force Heritage Flight Foundation which featured three unique aircraft, featuring 2011 Bettendorf High School graduate and Davenport, Iowa native Capt. Sam "RaZZ" Larsson of the United States Air Force F-22 Raptor Demonstration Team, Bruce "Doc" Winters in the 1944 North American F-51D Mustang Happy Jack's Go Buggy, and Capt. Lindsay "MAD" Johnson of the United States Air Force A-10C Demonstration Team. RaZZ performed double duty this day as he also per-



formed his full aerobatic routine at the Battle Creek Field of Flight Air Show & Balloon Festival in Battle Creek, Michigan, just like Maj. Kristin "BEO" Wolfe & the United States Air Force F-35A Lightning II Demonstration Team did last year. The announcers commented that he went straight from Battle Creek to Dubuque without landing. He wowed the crowd in the Lockheed F-22A Raptor that he was flying. Each aircraft did a series of flybys on their own before departing for the next act.

The fourth act was put on by Capt. Lindsay "MAD" Johnson of the United States Air Force A-10C Demonstration Team in a Fairchild Republic A-10C Thunderbolt II (aka "Warthog" or "Hog" or "Hawg") which offers excellent maneuverability at low airspeeds and altitude while maintaining a highly accu-

rate weapons-delivery platform. The lethality and spectacle of the A-10's GAU-8 Avenger 30mm, seven-barrel Gatling-type cannon with each of the seven barrels capable of firing 557 rounds per minute which makes this a deadly asset for our military personnel. It was awesome seeing her pull at 7.33 Gs and simulating gun runs during her demonstration. Even cooler is that one of the members of its team, Maj. Travis "Trailer" Jackson is a Bettendorf, Iowa native.

The fifth act was by the returning Full Throttle Formation Team. This team is the largest precision formation team in North America currently flying today with twelve Van's RV aircraft in the sky at once.

The team flies as three flights of four planes, and all



three flights coordinate simultaneously to create their formations. Their first pass is just a basic left-to-right pass in front of show center. Another pass is their Falconry Pass where three Charlie Flights are split in half with Charlie 1 & 2 on the left with Charlie 3 & 4 on the right. Now, the Alpha, Bravo, and Charlie flight leads are busy positioning themselves for the arrow pass. One of my favorite passes that they do is the Stingray Pass where the twelve aircraft in the sky position themselves to look like a giant stingray. For their finale, they separate and fly in a circle.

This was my second time seeing this team in person and one of the reasons why I wanted to attend this event. It was interesting to see how they interacted to create their formations. The Van's series of RV Aircraft remains one the best affordable aircraft on the market today and after 50 years of business this company is still going strong in the homebuilding community. If you have not seen this formation aerobatic team in person that does roughly a ten-to-fourteenminute routine, I highly suggest that you do.

The sixth act was a returning act at the Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show Spectacular as Team Leader Chip Lamb represented the Trojan Phylers. He made his Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show Spectacular de-

but last year This highly experienced veteran from Texas has been delighting spectators for over two decades. He brought the speed, smoke, thunder, and excitement with precision aerobatics in his 1956 North American T-28B Trojan. His Warbird served nearly 30 years in the military before falling into civilian hands. His sports a Wright Cyclone R1820-86B nine-cylinder radial-engine with 1,425 horsepower and a three-bladed propeller. I was really amazed at what he and his Trojan could do

Overall, this marked my 5th time going to this air show as I last attended in 2022. The air show is FREE and best of all parking is \$20.00. I hope this recap will encourage you to put this on your list of air shows to come see. The 38th Annual Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show Spectacular will happen on Wednesday, July 3, 2024.

Helicopter Safety

I received a call while at Oshkosh from Evan Lawler, UD's Chief helicopter pilot, about what he experienced as very unsafe behavior on the part of one of the EAA members driving a van from T-hangers to the EAA hanger. The **Bell Jet Ranger helicopter he was flying has a tail rotor that is not shielded, and the pilot can't see behind**. Evan was POC, and the van pulled around and behind the Jet Ranger while they were in a low hover, taxiing toward the self-fueler area.

Evan described safe practice and said what he would like is for us to slow down when passing the old T-hangers and looking both ways for heli traffic. If present, we need to stop, establish eye contact with the pilot, and wait for them to pass. If they are on the ground warming the engine, be sure they understand with hand signals where you are going and that they agree with a thumbs up or OK hand sign.

What we should never do is swing around behind the tail rotor where the pilot can't see us. Thanks everyone, for your cooperation!
