The Early Years –

The Experimental Aircraft Association's Fly-In Convention, now known as EAA AirVenture Oshkosh, has been in existence nearly as long as the association itself.

The first gathering was in September 1953 as a small part of the Milwaukee (Wis.) Air Pageant. That original EAA fly-in at Curtiss-Wright (now Timmerman) Field was attended by a handful of airplanes, mostly homebuilt and modified aircraft. Fewer than 150 people registered as visitors. The larger Milwaukee Air Pageant has faded away but the EAA gathering has become the world's premier aviation event.

EAA's fly-in grew quickly in its first few years and by the late 1950s it had outgrown the area of the Milwaukee airport it was allowed to use.

In 1959, the event moved to Rockford (Ill.) Municipal Airport, where it would stay for the next decade.



The "Rockford Years" were where the EAA Fly-In Convention established both its prominence as a homebuilders' event and its friendly feeling that is retained to this day. During these years, such diverse aviation interests as Warbirds, antiques and aerobatic performers became part of the EAA event.

Ray Scholar Report by Jack Newhouse



It has been another exciting month of aviation. This past month I was able to do a cross country from Dubuque to Harlan, Iowa which is near Omaha. This was a long flight that allowed me to interact with multiple towers and get used to spending an extended time flying. I also flew a long solo around southwestern Wisconsin and racked up more hours.

As I have said before, I am planning to go to Embry Riddle after graduating high school. You may not know though, that I am taking twelve college credits of data analytics and technical writing this semester at Southwest Technical College, in addition to four more high school classes at Prairie du Chien High School's charter school. This is an intensive workload, but with these and the previous semester's credits I have earned, I should be able to start Embry Riddle as a second semester sophomore instead of a freshman. It is kind of weird, but I will be a college sophomore before I get my high school diploma.

This leads me to why the Ray Foundation is so inspiring to me personally. James Ray was an Eagle Scout who also graduated from high school early.

As a young man, he witnessed Pearl Harbor firsthand, standing less than four hundred yards from the USS Arizona. This inspired his own call to service. He almost immediately enlisted in the United States Army Air Corp. Showing an incredible aptitude for aviation, he soon became a pilot. He flew thirty missions over Europe in a B-17, including efforts on D-Day. This, I think you'll agree, is the biography of a hero, but there is more - a lot more.

After the war, he met his wife, Joan, and they spent some time living in Switzerland as expats. His mind continued to approach the world with curiosity and a desire to make things better. Upon returning to America, the Rays bought a beef ranch in Montana. It was at the ranch that he developed a vaccine that just about every beef herd, including my own family's, receives to maintain generational health. My only concern here was his affinity for Hereford cattle instead of Angus.

Nevertheless, ever the remarkable man, he watched the technological changes of Silicon Valley and backed a couple of little companies that became Hewlitt Packard and Compaq. His efforts at this point resulted in remarkable success for him and Joan. Instead of flying off into the sunset, they used their new found status to help others who needed assistance, as long as they were willing to work for it. They became very active in antidrug efforts geared towards people my age. They also realized that honesty, self-confidence, and self-discipline lead to a successful goal orientated life. Not only did they demonstrate this in their own lives, but they rewarded others who made an effort to better themselves.

Now, when you learn about someone who is impressive, you tend to want to use them as a role model. I believe that his opinion that it was the flight training he received that was responsible for driving him to his later success. I try, in my own life, to emulate these aspirations. My receipt of the Ray Scholarship is helping me to reach a little farther towards my own future, whatever it has in store for me. I have Mr. and Mrs. Ray, the EAA, and specifically Chapter 327 to thank for this tremendous award. I am humbled to be included in the efforts of such a great group of people.

Thus, with your encouragement and support, I again, say thank you for your help on getting me closer to my private pilot's license. It looks to be shaping up to be a great Spring with a lot of fun times to be had. I cannot wait to have the Hangar door open.

B-29 Reunion Added to Warbird Highlights at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2024

(And to our DUBUQUE REGIONAL AIRPORT July 26th-28th!!! More details to follow)

The world's only two flying examples of the Boeing B-29 Superfortress will make a rare joint appearance this summer during EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2024, supporting the "Turning the Tide" salute to 1944 that will also commemorate the 80th anniversary of D-Day. The 71st edition of EAA's fly-in convention is July 22-28 at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh.

It is believed to be only the fourth time two B-29s have made a joint public appearance in 50 years, with the first taking place in Oshkosh in 2017. It is the first time these aircraft have appeared together since 2018.



"As AirVenture is the world's largest annual gathering of warbirds, bringing these two iconic aircraft together is another of those 'Only at Oshkosh' moments," said Rick Larsen, EAA's vice president of communities and member programs, who coordinates AirVenture features and attractions. "These airplanes are big favorites wherever they appear, but together they will make the 'Turning the Tide' commemoration even more unforgettable."

As currently scheduled, each airplane will spend time featured on EAA's Boeing Plaza. *FIFI* will be on display on July 22-24, while *Doc* will take center stage for display on July 25-28. The airplanes are also scheduled to make a formation flight at the beginning of the July 24 night air show. When not on display at Boeing Plaza, flight experiences on *Doc* July 22-25 will be based at Appleton International Airport, approximately 20 miles north.

FIFI is owned and operated by the Commemorative Air Force's <u>B-29/B-24 Squadron</u> of Dallas, Texas. It was acquired by the CAF in the early 1970s when a group of CAF members found it at the U.S. Navy Proving Ground at China Lake, California, where it was being used as a missile target. The airplane was rescued and restored, then flew for more than 30 years until 2006, when the chief pilot made the decision to ground it pending a complete powerplant re-fit. After an extensive four-year restoration that included installing four new custom-built hybrid engines, *FIFI* returned to the sky in 2010 and has since traveled coast to coast. Doc was built in 1944 and for many years was part of a squadron known as the Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs in upstate New York at Griffiss Air Force Base (hence, the name Doc). The airplane was retired in 1956 as the jet bomber age began and sat as a target for Navy training missions in China Lake, California, until 1998. A restoration group took possession of the airplane from the U.S. government and hauled it to Wichita, Kansas, in pieces in 2000. After 16 years and more than 450,000 volunteer hours, Doc made its first flight after restoration in July 2016, 60 years after it had been retired.
